Weekend Rains Provide Cisco With About 18 Months Water Supply

National Guard To Be Modernized Under Wide Re-organization Program

Plans for the reorganization of the 49th Armored Division, Texas National Guard, of which the 961st Field Artillery is a part, were disclosed this week, Captain Olin Odum, commanding officer of the Unit, has been notified.

National Guard Units here and elsewhere over the state have been notified of the re-conversion measures and requested to alter battery personnel and organization as specified in the orders.

Cisco, which previously utilized the now obsolete 155mm howitzer, will be issued four self propelled howitzers mounted on trucks.

"As it was," said Sgt. Frank Schlepfer, Cisco

Guard Administrative assistant, "the obsolete 155's offered little protection to gun crews."

"From what the units have been told, these new propelled howitzers are the latest the army has been able to perfect in modern artillery," he pointed out.

Schlepfer said the self propelled guns are capable of moving at fast speed with more maneuverability while in the field. The tracts, weighing more than fifteen tons, will be equipped with protective shields for the 18 man crew.

The new change, it was stated, will become effective probably on August 1 and units will be reclassified from the 961st Field Artillery to the 648th Armored Division.

While the exact purpose of the re-conversion is not known, it will, however, permit more applicants for service with the National Guard. Cisco's quota, now standing at five officers and 93 men, will be adjusted to add six, new recruits to its ranks.

Meanwhile, National Guard officers were completing arrangements for a summer training camp, to be held at Camp Hood for a two weeks period, beginning June 19. Enlisted personnel and officers who are making plans to attend this summer from local unit were administered inoculations Sunday afternoon by the unit medical officer.

Complete details as to the number of Guardsmen planning to make the trip from here were not available Monday, but a 100 percent attendance was anticipated by the Battery headquarters.

Charles Spears, president of the bank, relaxed. Stories concerning the clock had appeared in scores of newspapers, having gone out over the wires. At least two bankers magazines discussed the situation.

Mail from bankers in various parts of the country, including Fort Worth, Dallas and New York City, asked Spears when he was going to get his clock running.

Spears was glad to see the clock running and to hear the chimes again. So was all Cisco.

Storm Damages Electric Lines In Putnam Area

Approximately two inches of rain Saturday night and early Monday morning raised the water level of Lake Cisco more than 20 inches and Lake Birnie by over three and a half feet, city officials reported today. And water was still trickling into the lakes from the watershed last Monday.

Water caught in the lakes recently is sufficient to take care of the normal needs of the Cisco area for at least 18 months, City Secretary Hal Lavery estimated.

The hundreds of stock tanks in the lake watershed were full and any rains in the immediate future will benefit the lakes considerably. Lake Birnie was only about two feet below the spillway - highest it has been in some three years. Water pouring over the spillway goes into Lake Cisco.

High winds and an electrical storm accompanied the rains. Saturday night's storm caused several thousand dollars damage to West Texas Utilities Company properties. Lightning cut a line near the Cisco substation and power was off in the city for some 20 minutes.

Lightning ruined two large transformers at the Humble Pipe Line Company's Putnam station, disrupting service for about 20 hours. It was necessary to obtain three new transformers—one from San Angelo and two from Santa Anna to repair the damages. Repair crews ran into additional trouble on muddy roads.

High winds caused minor line breaks in various parts of town. District Manager E. L. Jackson reported that everything was normal today.

Some 200 telephones in Cisco went dead Saturday night due to wet cable. All but 12 were back in operation Tuesday morning and workmen expected them to be operating during the day.

Rain gauges showed that Saturday night's fall amounted to 1.5 inches and the gauges registered .3 of an inch early Monday.

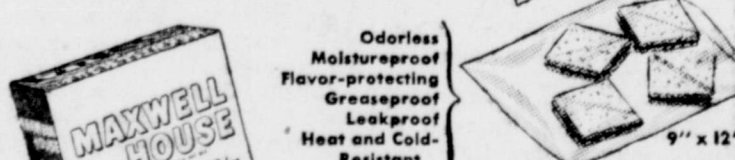

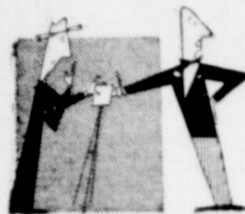

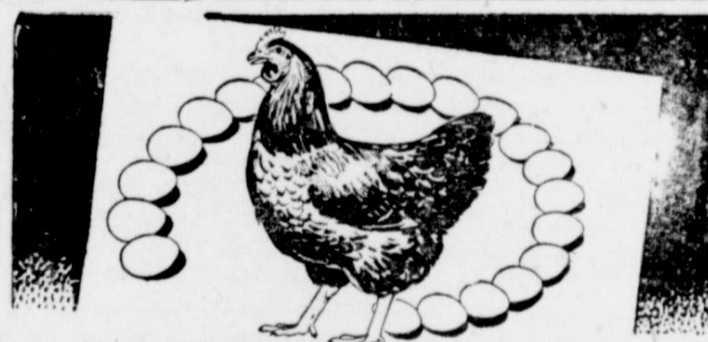
