LAKE CISCO POOL AND PARK HAVE INCREASING NUMBER OF VISITORS

Lake Cisco Park and swimming pool will be the scene of vast recreational activity in the coming summer days as hundreds of school classes from the surrounding areas press officials here for reservations.

Grade schools from Rising Star, Gordon and Ranger, totaling more than 125 youngsters, arrived Thursday for a day's visit, and a third school, Stamford, was expected over the weekend. So far, numerous schools and social organizations have spent the week-ends at the pool, enjoying the pool and park facilities.

In answer to repeated inquiries, Bee Cerley, pool manager, said Friday that no immediate plans were foreseen to open the deep pool at the south end. Lack of water over the drought period caused city officials to close down the mud bottom pool. However, Cerley said the commission was working on arrangements to allow the big pool to open before the season's end.

Meanwhile, pool attendants were reported waging a clean-up campaign of their own, so far as the swimming pool and adjoining terraces are concerned. Scrubbing and cleansing projects in the concrete basin are being carried on twice a month. Landscaping and beautifying the sloping lawns are being done by the attendants.

According to Cerley, rain or threatening weather has kept a good many of the regular swimmers away or out of the pool, but prospects for one of

the biggest years in the park history are indicated. At the present time, the pool is being operated on an all-day basis for patrons. Joey Baum, Cisco Junior College student, is the only full time life guard on duty at the present, but plans are to hire an additional guard at the close of school.

Cerley said the pool hopes to conduct a "Learn to Swim" campaign this year. It would include teaching swimming lessons to sinkers, beginners, intermediates, junior and senior age saving. As in the past, the chief purpose of the program is to teach beginners of school age how to swim. Last year, hundreds of youngsters were taught the fundamentals. The "Learn to Swim" program has been a major activity at the pool for the past number of years, Cerley said. The lessons are usually taught by an experienced swimmer, recognized by the Red Cross. Registration will probably be handled through the pool managements and announced later.

Work is being rushed by city crews to revamp and beautify the picnic grounds and recreational facilities. Park benches and tables, constructed in stone, are being erected over the area by the city. Barbecue pits, already built, have been repaired.

In addition to the major undertaking by the city, park recreational diversions are in full swing, including a kiddies' ride, skating, miniature golf and "whirl-de-loop" rides.

City Assigns 30 Acres Of Land To Show Association

A livestock show arena with grandstands and a regular quarter horse racing program will be provided for the residents of this Central Texas area if projects undertaken by the Cisco Livestock Show Association are worked out, President A. Z. Myrick reported Saturday. The association, which helps stage the annual Eastland County Livestock Show here each spring, met Thursday night and mapped the ambitious program.

Myrick announced that the City of Cisco has assigned some 30 acres of land, which included the show barn and race track, to the association for development. The city owns a large tract, which formerly was an airport, and assigned it to the association on a long term lease.

A committee composed of Ed Huestis, Charles Spears and Roy C. Davis was named to confer with a man interested in promoting quarter horse and matched races here twice monthly. If this is worked out, the association probably would hold an annual racing event of regional interest.

Another committee — J. W. Sifton, C. W. Henry and Sutton Crofts — was appointed to study the possibilities of building an all purpose arena and grandstands. This group was asked to make recommendations to the directorate.

Ed Huestis and M. E. Fry were delegated to make arrangements to have the association's grounds fenced.

"The directors feel that the Cisco area is interested in the livestock show program and in racing," Mr. Myrick said. "Our purpose in these undertakings is to provide our city and county with facilities adequate for any type of livestock show."

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EASTLAND COUNTY MAN WILL HOLD OPEN HOUSE ON 80th BIRTHDAY

A. H. (Art) Johnson of Eastland, who is as spry as the next man despite his years, will celebrate his 80th birthday Sunday in his home at 414 Hillcrest Street, and will hold open house from 2 to 6 p. m. Sunday.

Weaver, whose birthdays fall between May 23 and 25 also, will share in the honor.

Mr. Johnson, whose actual birth date was May 23, asked his friends not to bring gifts. Arthur Hamilton Johnson was born May 23 at Oberlin, Ohio, the son of A. B. and Almira H. Johnson, and has been a resident of Eastland County for 32 years, having moved to Cisco in

1897 and to Eastland in 1914. He attended public school and graduated from Oberlin College in his native city, and when barely 21 was elected cashier of the Citizens National Bank of Oberlin.

He had held this responsible position about seven years when he heeded the advice of the late E. P. Wilmott, formerly of Oberlin and who owned the house in which Johnson was born, to "Go to Texas."

At that time Wilmott was in the banking business in Austin, and it was in Austin that Johnson and Wilmott held a conference on a good place for the young banker to locate. Cisco was one of the towns mentioned, and it was in Cisco that Johnson landed.

Immediately after locating there he formed a connection with a Cisco bank, and continued in the banking business until 1914, when he moved to Eastland to enter the abstract and land title business.

A life-long Republican, in 1922 he was appointed Eastland postmaster, and served in that capacity until Sept. 1, 1934. After leaving the post office, Johnson entered the abstract, real estate and title business, and still is active in the business, going to his office on South Lamar Street daily.

Johnson's wife, whose ill health was one of the reasons for their move to Texas, died in Cisco. Some years later he married a Mrs. Barlow in Cisco in 1902. He has a step-son, T. J. Barlow, of Abilene, who was four years old when Johnson married his mother.

Some years ago Mrs. Barlow was killed in an automobile accident.

On January 6, 1932, Johnson married Miss Marene Johnson, and his present wife, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William Johnson of Aspermont, were married.

Slight of stature, Johnson is exceptionally active, and appears considerably younger than his age. His white goatee, trimmed in

the fashion of another generation, long has been a familiar sight to the residents of Eastland County.

Johnson is known as a splendid businessman and his knowledge of Eastland County is titles is reportedly the best of any man in Eastland County.

Among other properties, he and Mrs. Johnson own their splendid home in Eastland's Hillcrest Addition, where their friends are always welcome.

Johnson's principal hobby is playing bridge.

City of Baird Sells Water Bonds

The City of Baird will soon be ready to build a lake for their city water supply.

They had a joint meeting of the Callahan County Water Control and Improvement District No. 1 and the Baird City Council. The \$200,000 bonds recently voted for the purpose of constructing a lake were sold at rates of 3.5 per cent for bonds maturing the first fifteen years and 3.75 for the bonds maturing the last fifteen years.

The bonds were sold to Jackson and Underwood, owner of the outstanding bonds against Baird's water and sewer system, in the amount of \$23,000. Had these bonds been unavailable, Baird could not have voted additional bonds with which to construct the pipeline and filtration system to bring water to the town.

Social Security Benefits Explained By Official

Judging from inquiries received daily by our office, many worker's don't know what they are buying with their social security taxes," Ralph T. Fisher, manager of the Abilene Social said today.

"Some continue to confuse old-age and survivors insurance with old-age assistance with unemployment compensation.

"All workers covered by social security should realize that the penny taken out of each dollar of wages pays the premiums for old-age and survivors insurance; which is, in effect, a combined life insurance and retirement annuity policy. The plan provides monthly retirement payments to workers and their families.

It also provides monthly benefits to families of workers who have died. Eligibility and the

amount of benefits hinge on the wages the worker has earned in jobs covered by social security.

"Old-age assistance, on the other hand, is paid to old people who are in need. The payments vary with the need of each applicant. Unemployment compensation provides workers with some income when they are out of a job. Their employers, in most states, pay the full cost of the program."

Mr. Fisher suggested that anyone who has a question about social security may secure the needed information from his office, Social Security Administration, 308 Post Office Building, Abilene, Texas.

Warning Issued As Diphtheria Cases Increase; 397 Cases Are Reported

AUSTIN, May 19. — With 14 reported cases of diphtheria within the past week, and a total of 397 cases reported in the first 19 weeks of this year, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, is urging Texas parents to have their immunized children Schick tested to determine immunity, and if inoculation is necessary, to have it done immediately.

"There is a widespread belief that once immunity is established, it lasts forever," the State Health Officer said. "This is not always true. In some cases it diminishes and finally dies out, and reinoculation is necessary in order to protect the child.

"Every child who will enter school next term should be inoculated or Schick tested now, because it takes from three to nine months for immunity to be completely established after

the injection is administered." As long as cases of diphtheria occur, a child is in danger unless protected by immunization. The germs throw off a powerful poison which goes all through the body. It is particularly harmful to the heart, blood vessels, nerves and kidneys, and serious complications often accompany the disease. Some of the more dangerous complications are broncho-pneumonia, to which the patient is particularly susceptible; paralysis, which may last for days or for as long as 3 or 4 months; or permanent injury to heart, nerves or kidneys.

"The best thing to do with diphtheria is to stop it before it starts," Dr. Cox said. "When toxoid is injected under the skin, the system manufactures a disease-fighting antitoxin which can successfully resist the disease.

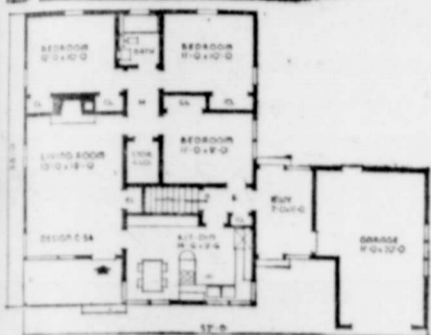

business man will be asked to complete a form peculiar to his business which will include information as to his net sales for the year 1948, amount of taxes paid to State and Federal Governments, number of employees on the payroll, the total amount of the payroll and other information which the Bureau deems valuable in gathering the facts concerning business.

Social Security Representative To Be Here Soon

E. Glen McNatt, field representative of the Abilene office of the Social Security Administration, will be at the Post Office in Cisco at 2:00 p. m., Thursday, May 26, Persons wishing assistance with retirement claims or death claims under the Social Security Act should call at that time for nec-

essary help and information.

The Abilene social security office points out that while employers usually report all cash payments to their employees, they do not always include the money value of other pay which is made in some medium other than cash. This has come to the attention of the office during the handling of claims for benefit payments in the 16 counties in this area.

Ralph T. Fisher, manager of the Abilene social security office, explained that the word "wages" used in the Social Security Act includes pay of various types. It includes cash, payments in kind such as meals, lodging, rent, or goods, and of course, salaries, bonuses, back pay, as well as pay by the hour, day, or week.

Workers who receive part or all of their pay in the form of meals or lodging, rent, or goods of any sort, and have reason to believe their wage accounts are incorrect, should contact the Abilene social security office, located at Room 308, Post Office Building. Ask for a postcard form which makes it easy to obtain a statement of wages credited to the employee's account.

Merit Council To Hold Exams

Competitive examinations for positions in the Public health hospital construction program of the Texas State Department of Health has just been announced by the Merit System Council for the Texas State Department of Health. 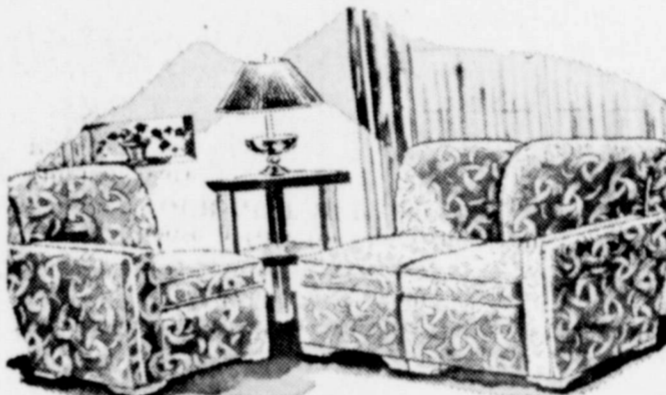
