Vorth Of Small Colleges Outlined y Speaker At CJC Commencement

more intelligent, arert and informed citizen than did the world of a generation ago Manager B. A. Butier of the Cisco Chamber of Commerce told graduating students of Cisco Junior College in a commen cement address Thursday night Speaking on "Some Marks of an Educated Man," Butler de scribed an educated person as one who can think and act creatively in terms of a personal responibility to society."

The 68 seniors, attired in traditional caps and gowns, were congratulated by Butler for attending a small college. these times of bigness and billions." he said. "we are inclined to disparage smallness, to worship magnitude, to associate ourselves with size and take refuge in quantity rather than "We are inclined to look to

the big industry, the big union, the big city, the big church, the big university as the security and the source of our culture. All too often we measure our personal importance by conditions of our association with these institutions. "But for all that our accom-

pli hments as a people are dramatized or reflected in such organizations, our democratic culture is not a product of magnitude. The American way of life is not the product of bigness. Our culture springs from the creative riches that have been discovered and developed in the individual, and its product has been the greatest where our men and women have been the least obscured by the institution and the least restrained

"Here, in Cisco Junior College, you have been close to the

pulse of the land; and you have felt the spirit of our scople, and have been confirmed and strengthened by it."

While the students were reeiving the benefits of a small college, Butler pointed out that the college strengthened the community. The communities served by this college are immeasurably strengthened," he said. "Its influence and benefit are well worth the cost," he said.

Pointing out that there are three qualities of an educated man, Butler said: "The first quality is that of producing. We are a creative people. Another quality is self-dependence, for only a self-dependent person can have any independence. And the third characteristic of an educated person is his conviction of a personal responsi-

'No person is properly educated who does not recognize his sources in and his common destiny with all mankind. No person is properly educated who does not feel a conviction of a personal responsibility for the community in which he lives. We are responsible for our world - we are the keepers of our brothers."


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
