Scranton Outlasts Night School Team To Win By 3-2 Score

Tight defensive playing and accurate pitching enabled the Scranton Plowboys to clamp a 3-2 defeat on the Cisco Night School softballers last night at Chesley Park. The largest crowd of the season saw the locals drop the heartbreaker.

The Plowboys, already nudged for two outs, jumped to a 3-0 lead in the initial inning. Boland got on base by the fielder's choice route, moved to third on a triple by Harris, and a double by Foster cleaned the circuit.

In the bottom half of the first inning, the Cisco Night Schoolers were good for only one run across when Lefty Sublett, who got on after being hit by a pitched ball, slipped home on a pass ball. Boland, Plowboy hurler, then forced Cozart out, and Gann and Bailey popped out. Here, the score stood 3-1.

Burrows, starting pitcher for the Night boys was not to be outdone by his opponent at the mound. He whiffed the first three batters in the second, repeated in the third, a likewise in the fourth. Later, Morris took over the reins and the pitching was equally well.

Completion of the Hickok Producing and Development Company's Wright and Harrell No. 9, a Kleiner oil pool extension, as a 10,000,000 cubic feet per day gas well was reported here today.

The Hickok company, which operates a gasoline plant and owns the Cisco Gas Corporation, will use the new well in their gas system. It was completed in the Ranger sand and is producing through casing perforations from 3,892 to 3,900 feet.

The operators drilled the well to the Barnett formation where a gas show was encountered. It was decided to complete it as a gasser in the Ranger rather than take a chance on going deeper in search of Mississippi or Ellenberger pay.

The hole probably will be deepened later if the gas pay plays out. Oil men said the 10,000,000 cubic feet gasser was the best gas well completed in this section in years.

The gas had not been tested for casinghead gasoline content. It was described as "dry gas." The hole was dug with cable tools.

North Of Small Colleges Outlined By Speaker At CJC Commencement

The world today requires a more intelligent, alert and informed citizen than did the world of a generation ago, manager B. A. Butler of the Cisco Chamber of Commerce told graduating students of Cisco Junior College in a commencement address Thursday night.

Speaking on "Some Marks of an Educated Man," Butler described an educated person as "one who can think and act creatively in terms of a personal responsibility to society."

The 68 seniors, attired in traditional caps and gowns, were congratulated by Butler for attending a small college. "In these times of bigness and billions," he said, "we are inclined to disparage smallness, to worship magnitude, to associate ourselves with size and take refuge in quantity rather than quality."

"We are inclined to look to the big industry, the big union, the big city, the big church, the big university as the security and the source of our culture. All too often we measure our personal importance by the conditions of our association with these institutions."

"But for all that our accomplishments as a people are dramatized or reflected in such organizations, our democratic culture is not a product of magnitude. The American way of life is not the product of bigness. Our culture springs from the creative riches that have been discovered and developed in the individual, and its product has been the greatest where our men and women have been the least obscured by the institution and the least restrained by its functions."

"Here, in Cisco Junior College, you have been close to the heart of the people, near the

pulse of the land; and you have felt the spirit of our people, and have been confirmed and strengthened by it."

While the students were receiving the benefits of a small college, Butler pointed out that the college strengthened the community. The communities served by this college are immeasurably strengthened," he said. "Its influence and benefit are well worth the cost," he said.

Pointing out that there are three qualities of an educated man, Butler said: "The first quality is that of producing. We are a creative people. Another quality is self-dependence, for only a self-dependent person can have any independence. And the third characteristic of an educated person is his conviction of a personal responsibility."

"No person is properly educated who does not recognize his sources in and his common destiny with all mankind. No person is properly educated who does not feel a conviction of a personal responsibility for the community in which he lives. We are responsible for our world — we are the keepers of our brothers."

President O. L. Stamey introduced Butler. A musical program featured Mrs. Don Morrison, Margorie Hines and Robi Robinson, accompanied on the piano by Betty Lou Brogdon. Dr. Claude P. Jones, Methodist minister, gave the invocation. Diplomas were given out by Pete Nance, president of the school board.

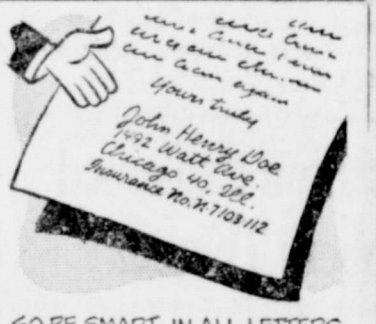

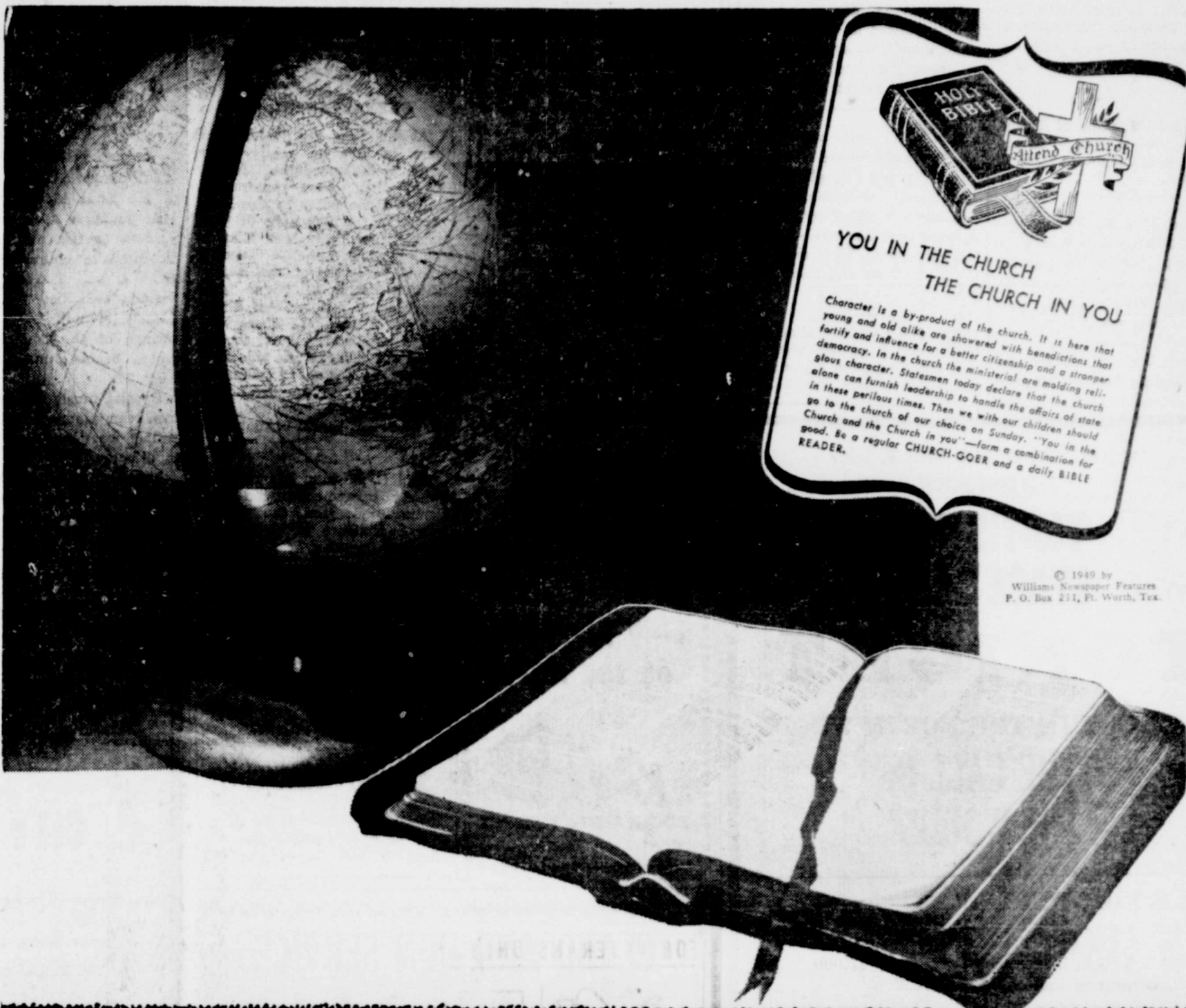
