Cisco Guardsmen Prepare For Camp; Employers Asked To Grant Leaves

Some sixty guardsmen from Cisco plus units from ten surrounding towns, thirteen hundred in all, who compose the Combat A, 49th Armored Division, began arranging with employers and wives this week for their absence during summer maneuvers at North Camp Hood near Gainsville, June 19, to July 3, during which every weapon in the arsenal will get firing workouts.

Tank units will fire their 90 and 76mm guns as well as machine guns from M 28 and M-4A tanks. Armored infantry outfits will shoot individual and crew served weapons, including M1 rifles, carbines, 30 and .50 calibre machine guns and 81 mortar.

The entire division will participate in an overnight march and bivouac, under simulated combat conditions, in which tanks, armored cars and general purpose vehicles will be used. All headquarters units will participate in at least one division controlled command post exercise.

Competition for championships in boxing, softball and volley ball, plus nightly movies and dances, will constitute the camp's recreational program.

Employer co-operation toward the necessary two weeks' absence of guardsmen from their homes has been excellent. State National Guard Headquarters announced Wednesday.

"In only a few isolated instances," the report said, "have employers required that the camp period be considered an employee's vacation; more and more are realizing the importance of this training to their workers, and are classing the period as leave-of-absence rather than vacation. Many also continue the guardsmen on their payrolls for the leave of absence period, just as though they were still on the job, with regular vacation due later."

Rev. Stuart McC. Rohre, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church, who will report to Fort Sam Houston, Texas, for two weeks of active duty training, has received permission to hold his regular Sunday morning service before reporting to the post.

Following the regular morning service Rev. Rohre will report to San Antonio where he will undergo training in the Chaplain's Corps. He holds a Lt. Col's commission in the Organized Reserve Corps.

At the morning hour, Rev. Rohre will speak on the theme: "When the Church Becomes Careless." This month special emphasis is being placed on Home Missions as carried out in the local Presbytery and the Synod.

Building Products Marketing To Be Taught At A&M

A four-year course in Building Products Marketing, an entirely new college curriculum in the Southwest, will be initiated this fall at Texas A&M, said W. B. Henderson of Fort Worth, president of the Lumbermen's Association of Texas.

Texas A&M, with the cooperation of the retail building materials industry, the Lumbermen's Association of Texas, and the National Retail Lumber Dealers Association, developed this comprehensive four-year course to provide specialized education in the marketing of building materials. Leaders in the industry have planned this step for years.

"Installing this course," said Mr. Henderson, "is simply another step in the continuation and expansion of our educational program. For the past two years, we have held highly successful 39-day schools at Southern Methodist University. They proved with both management and students that the desirability of an even more comprehensive course became evident."

"This course will assist management by providing a source of trained manpower. This will help improve business operations, and will reduce the costly expense of on-the-job training. Up until now, a person wanting to enter the building materials field had to learn through trial and error methods. This course will eliminate that."

"In this course, a student will receive fundamental training in Architecture, Engineering, Business and Economics. He will gain practical experience through required yard and store training during the summer and upon graduation, can step right into the building materials field thoroughly grounded in every aspect."

Cotton Machinery To Be Displayed

DALLAS, June 9 — Wednesday, July 27, will be the date of the cotton mechanization session of the tenth annual Cotton Research Congress in Dallas in a change in plans announced by the Texas-wide Cotton Committee of Dallas in order to permit larger attendance of cotton growers.

Burriss C. Jackson, Hillsboro, general chairman of the committee sponsoring the event, which was attended by more than 5,000 persons last year, said today that the two following days of the three-day meeting, July 28-29, will not be changed.

Originally scheduled for Saturday, July 30, the cotton mechanization session was charged to Wednesday after conferences between agricultural leaders, members of the committee and representatives of implement firms developed the desirability of the earlier date.

The machinery exhibits will be displayed at the State Fair of Texas in the Automobile Building Wednesday. Congress sessions the next two days, accompanied by numerous exhibits, will be held at the Baker Hotel.

More extensive exhibits and better display facilities for the machinery session, as well as a full program of timely discussions of cotton subjects, are expected to result in the 1949 Congress exceeding all previous meetings in attendance, Jackson said.

Eastland To Get Organized Reserves

Eastland has been allotted an Organized Reserve Unit, Colonel Oscar B. Abbott, Executive for the Texas Military District, announced Wednesday.

Major Elwood G. Schwartz, Organized Reserve Corps instructor for the Waco area, announced that Captain Augustus D. Clemens of Eastland will command the new unit. Immediate action will be taken to assign the Eastland Unit to the organization for pay purposes, the report said.

Advancement Of Texas Schools Is Anticipated

AUSTIN, June 8 — Texas will soon be among the top ten states in education.

Enactment of the three Gilmer-Aikin bills into law provides the vehicle by which the state will climb from its low rank, it was declared here today by Charles H. Tennyson, public relations director of the Texas State Teachers Association. The organization led the lengthy legislative battle for re-organization of the public school system.

"These measures pave the way for more classrooms and more and better teachers, as well as providing for more equitable distribution of the cost and reviving the top-level administration," Tennyson declared.

"Our children will receive a better education. As a result, our state will be benefited."

Tennyson pointed out that schools which fail to meet the minimum requirements of teachers' and administrators' salaries will not only fail to receive state aid provided in the new laws but that the per capita apportionment, but will be dropped from the accredited list.

There are now 42,500 teachers and 4,000 principals and superintendents in the public school system.

"The new laws pave the way for the addition of 1,500 teachers as soon as physical facilities can be made available."

"This will relieve much of the classroom congestion which is made for substandard education in many of our schools."

The new salary scale for teachers and administrators will do things to provide Texas with a superior educational system, Tennyson also pointed out.

"Texas will be much more attractive to outstanding teachers from all parts of the country," said. "Too, the additional teachers can get for holding masters degrees will send thousands of them to school to get the higher degree."

The greatest enrollment in any year is expected by most Texas colleges and universities in summer in their graduate sessions.

The minimum salary for teachers holding bachelors degrees increased from 2,000 to 3,000 annually. Under the new law, they get \$54 a year additional for the first twelve years teaching. That makes a maximum salary of \$3,051. The old law was \$2,655.

Teachers holding masters degrees will have a minimum salary of \$2,628. The minimum was \$2,228. Their credit of \$54 a year additional for each year of teaching experience now continues twenty-six years instead of five. That makes a maximum salary of \$4,032.

In addition, the law was revised to allow school districts to implement the salary scale set by law. Under old statutes, districts receiving rural, or equalization aid, were forbidden to use the specific salary schedule. Moreover, districts may employ more teachers than allotted by the law if they desire to do so.

140 Oil Wells Are Completed In Week

The Railroad Commission reported Saturday that 140 oil wells had been completed during the past week.

The 1949 total now stands at 3,691 wells completed, compared with 3000 to the same date in 1948.

There were 12 gas wells completed, increasing this total 107 against 258 to the same date last year. Fifty eight dry holes were drilled. Wildcat drillings resulted in four oil wells, four gasers and 39 dry holes. Eight wells were plugged, 58 of them dry, two gas, and oil.
