
2004 Summer **Baseball Camp**



Only 1 in 10 believes that a single standardized test should be used for student promotion.

Today's teacher is spending an average of 13.8 additional hours a week working at homethe most time spent working at home since the survey began-but 69% still don't feel like they have time to prepare.

The top problems they face are discipline (58%) and paperwork (34%).

"Given the stress, the hours, the lack of support, and the inadequate salary, it is no surprise that the teacher shortage is getting worse and that experienced teachers are getting out of the profession," said · TSTA President Donna New Haschke.

"At a time when we are increasing the standards for all of our students and making our tests and graduation requirements tougher, we must have a qualified, certified teacher in every classroom," she said. "As the legislature contemplates matters of funding and debates making changes in the way we operate our schools, at the top of the list must be addressing the issues that are causing our shortage and avoiding any actions like incentives, or elimination of current rights and benefits that would make the situation worse. Education reform that doesn't focus on creating a quality teaching force is doomed to fail our students."



Contacts acceptable in most manufacturing enviroments

More than 34 million Americans wear some type of contact lenses. Of this number, many are employed as part of the industrial workforce. Due to changes in materials, design, fitting, and care procedures, industrial workers are not at any ris for wearing contact lenses as long as they follow appropriate safety guidelines. The Occupational lealth and Safety Administration (OSHA), which is responsible for overseeing the well-being of ndustrial workers, currently recommends against contact lenses only when an individual works with specific chemicals such as acrylonitrile. In order to ensure their safety, however, industrial

workers must wear safety eyewear along with their enses. Contacts, alone, do not provide adequate protection. Workers also need to let their supervisors and other pertinent individuals know they use lenses, in case of injury.

Individuals who wear contacts in a manufacturing setting should also keep another pair of lenses as well as a pair of glasses with the correct prescription on hand, to avoid any problems if they accidently lose a contact while working. It is also recognized that in some unique industrial settings, it may be necessary to wear eyeglasses instead of contact lenses.

30s and 40s. Not every mole is cancerous, but all moles bear watching. Moles that change color or shape, or that itch or bleed, as well as irregular moles, are the ones to be particularly concerned about.

Chances of treating melanoma are greater today then ever before if the disease is caught early. Diagnosis usually requires taking a biopsy (sample) of the affected area. Since melanoma spreads rapidly to other organs, the doctor also may biopsy nearby lymph nodes to check for signs of metastasis (spreading of the cancer).

If the cancer is confined to the skin, minor surgery and regular monitoring may be the only treatments required. However, waiting can result in the need for radical surgery. If other body systems are affected, chemethods may be needed to Prather, minister, officiating. shrink resulting tumors.

District Water Levels Reveal Average Decline

(Reprinted from The High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 Newsletter.)

Revisions To Water Well Rules In Effect

Persons wishing to drill new or replacement water wells within the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 now need to comply with revised district rules that took effect June 9.

At their regular June 8 meeting, the five-member High Plains Water District Board of Directors unanimously approved amended revisions to the district rules, which include:

Water well permit applications accepted before the June 9 rule changes are subject to the previous district rules.

"In this case, landowners have four months to drill their well. A four-month extension may be granted if the driller is delayed due to poor weather or other factors. Scattered storms over the past week have provided more than a few producers with just what they needed in terms of moisture to either germinate recently planted seed or to keep young stands adequately supplied with moisture.

Unfortunately, those same storms brought some people more than they bargained for when they sent in their request for rain. As a result some producers are dealing with crop loss situations and the need to move forward with crop insurance claims on damaged or destroyed acreage.

Each year when these situations arise the potential for confusion exists as producers and insurance providers begin wading through the rules to determine what can or cannot be done and when.

While the 2004 crop year includes a new rule that applies to secondary crops and insurance coverage, the provisions that apply to appraisals on crops remain unchanged. For crops damaged or lost to adverse weather events, or that fail to emerge, the rules remain the same as they were in 2003.

The most confusing situations generally involve non-emerged seed. Over the past couple of years there have been several changes in the rules that apply to non-emerged seed and how acreage that is caught in this situation is treated.

For emerged crops the rules have not changed significantly for several years and allow for timely appraisal of damaged or destroyed acreage, especially if that damage occurs after the applicable final planting date.

Generally speaking any crop planted before the final planting date that emerges to a stand is eligible to receive an adjustment almost immediately after the loss event is reported to the insurance company.

In order to allow for a proper evaluation most appraisals are scheduled 3-5 days after the damage report is received. This allows the adjuster to see how well damaged acreage rebounds from the event.

The bottom-line for producers that have recently lost standing cotton to high winds, localized flooding or hail is that a minimal waiting period can be expected before an adjustment is made, but the process can be put into motion immediately after the damage report is submitted to insurance.

Northwest Plains Pest Management News

Wheat harvest is going full bore in dryland and is picking up in irrigated fields. Preliminary yields of some of the better-looking dryland wheat are in the 30 to 40 bushel per acre range. Some lodging has occurred in some of the heavily irrigated wheat, but in most cases it is isolated to small areas.

Area corn is growing through itself. Most corn is relatively pest free at this time. There have been a few mites reported in some isolated areas. Natural enemies are abundant in most fields, most numerous are minute pirate bugs, ladybugs, and thrips.

Thrips pressure in cotton has subsided this week. Most fields continue to be infested but nowhere near levels of last week. Good control of thrips was achieved with the foliar insecticide applications, and most treated fields remain relatively clean. Untreated cotton was hammered by thrips. There have been a few beet armyworms spotted in area cotton, none at treatable levels.

Many cotton fields are approaching the 5th true leaf stage and some have surpassed it. This is a critical time for the Roundup Ready varieties. Do not apply Glyphosate over the top of Roundup Ready cotton once the 5th true leaf is the size of a quarter. Applications after this stage may result in yield loss and or delayed maturity. Any late over-the-top applications should be considered only as a last resort to salvage a crop. When counting true leaves remember to exclude the cotyledon or seed leaves. These are the first to expand after emergence and are attached directly across from each other. Wind has made Glyphosate applications difficult at best. Ignite has performed well in LibertyLink cotton this far. Not to say there has not been a glitch or two, most of which are directly related to coverage issues. There are reports of antagonistic effects with some drift reduction additives. Outstanding results were achieved on local research trials last year using 32 oz. of Ignite in 20 gallons of water per acre. The water was treated with 17 lbs. of ammonium sulfate per 100 gallons. Again coverage is key and is directly affected by total spray volume per acre, nozzle type, and vegetation density (weeds, crop, cover crop). Coverage could be a problem in cover crops. Any and all measures to maximize coverage should be strictly adhered to. The Ignite label states a minimum of 15 gallons per acre of total spray volume should be applied, but under adverse conditions, such as a dense cover crop, more gallons per acre may provide better coverage thus better weed control.

> "It is not the district's intent to create undue hardship for producers," said Conkwright. "However, there have been an increasing number of water wells being drilled along property lines within the water district. For producers that have cotton in the ground but do not receive adequate moisture to bring the crop to a stand, insurance rules are different and require a specific waiting period after the final planting date before an appraisal can be scheduled.

For non-emerged seed the current rule states that no adjustment can be made until after the end of an 8-day deferred appraisal period that begins at the end of the crop's late planting period. For cotton, that means that non-emerged acreage cannot be appraised for 23 days after the applicable final planting date.

For counties with a June 5 final planting date, insurance appraisals on non-emerged acreage will begin no sooner than June 28. For counties with a June 10 final planting date appraisals cannot begin until July 3.

In the past the additional waiting period after the 15-day late planting period has been revised by RMA. Whether or not a similar relief from the rules will be allowed in 2004 has yet to be determined although it appears the situation could develop that warrants such consideration.

New Double Insurance Provision Adds New Twist For 2004

While the rules that pertain to crop damage and appraisals have not changed from 2003 to 2004, there has been one important change that will affect producers who lose crops early in the 2004 season.

In 2004 growers who wish to plant a second crop on failed cotton acreage will have to make several important decisions that could impact the level of coverage they receive on their first crop.

The crux of the change involves the implementation of a new "double insurance" provision that was originally included in the Agricultural Risk Protection Act of 2000. The purpose for the new rule is to prevent a producer from collecting crop insurance indemnity payments for multiple crop losses on the same acre in the same crop year.

The final rule, as implemented, requires for the first time that growers who lose their first insured crop may only receive 35 percent of the calculated indemnity (and only pay 35 percent of the first crop premium) if they elect to plant a second insured crop on the same acreage.

In an attempt to provide more discretion to the grower that incurs an early season loss, Plains Cotton Growers and the National Cotton Council worked with the Risk Management Agency to craft an alternative that gives the growers more flexibility.

The result of that effort was inclusion of an option that the grower can exercise to receive 100 percent of the first crop indemnity if they elect not to insure a subsequent crop on the acreage during the balance of the growing season.

Growers that lose crops early in the season have the following options. They can: 1) Opt not to take insurance on a subsequently planted crop. This option is to be exercised on a unit-by-unit basis and the producer must make their insurance provider aware of their decision before the acreage reporting date for the second crop or when the claim is signed for the first insured crop; or, 2) Insure the second crop, but decline to accept any second crop claim payment. Producers who insure a second crop but later choose not to accept payment for a second crop claim will receive the remaining 65 percent of their first crop claim less the remaining 65 percent of the premium due on the first crop and 100 percent of the premium due on the second crop. Producers may decline to accept a second crop indemnity up until the time the claim check is cashed.

As stated before, wind has been a problem getting herbicide applications out. Do not let the need to get a herbicide application out cloud your judgment on environmental conditions (wind, humidity, temperature, etc.). Grass crops are very sensitive to Glyphosate as broadleaf crops are to the hormone herbicides not to mention all the other available products.


