The "fogger", so called sine the machine sprays with a fog mist spouting, will be using deadly chemicals, designed to put down the Fly and Mospueto menace. But, said a department official the chemical is deadly to gold fish.

Owners of fish were urged by the city to take precaution by covering up the acquariam when the machine is being used in the vicinity. The city will be doing their part to warn residents of its approaching too. A loudspeaker will be mounted on the truck warning residents of its approach.

#### Grain Crop Damaged

One of the county's largest grain crops in recent years was standing in muddy fields awaiting suitable harvesting weather, according to Emmett Powell, ounty AAA Administrator, who reported that heavy winds and rains had seriously damaged the crops in some areas.

Approximately 20,000 acres vere planted to small grains this year; and falling grain, and rust will cut the yield as high as 40 per cent in some areas. Oats were particularly suffering needed harvesting badly.
