F.B.I. AGENT TALKS TO ROTARIANS AT NOON LUNCHEON THURSDAY

"Crime is on a gradual increase in the United States today, mostly in the smaller communities of the country," declared J. W. Shepard, special agent for the Federal Bureau of Investigation, before the Thursday luncheon of the Cisco Rotary Club.

Speaking at the Victor Hotel, Shepard, son of Mr. and Mrs. F. E. Shepard of Cisco, outlined a brief history of the FBI organization and its gigantic task in post war days.

"Surveys show the youth at the age of 21 is most likely to get involved in crime," Shepard said. "These are the delinquents

who were at the ages of 16, 17 and 18 during the war."

On the whole, Shepard said, parents are looking after their children today, and that will, in years to come, decrease this nation's crime wave.

Stationed at El Paso, near the White Sands proving grounds for jet propelled missiles, Shepard had great praise for the work of Cisco civic clubs and the ABC athletic program now underway.

"But, he warned, 'you cannot let the organizations collapse. They must continue their planned and systematic program.' Intensive training on the part of the organizations must be held at a peak.

Shepard, who graduated from Cisco High School in 1931, and the University of Texas in 1936, joined the FBI in March of 1941. During the early phases of the

war, he figured largely in the capture of German agents who landed near Miami, Florida, from submarines.

The guest speaker, introduced by Rev. Claude P. Jones, said

the FBI force of some 2,500 agents was continuing activities the same as in the war. He indicated Un-American activities were going on in this country more so than during the war. Guests at the luncheon included

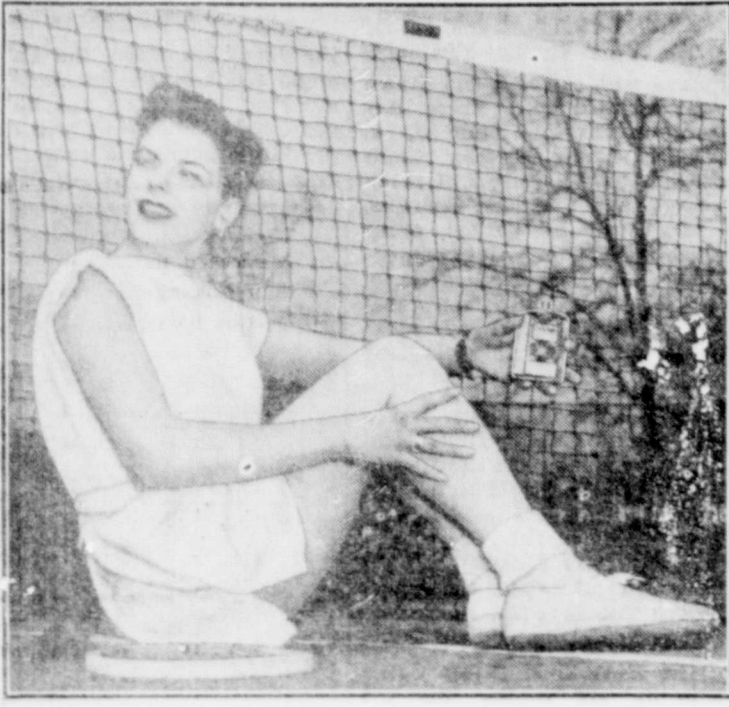

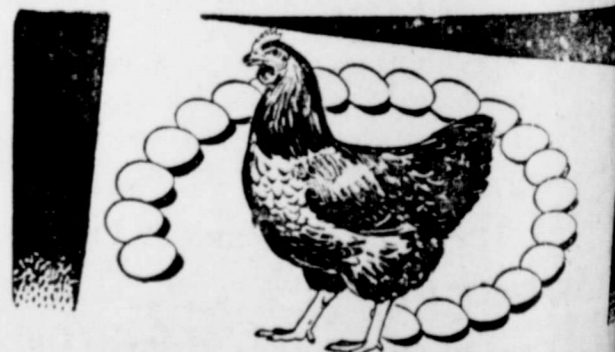
