New Sign Tells Of Highway 80

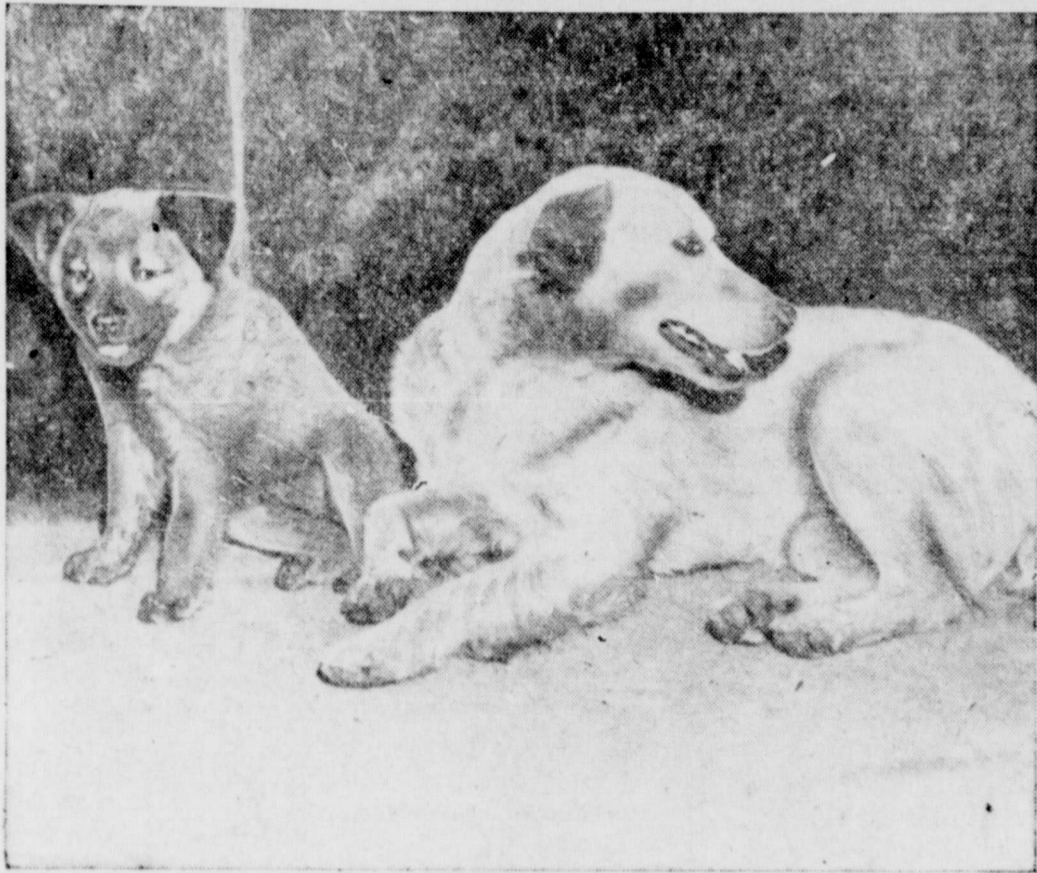
Ranger, July 12 - A large, attractive sign to route the stream of tourists over U. S. Highway 80 is being erected three miles east of Weatherford.

NEW ELLENBURGE R WELL OPENS UP SECTION NORTHEAST OF TOWN

The completion of a new Ellenburger well in Stephens County, approximately 15 miles northeast of Cisco was announced recently by McElroy Ranch Company of Fort Worth.

The new well is the R. W. Tipton No. 1. It is located 360 feet from the west and 467 feet from the north line of section 5 block 3, T&P survey.

On test it flowed 251 barrels of 42.5 gravity oil in 24 hours. The flow was from 72 casing perforations at 4,325-43 feet. The total depth was 4,565.

The Fort Worth company has extensive holdings in Eastland and Stephens Counties and plan further operations in the area. They are now engaged in exploring some of their holdings north and west of Cisco.

Entry cards for the various divisions, including a number from men, are arriving faster than for any previous Fair, and indications point to larger, more interesting exhibits in all phases, Mrs. Jarrett said.

Lone Star Will Seek Shallow Oil

Lone Star Production Company today reported plans to seek shallow oil production in Eastland County in the drilling of their No. 14 Sibley near the city of Eastland. In the test, they will seek oil from the 100-800 foot level.

Location is 425 feet from the east line and 268 feet south of the north line of Section 19. Some ten years ago, an oil pay formation was encountered at about 800 feet when the company drilled a deep well in that area. Testing of the shallow sand was decided upon after the deeper pay has played out, it was understood.

Governor's Death Regretted Here By Ciscoans

Ciscoans, both friends and political opponents, were shocked here Monday by the sudden death of Beauford Halbert Jester, 56, serving his second term as Governor of Texas.

"Texas has lost the services of a wonderful man, a wonderful governor, in the death of Mr. Jester," said Charles Spears, bank president. "From close relationship with the Governor during college, he had an outstanding personality. He gave his life for Texas, anyone knows that."

"Although I didn't know him personally, Governor Jester was one of the friendliest Governors Texas had in some time," remarked Charles Sandler, Cisco businessman. "It was through my son, Melvin, who attended Texas University last year, that I know of the Governor's personal traits. He was down to level with the people."

Leon Maner, druggist, said Mr. Jester's death caused a great loss to the people of Texas. "I knew him when we went to college together at Texas University. I watched his career. Not only was he a strong-hearted governor, but he was a man, liked by all," Maner said.

"Texas suffered a loss, a great loss," said B. A. Butler, Cisco Chamber of Commerce manager. "Mr. Jester was in the midst of great accomplishments. Like most Texans, he was strong. I feel Allen Shivers can step into his shoes ably."

"Of course, everyone was surprised in Governor Jester's death," commented Eugene Lankford, Cisco Attorney. "Mr. Jester will be remembered by the people of this state as a strong leader with a straight character. Although I didn't agree with him on several things, nevertheless, he made Texas a real governor during his time."

Mayor G. C. Rosenthal said Governor Jester's untimely death came in the midst of his good work, "just when the accomplishments he had struggled for were beginning to take shape. His loss will be great to the state, not only as a fine governor but a fine man."

Omar Burleson Calls For Relief For Former POWs

Congressman Omar Burleson today called upon President Truman to take immediate steps to put into effect the law recently passed by Congress which will give relief to those veterans who were prisoners of war, the payment of compensation for which is to come from enemy assets impounded by this country on the Declaration of War.

Congressman Burleson told the President that he had a number of former prisoners of war veterans in his district who were entitled to receive such funds, and that he hoped the President would find it feasible to set up the machinery provided in the law to make payment to those veterans.

Congressman Burleson stated that under existing legislation, the compensation allowed to any veteran - or if deceased, to his next of kin would be at the rate of \$100 for each day he was held as prisoner of war on which the enemy failed to furnish him adequate food, as provided under the terms of the Geneva Convention of June 27, 1929.

State Fair Has Added 126 New Swine Pens

The State Fair of Texas has added 126 new swine pens for the 1949 exposition, in a move to heighten interest in the swine show still further this year, Ben E. Cabell, chairman of the State Fair's livestock committee, has announced.

A total of 282 pens will be available for the 1949 show, insuring facilities unexcelled anywhere in the nation, Cabell said.

The show will be held in Dallas October 8 - 16, with judging on October 10, 11 and 12. Premiums totaling \$5,500 are offered for breeding swine, and \$2,750 for fat barrows.

Thursday October 15, has been designated as Texas Swine Breeders Day at the Fair. On that day the Texas Swine Breeders Association will sponsor an all-breed swine sale. Program for the day is being planned by W. Walker, president, and E. M. Regenbrecht, secretary of the association.

Polio struck Cisco the past week-end and a four year old girl was in a Fort Worth hospital where she was under going treatment for the dread disease.

Billie Burke, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charlie Burke was taken to the Polio center in Fort Worth after her illness was diagnosed as Polio by a local physician. The child became ill Friday and was taken to Fort Worth Saturday.

An examination by doctors in Fort Worth confirmed the report of the local physician and the child was given immediate treatment. She responded to the treatments and attendants reported that her condition was good.

A late report stated that unless complications arose there would be no permanent injury. Quick action on the part of the local doctor in rushing her to the center for treatment was credited with saving the child from serious effects.

Mr. and Mrs. Burke accompanied her to Fort Worth where she will remain for approximately three weeks. Mr. Burke plans to return to Cisco Thursday.

Meanwhile the city sanitation department was stepping up its activities in spraying the town with DDT, using the recently purchased fog machine. The machine operates on an eight hour schedule and makes a continuous round of the city streets and alleys.

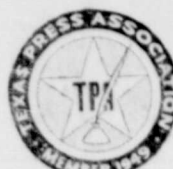

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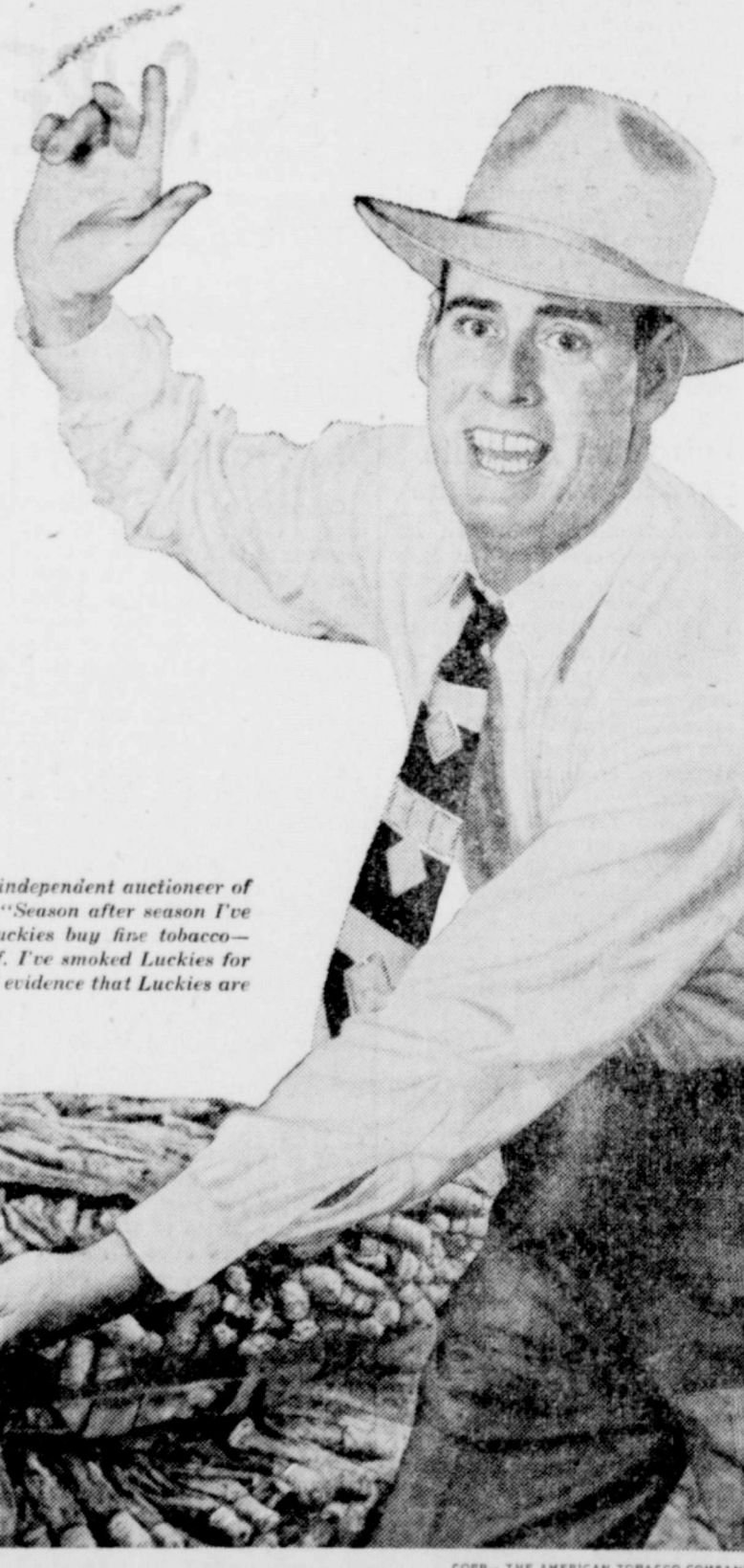

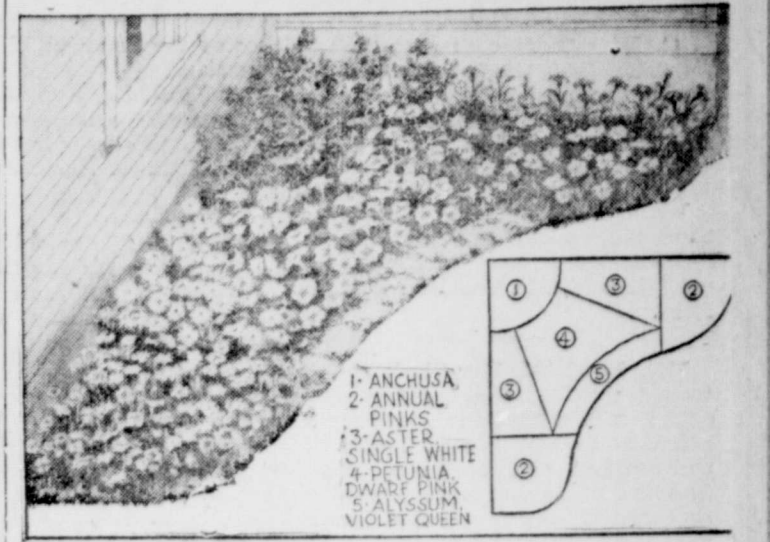
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Flowers and Sunshine Brighten Up House Corner



When a corner is formed in a modern small home, where a wing or a porch joins the main structure, planting is called for to soften the sharp angle. Instead of shrubs, or evergreens, which would usually grow so tall as to obscure neighboring windows, a charming effect can be produced by a small bed of brightly colored annual flowers. In this location it is necessary to make sure the bed will have adequate sunshine and water. If there are no plants or buildings nearby, which would shade the spot, then even a north exposure might have plenty of sun for annual flowers. But do not expect to grow annuals, if there is shade from nearby trees or shrubs, and the competition of their roots. Where a house has overhanging eaves, a location near the wall may receive little rainfall, and thus will require more frequent watering with the hose. Many houses are now built without this overhang, however, and most of the rainfall will be received by flower beds close to the wall. A pink and blue color scheme is used in the planting illustrated.

Annual anchusa planted in the corner will grow two feet tall, bear dark blue flowers resembling forget-me-nots. Cynoglossa which has similar flowers will longer flowering season, may be used in place of anchusa. White single asters, and pink tumbles are placed in front of the blue forget-me-not blooms, and the edge of the bed are alyssum violet pinks, and the beautiful annual pinks. A bed like this will be a joy summer long. It will take care, beyond keeping the flowers removed. Not only will house be provided with an attractive floral frame, but there will be an abundance of cut flowers for doors. The great advantage of flowers rather than shrubs and evergreen about small modern houses is that the buildings are not dwarfed tall plants nearby, sunshine is lowered full access to the house; the flowers, and the windows not screened by plants, but give unobstructed view of the attract flower bed and other outdoor facts.
