Twenty women employees of West Texas Utilities Company's Abilene headquarters offices will spend the week-end at Lake Cisco for their annual outing.

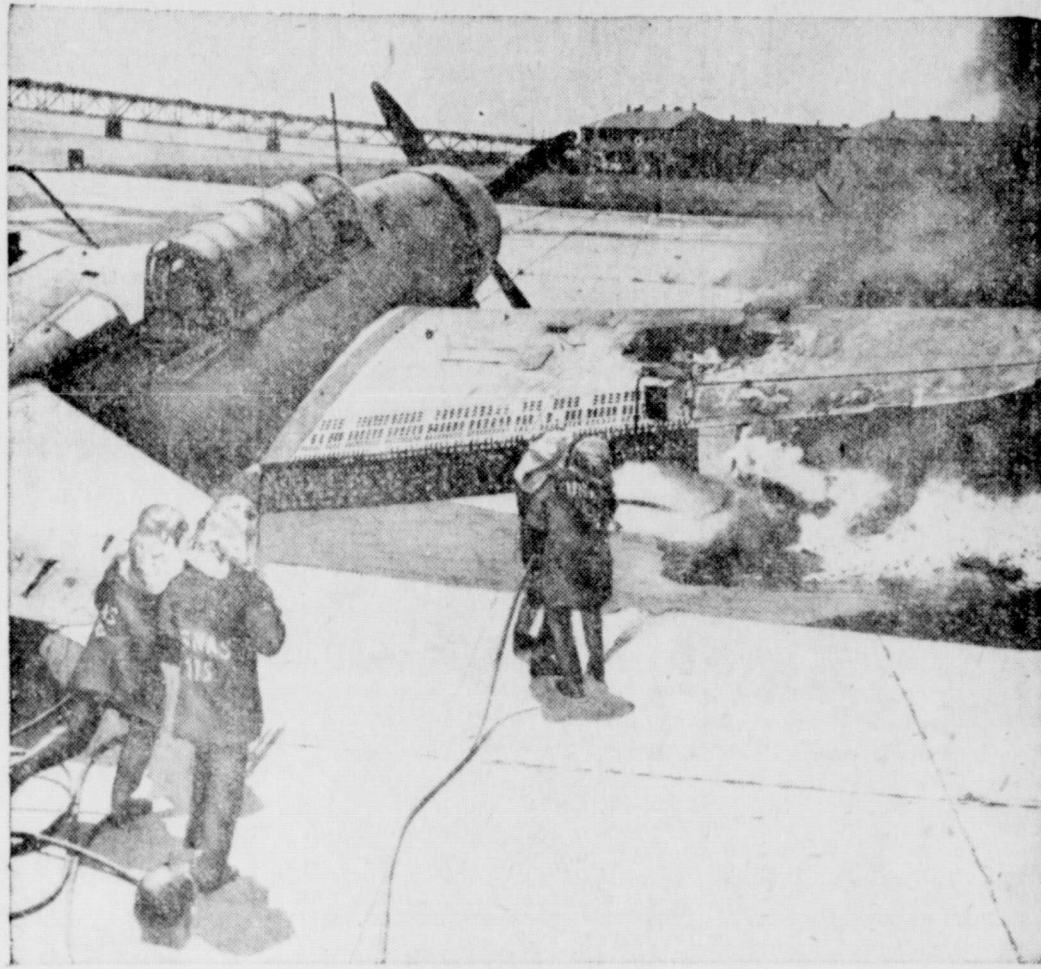
ABC DIRECTORS DECIDE TO POSTPONE DECISION ON DISPUTED GAME

Directors of the ABC Club Tuesday at their weekly luncheon voted to withhold a verdict, pending further hearings, on the current Humble Oilers - Empire dispute over Monday night's Commercial League softball game.

The dispute arose Monday night at Chesley Field when managers of the Oiler team protested Empire E. L. Jackson's decision to award the win to Putnam, the opposing team, by a score of 7-0.

Jackson, who is also a director for the club, told the committee Tuesday that the incident was unavoidable, that he forfeited the game to Putnam after the Oilers continued to delay the game, despite his warnings.

Earl Cumba, acting manager for the Oilers, filed a note of protest before the ABC directors.

Rev. Stuart Rohre Accepts Pastorate Of Rusk Church

Rev. Stuart McC. Rohre, minister of the First Presbyterian Church in Cisco announced Wednesday that he had accepted a call to the First Presbyterian Church in Rusk, Texas, and that he would move to that city with his family soon after August 1.

He assumed the pastorate of the local Church in 1946 soon after he was separated from the armed service, having spent almost five and a half years on active duty as a Chaplain.

Rev. Rohre requested the local congregation to concur with him in asking the Presbytery to dissolve the pastoral relationship. A congregational meeting was held on July 10 and it was agreed to comply with Mr. Rohre's request.

A meeting of the Mid-Texas Presbytery was held at 10 a. m. today at the local church and the group voted to dissolve the pastoral relationship and approve the transfer to the Brazos group accompanied by a recommendation.

Rusk is a town of approximately 5,000 population. It is near Jacksonville in East Texas. Rev. Rohre said that the Church there had a slightly larger membership than Cisco. His pastorate here will terminate on August 1.

Peach Harvest In Full Swing Thousands Of Bushels Shipped

The peach harvest near Cisco is in full swing and thousands of bushels of the fruit have already found their way to markets in the larger cities, it was reported by local growers.

The crop this year was the best in the history of the industry. Early rains were beneficial to growers and was instrumental in making the fruit among the finest in the nation.

This area is fast becoming known as the peach center of Texas and the fruit is in demand by wholesalers in most sections of the country. Hundreds of bushels have been shipped to chain markets, with stores all over Texas.

One eastern concern desired a contract for the entire crop, but failure on the part of some growers in the southern part of the county to cooperate resulted in splitting the business among Texas concerns.

Hundreds of acres have been turned over to growing of the fruit with five growers controlling more than half of the acreage. Growers reported that prices have ranged from \$3.00 to \$4.00 per bushel on grade one fruit and slightly lower for those too ripe to ship.

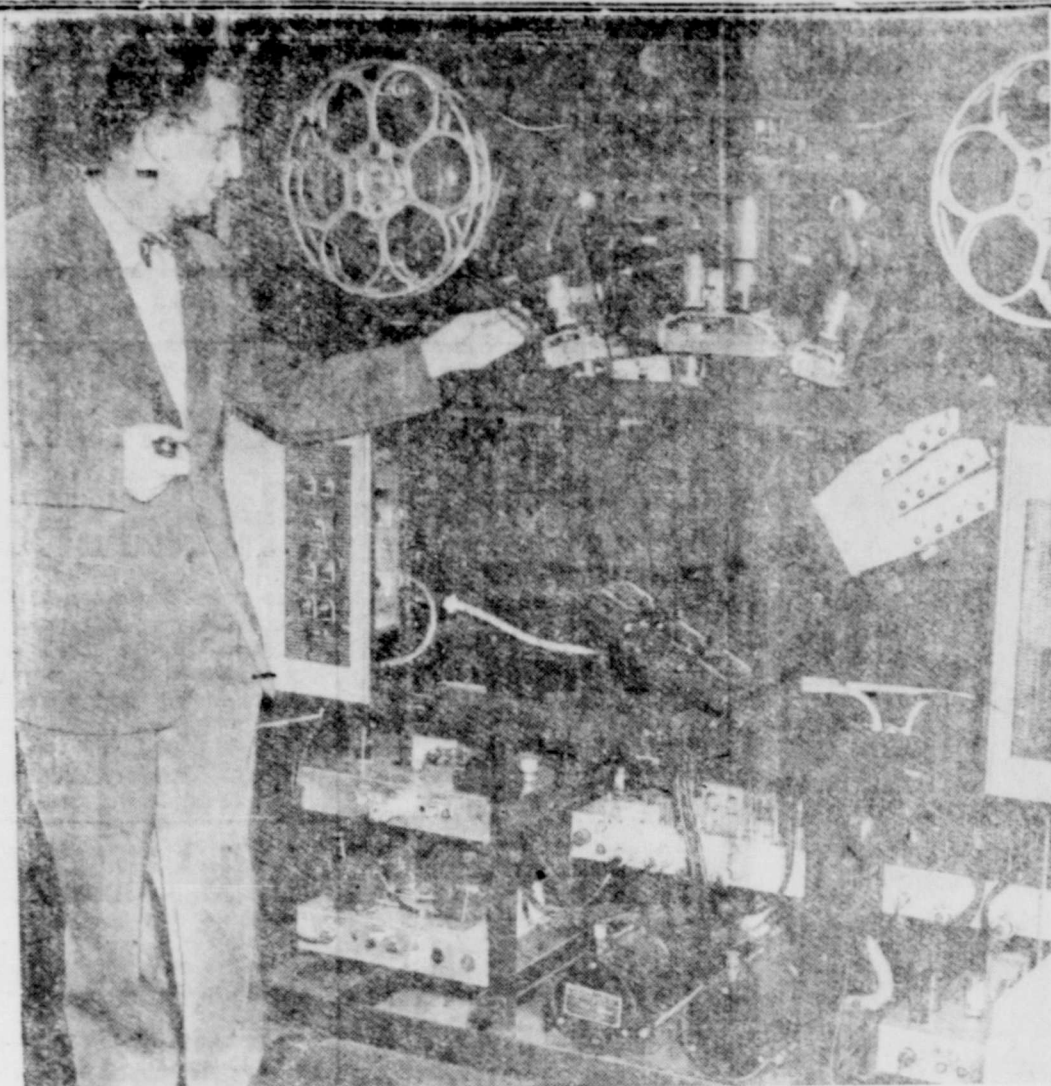

Mrs. Hailey Hostess to WSCS Circle One

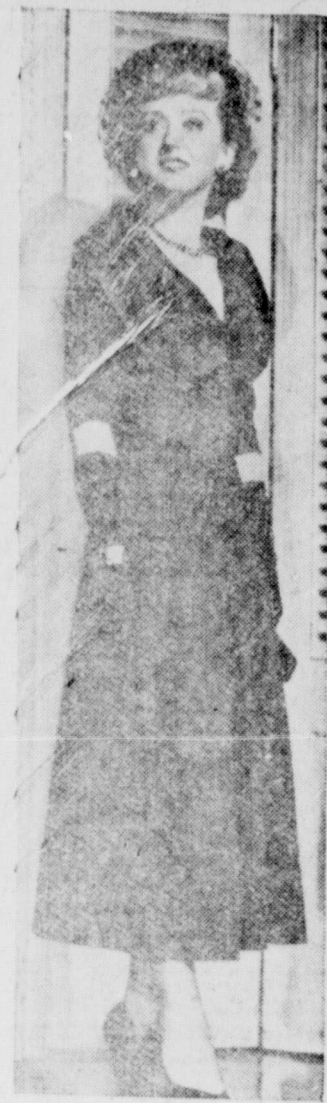

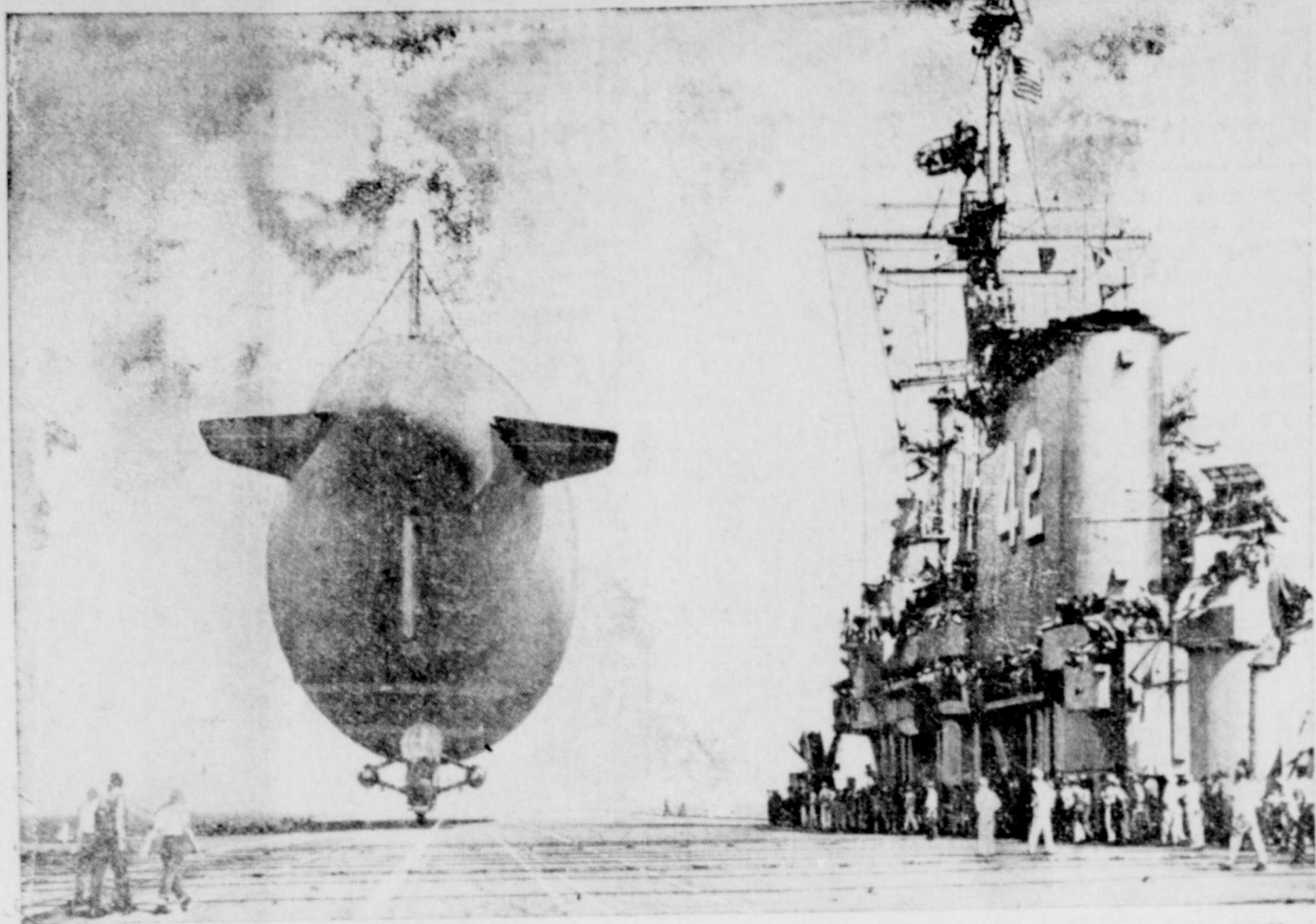

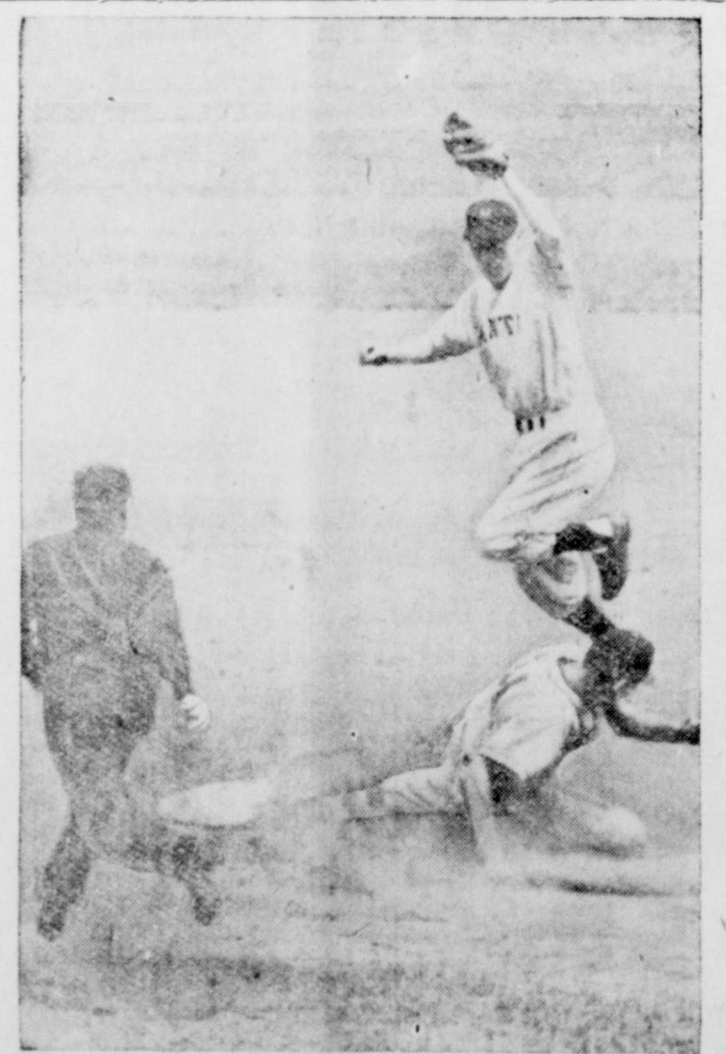
