

35 Years Later

On July 16, 1969, three men began a voyage that would forever change our world, and mark their place in the history books. They were aboard the Apollo 11 spacecraft that launched from Cape Kennedy with a simple mission objective: "Perform a manned lunar landing and return safely."

On July 20, just four days after jettisoning into orbit, Neil Armstrong and Buzz Aldrin became the first humans to step foot on another planet. Their lunar module, Eagle, touched down in the Sea of Tranquility on the moon, while the third crew member, Michael Collins, the pilot and navigator for the mission, orbited above in the command module Columbia.

The first words uttered on the moon, "That's one small step for a man, one giant leap for mankind," have become synonymous with space exploration and the innately American drive to continue that spirit of discovery. The two astronauts traversed the moon's surface collecting the first ever lunar samples, taking photographs and conducting experiments. Four days later they reentered the earth's atmosphere, splashing into the Pacific Ocean where they were greeted by the aircraft carrier, Hornet, a beaming President Nixon, and a nation overflowing with goodwill, pride, and patriotism.

I was a young television reporter in Houston, when I covered the heroic Apollo 11 astronauts and their families during the 1969 moon landing. Since that time I've been an enthusiastic backer of manned space exploration and in my 11 years in the Senate I've worked hard to ensure America keeps pushing the envelope; maintaining our space program as a top priority, and assuring our technological edge in the world continues.

Our world has changed significantly since Neil Armstrong took the giant leap for mankind 35 years ago and many of the changes have been fueled by discoveries made in space. Microchips, satellite communication, cordless appliances, CAT scans and guided missiles were all advanced by the knowledge we gained in space. Even that initial lunar landing produced discoveries such as the knowledge that the moon is lifeless, containing no living organisms, fossils, or native organic compounds, enabling us to learn more about the world that surrounds us.

After the Space Shuttle Columbia disaster last year, we've been forced to reevaluate our space program and infuse NASA with a renewed mission and objective for the future of space exploration. This year President Bush unveiled a new vision for NASA, committing the U.S. to a long-term human and robotic program to explore the solar system, beginning with a return to the moon that will enable future explorations of Mars and other destinations. His proposals offer tremendous potential to further research in energy, geology, and other fields. This spring the robotic rover, Opportunity, discovered that there was once water on Mars and therefore possible life.

And all the while, NASA has continued its missions into space. Just last month the Cassini spacecraft successfully entered orbit around Saturn. The mission, taking place 934 million miles away from earth, and with the cooperation of our partners at the European Space Agency and the Italian Space Agency, began seven years ago when the craft first left Cape Canaveral in 1997. For the next four years the Cassini will orbit Saturn, executing 52 close encounters with seven of the planet's 31 known moons. This mission is just one slice of the amazing work being conducted by the scientists, researchers, and astronauts who strive to keep discovery in the forefront of our consciousness.

This month as we celebrate the 35th anniversary of man's first footsteps on the moon, we commemorate Apollo 11, the pioneers who manned it and the great spirit of discovery that still dwells in us today. It also reminds us that staying in the forefront of space exploration will help us grow the economy and maintain defense prowess. With an ambitious plan in place, the 21st century could bring untold discoveries.

The technical term for a lazy eye is amblyopia." People with amblyopia will usually have dramatically reduced vision in one eye relative to the other. It's not that the lazy eye isn't healthy. It just never "learned" to see properly.

Before children reach six years of age, their visual system is still developing. If a sharp image is not received by one of the eyes because of a serious need for glasses, this weaker eye is hindered in its proper vision development. An eye that is crossed can also cause a lazy eye. Here, both eyes receive two very different mages, so the brain "shuts off" the information from the crossed eye. If the problem isn't properly dealt with before the age of six, it will be very difficult to develop normal vision. For this reason, it's highly recommended you have your children's eyes examined first around age three. If you notice a head turn, crossed eyes, or squinting from your child, have the child examined immediately.

NCC Chairman Lays Groundwork for Industry's WTO Appeal; PCG Board Adopts 04-05 Budget

LUBBOCK, July 9, 2004

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During its first scheduled meeting of the organization's 2004-2005 fiscal year, the Plains Cotton Growers Board of Directors received front row seats at the unveiling of the U.S. cotton industry's response to the report issued by the Panel that heard arguments in the Brazil/WTO cotton dispute.

National Cotton Council Chairman Woody Anderson of Colorado City, Texas, provided the PCG Board an update on NCC activities and highlighted his remarks by laying what is expected to be the foundation of the U.S.'s appeal of the World Trade Organization Panel's decision on the case.

Anderson was quick to reiterate that, even though the initial WTO ruling went against the United States, the outcome of the case is still very much in doubt. The appeal process will take several months to complete and a final ruling developed.

Anderson's remarks pointed out that the WTO panel's findings were clearly based on flawed arguments that ignored the reality of how the U.S. cotton program works, its true impact on the world situation and how the rapid decline of the U.S. textile sector has shifted the way cotton is bought and sold around the

The NCC response is clearly aimed at providing a reality check during the appeal process for the WTO and those who have been conveniently critical of the U.S. cotton program and ignored more than a few pertinent facts.

As additional details of the Brazil ruling are allowed into the light it appears that the ruling, and the analysis upon which it was based, could be cannon fodder for the United States Trade office and the cotton industry to shoot down at will.

In other business the PCG Board adopted a 2004-2005 operating budget of \$638,454.90 to support the organization's ongoing legislative, regulatory and cotton research programs. PCG began its new fiscal year July 1.

The PCG Board received updates on several important issues and caught itself up on the status of the High Plains crop. Highlighting reports to the PCG Board was a recap of the legal challenge filed by importers against the Cotton Research & Promotion Program from current Cotton Board Chairman Kent Nix of Lamesa.

Nix noted that the industry's defense of the program continues to move forward and offered a word of thanks for the leadership and participation of both Texas Cotton Producers and Plains Cotton Growers in the defense effort.

Texas Agricultural Statistics Service Director Robin Roark discussed results of the 2002 Census of Agriculture and explained how some of the statistical and informational products published by the agency are developed. Joining Roark was Greg Thessen, Field Crops Section Head with the National Agricultural Statistics Service, and Troy Joshua, Lead Cotton Statistician, from Washington, DC.

Thessen brought the PCG Board up to speed on the methodology used to develop the Average Prices Received by growers and the estimation of how much cotton is marketed by month in the United States.

Following considerable discussion on the information provided by Thessen, the PCG Board approved the development of a committee to work with NASS representatives to evaluate the accuracy of current price and volume estimation procedures and implement improvements wherever possible.

A Weighted Average Price Received by growers is calculated from NASS data used to determine the Counter-Cyclical component of the current farm program.



Kalyn will be a 5th grade student at Friona elementary this year. She is also active in Little Dribblers basketball and shows lambs for the Friona FFA.


