

School officials said they were anxious to avoid the situation that developed last April when common school districts with the Cisco district was held. In that election, and in spite of the fact that the question was explained through the press and otherwise, a great deal of misinformation was carried about, with the result that a part of the districts was lost, they pointed out.

"If Cisco people will just come out and vote tomorrow, we again," they said. "We certainly believe that our people do not

tax rates and bond support is being carried out under the terms of sweeping schools reorganization legislation enacted by the islature, it was explained. Under this legislation, certain requirements must be met if the schools are able to receive state as Cisco. aid and operate at all.

One requirement is that there shall be no "dormant" school districts, or those in which no school is conducted. All such districts must be attached to and make a part of an active district. This is done by the county board and, under certain conditions, by elections, which, if they fail to carry, are superseded by the arbitrary action of the county board. This was demonstrated in the election last April when, after the vote to consolidate with the Cisco district failed to carry, most of the districts were at tached to the Cisco district by board order. The result is that the Cisco district includes most of the common districts hitherto served by contract, but only af-


