Omar Burleson At Bedside Of Mother In Abilene

Congressman Omar Burleson was called to the bedside of his mother, Mrs. J. M. Burleson of Anson, who recently suffered a heart attack and is seriously ill in an Abilene Hospital.

Mr. Burleson stated prior to his departure that he regretted that he would be away from Washington during the voting on important wage and hour legislation under consideration in Congress at this time.

Congressman Burleson stated that his efforts had been directed at defeating the administration sponsored measure and that he had planned to support amendments, such as the one offered by Congressman Lucas of Fort Worth, which would act to secure a more equitable law.

"It is my hope," he stated, "that circumstances will permit my returning to Washington in time to hear the testimony of the joint Chiefs of Staff before the Foreign Affairs Committee, relative to their conference, now in progress, with representatives of the North Atlantic Pact countries."

Reports from the Abilene hospital stated that the condition of Mrs. Burleson remained critical but that she had rested better Monday.

More Than Three Inches Fall Here Through Tuesday

Cooling rains which began falling early Sunday had deposited more than three inches of much needed moisture on Cisco and the surrounding area Tuesday morning, assuring peanut growers of a banner yield for 1949.

The rains, which fell in gentle showers, soaked rapidly into the parched ground and came at a time when it was most needed. Peanut farmers needed the rain to assure top yield. Late feed was benefitted and cotton was made. Farmers who had sowed fall grains were jubilant and city residents rejoiced because the rains dropped the temperatures and benefitted late gardens and flowers.

City lakes were benefitted greatly by the rains that fell early Tuesday, as most of the fall ran off into the streams which feed them. Lake Cisco caught several inches of water and it was still running in at noon Tuesday. The city was assured of ample water for two to three years.

The rains brought a tinge of fall to the air as the mercury tumbled to record lows. The high for Sunday was 83 and the low Sunday night was 71. The high Monday was 84 and the low for Monday night was 69.

Additional showers were forecast for Tuesday and Wednesday as moist air from the coastal area moved northward. The temperatures were expected to remain in the 80s for a few days as a new cool front was moving in from the Rocky Mountain area.

Triple A officials reported that between 48,000 and 49,000 acres in Eastland County were planted to peanuts this year as compared with approximately 54,000 during 1948; and Assistant County Agent Ed Steel stated that the yield should more than double that of 1948.

County Loses Suit To Ban Meters Near Courthouse

District Judge George L. Davenport, in a session of the 91st District Court, Monday dissolved a temporary restraining order granted the County of Eastland against the City of Eastland and the Magee-Hale Park-Q-Meter Company of Oklahoma, prohibiting the installation of parking meters around the Eastland County Courthouse. More than 150 spectators jammed into the courtroom.

While the City of Eastland, defendants in the suit, were handed the decision, they agreed in open court not to install meters around the courthouse until requested to do so by the County Commissioners, City Attorney John Turner said.

The hearing to consider a permanent injunction started at 10 o'clock and lasted for about an hour with both the City Commission and the Commissioners' Court in attendance.

Before rendering his decision, Judge Davenport said, while the law was on the side of the defendants, equity was on the side of the county.

The City of Eastland is now operating more than 400 parking meters. They went into effect Monday.

There are many variations of the Spanish type peanut being grown in Eastland County, at the present time, Cooper said.

Peanut farmers over the county are invited to attend the meeting and hear the results of the station's experimental work with peanuts.

LEGAL NOTICE

An ordinance relating to traffic and regulating the use of public streets within the City of Cisco, Texas, prescribing regulations to the parking of vehicles upon such streets, providing for the use of parking meters, defining and establishing parking meter zones, the regulation, control, and in-

spection of parking meters, and providing that time of parking vehicles on streets shall be measured by parking meters; providing for enforcement hereof, and for penalties for violation, for repealing conflicting ordinances, and declaring an emergency.

WHEREAS, because of congested traffic conditions that now exist and have existed for a long period of time on the streets of the City of Cisco due to the numerous motor vehicles using the said streets and because of the custom and habit of the operators of said vehicles of parking the same for a long period of time in close proximity to the other motor vehicles on the most congested parts of the streets in the business section of the municipality; and congested parts of the streets in the business section of the said municipality, and . . .

BE IT ORDAINED by the City Commission of the City of Cisco, State of Texas: . . .

Section 2. Congested area. For the purpose of this ordinance the "congested traffic area" is hereby declared to be on AVENUE D, AVENUE E, AVENUE F, and M. K. & T. R. O. W. and CROSS AVENUES and STREETS BETWEEN 3rd and 10th STREETS, AT SUCH PLACES AS THE CITY COMMISSION MAY DESIGNATE. And We, the City Commission, hereby determine that because of the flow of traffic on the streets or portions of the streets within such area that parking therein shall be subject to the provisions of this ordinance . . .

Section 9. It shall be unlawful and in violation of the provisions of this ordinance for any person to cause, allow, permit or suffer any vehicle registered in the name of, or operated by such person to be parked over time or beyond the period of legal parking time established for any parking meter zone described herein.

Section 10. It shall be unlawful and a violation of the provisions of this ordinance for any person to permit a vehicle to remain or be placed in any parking space adjacent to any parking meter while said meter is displaying a signal indicating that the vehicle occupying such parking space has been parked beyond the period of time prescribed for such parking space.

Section 11. It shall be unlawful and a violation of the provisions of this ordinance for any person to deface, injure, tamper with, open or willfully break, destroy or impair the usefulness of any parking meter installed under the provisions of this ordinance.

Section 12. It shall be unlawful and a violation of the provisions of this ordinance to deposit or cause to be deposited in any parking meter, any slug, device or metallic substance or any other substance for a five cent or a one cent coin of the United States.

Section 13. It shall be the duty of the police officers of the City, acting in accordance with instructions issued by the Mayor, to report:

(A) The number of each parking meter which indicates that the vehicle occupying the parking space adjacent to such parking meter is or has been parking in violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance.

(B) The state license number of such vehicle.

(C) The time during which such vehicle is parking in violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance;

(D) Any other facts, a knowledge of which is necessary to a thorough understanding of the circumstances attending such violation. Each police officer shall also attach to such vehicle a notice to the owner or operator thereof that such vehicle has been parked in violation of a provision of this ordinance and instructing the owner or operator to report to the police station of the City of Cisco in regard to such violation. Each such owner or operator may, within 24 hours of the time when such notice was attached to such vehicle, pay to the Chief of Police, as a penalty for and in full satisfaction of such violation, the sum of \$1.00 (one dollar). The failure of such owner or operator to make such payment to the Chief of Police, within said 24 hours, shall render such owner or operator subject to the penalties hereinafter provided for violation of the provisions of this ordinance.

Section 14. Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance and any person who aids, abets or assists therein shall, upon conviction be punished by a fine not exceeding One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00).

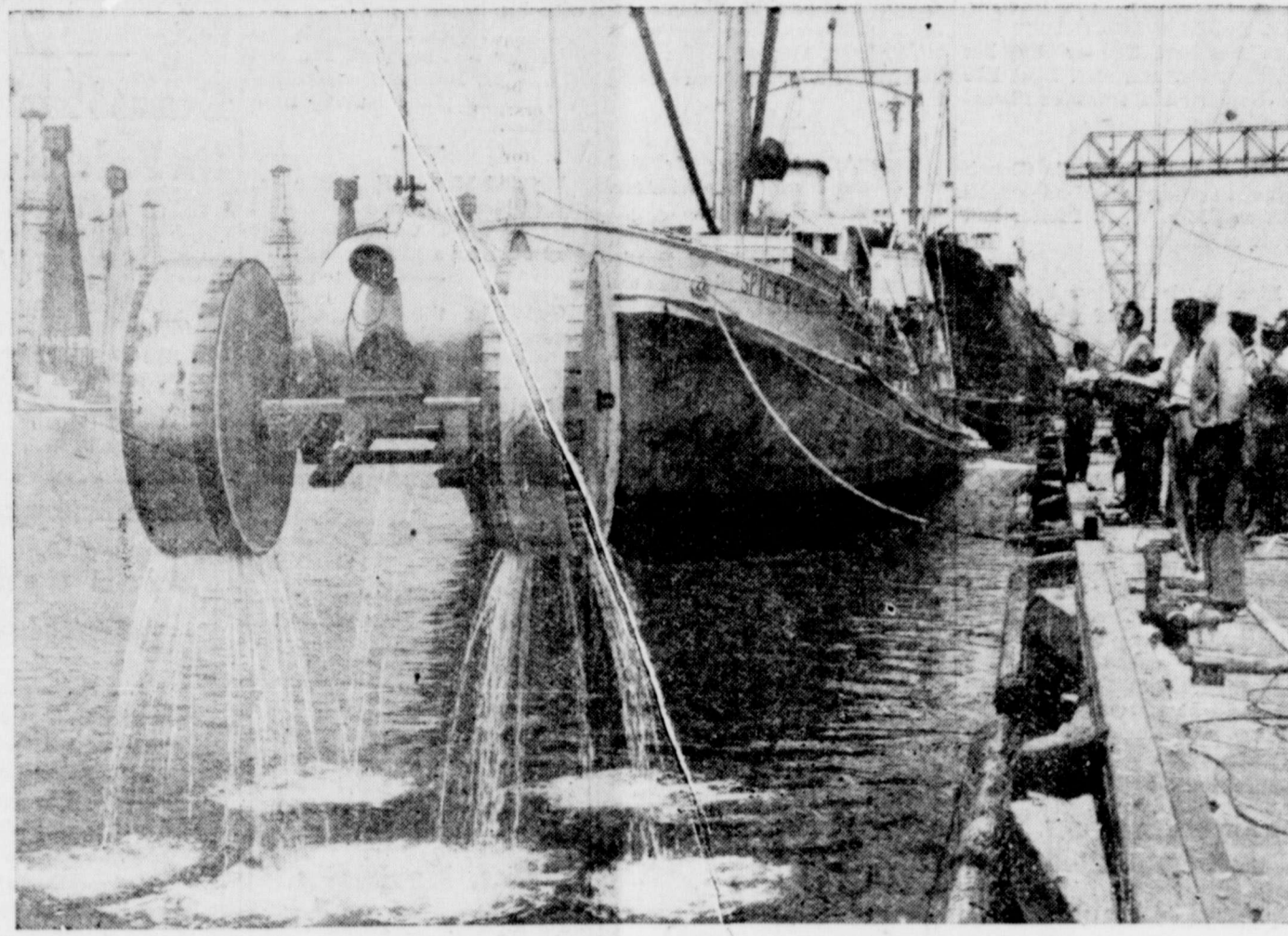

Price Daniel Rules On Election Laws

Attorney Price Daniel ruled on the new secret ballot law enacted by the last legislature. He says it should be used in the general primary and local option elections.

The provisions of the new law provide for a detachable stub in the upper right hand corner of each ballot. The stub carries the number of the ballot, the date and designation of the election. It is signed by the voter and repositied by him in a separate box where it is kept in case of a contest for identification purposes.

The ruling said it was humanly impossible for the same procedure to be followed in absentee ballots.

"The mere fact that the absentee voter's ballot and stub are placed in the respective boxes by the presiding judge of elections would not render the section on absentee voting inconsistent with the other provisions of the act because the first sentence of section six provides that appropriate pro-

visions of the act shall also apply in absentee voting.
