LEGAL NOTICE

An ordinance relating to traffic and regulating the use of public streets within the City of Cisco, Texas, prescribing regulations to the parking of vehicles upon such streets, providing for the use of parking meters, defining and establishing parking meter zones, the regulation, control, and in-

spection of parking meters, and providing that time of parking vehicles on streets shall be measured by parking meters: providing for enforcement hereof, and for penalties for violation, for repealing conflicting ordinances, and declaring an emergency.

WHEREAS, because of congested traffic conditions that w exist and have existed for long period of time on the streets of the City of Cisco due to the numerous motor vehicles using the said streets and because of the custom and habit of the operators of said vehicles of parking the same for a long period of time in close proximity to other motor vehicles on the most congested parts of the streets in the business section of the municipality; and congested parts of the streets in the business section of the said municipality, and

BE IT ORDAINED by the City Commission of the City of Cisco, State of Texas: . . .

Section 2. Congested area. for the purpose of this ordinance the "congested traffic area" hereby declared to be on AVENUE D, AVENUE E, AVE-NUE F, and M. K. & T. R. O. W. and CROSS AVENUES and 10th STREETS, AT SUCH PLA ES AS THE CITY COMMIS-SION MAY DESIGNATE. And Cisco. We, the City Commission, hereby determine that because of the flew of traffic on the streets or portions of the streets within uch area that parking therein hall be subject to the provisons of this ordinance . .

Section 9. It shall be unlawful and in violation of the provisions of this ordinance for any person to cause, allow, permit EXPERT service in Radio, Home in the name of, or operated by legal parking time established Sage, 1306 Avenue D., Phone for any parking meter zone described herein.

Section 10. It shall be unlawful and a violation of the provisions of this ordinance for any person to permit a vehicle to remain or be placed in any park ing space adjacent to any parking meter while said meter is that the vehicle occupying such parking space has been parked beyond the period of time prescribed for such parking space.

Section 11. It shall be unlawful and a violation of the provisions of this ordinance for any or 427-M. person to deface, injure, tamper with, open or willfully break, destroy or impair the usefulness of any parking meter installed under the provisions of

this ordinance. Section 12. It shall be unlawful and a violation of the provisions of this ordinance to de posit or cause to be deposited in any parking meter, any slug, device or metallic substance or any other substance for a five cent or a one cent coin of the United

Section 13. It shall be the duty of the police officers of the City, acting in accordance with FOR SALE - Home with gainstructions issued by the Mayor, to report:

(A) The number of each parking meter which indicates that the vehicle occupying the parking space adjacent to such parking meter is or has been parking in violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance. (B) The state license number

of such vehicle.

(C) The time during which such vehicle is parking in violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance:

(D) Any other facts, a knowledge of which is necessary to a thorough understanding of the circumstances attending such violation. Each police officer shall also attach to such vehicle a notice to the owner or operator thereof that such vehicle has been parked in violation of a provision of this ordinance and instructing te owner or operator to report to the police station of the City of Cisco in regard to such violation. Each such owner or operator may, within 24 hours of the time when such notice was attached to such vehicle, pay to the Chief of Police, as a penalty for and in full satisfaction of such violation, the sum of \$1.00 (one dollar). The failure of such owner or operator to make such payment to the Chief of Police, within said 24 hours, shall render such owner or operator subject to the penalties hereinafter proided for violation of the provisions of

this ordinance. Section 14. Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance and any person who aids, abets or assists therein shall, upon conviction be punished by a fine not exceeding One Hundred Dollars


