\$260 Taken From Parking Meters For First Week

In the first six days of operation the parking meters in downtown Cisco took in \$260.57, according to figures released by the office of the city secretary. The \$260.57 figure represents only money used for parking purposes and does not include annual fees for reserved spaces or for delivery cars and it does not include any amounts collected for fines for violations of parking rules.

The meters were emptied Sunday morning by two members of the police department and a representative from the office of the city secretary.

Included in the receipts were 10,200 pennies, 3,120 five cent pieces and 50 ten cent pieces as well as a few slugs and foreign matter. The average per day for the first six days of operation was \$43.43.

Half of the amount collected remains in the city treasury and half goes to the Magee-Hale Park-O-Meter Company as a payment on the meters.

Rev. and Mrs. John Nelson Betts of Brazil were commissioned as missionaries to Brazil at ceremonies at the First Methodist Church Tuesday night. The services were directed by Bishop William C. Martin of Dallas, who was the principal speaker.

Rev. and Mrs. Betts plan to leave the United States in approximately 60 days for their work in the South American country. They will be accompanied by their 6-month old son, Claude Daniel.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Betts have been attending Southern Methodist University in Dallas and will receive their degrees this month.

They were born in Brazil of missionary parents. Mr. Betts is a citizen of that country and Mrs. Betts holds citizenship in Brazil and the United States. He was a member of the Brazilian Army during World War II.

Rev. and Mrs. Betts are entering the mission field under the sponsorship of the churches in the Cisco District. The district will furnish the \$150 per month needed to sustain the couple in their work.

Immediately following the commissioning ceremonies the

Ministers and lay members from most of the churches in the Cisco District were present for the services.

Aerocade From Fort Worth To Visit Here On August 28

WARNING ISSUED AGAINST IGNORING SUMMONS ISSUED FOR OVERPARKING

Mayor G. C. Rosenthal joined police officials Tuesday in issuing a warning against the flagrant ignoring of summons issued by local officials for violations of traffic regulations in Cisco. Particular stress was placed on the ignoring of summons issued for violations of parking regulations.

Mr. Rosenthal reported that approximately 100 summons had

been issued for over parking or illegal parking during the first week of parking meter use and that a large majority of them had been ignored. He stated that failure to answer the summons could be classed as contempt of court and that parking ordinances provide a heavy fine for the offense.

Mayor Rosenthal urged the answering of the summons on the day designated and stated that the city officials would much rather discuss parking violations with the offender than issue a summons for contempt.

He also pointed out that some were inserting ten cent pieces in the meters. He stated that the meters were designed to take only one cent and five cent pieces. Those wishing to park for two hours were urged to insert two five cent pieces or ten pennies. The meters are set up to register 12 minutes for each one cent piece inserted in the slot and one hour for each five cent piece or five pennies inserted.

Aberdeen-Angus Show To Attract Top Entries At Fair

More than 500 of the top Aberdeen-Angus cattle in the nation will be exhibited as the major attraction in the livestock show of the 1949 State Fair of Texas, W. H. Hitzelberger, vice president and general manager of the Fair, has been announced.

The National Aberdeen-Angus Show, October 8-13, offers a bulging premium list of \$11,500, and will attract entries from every state which produces the black hornless breed.

"This national show means much to the people of the Southwest," Hitzelberger said. "This is one of the fastest developing breeds in the world and its popularity is increasing rapidly."

Frank Richards, secretary of the American Aberdeen Angus Breeders Association in Chicago, predicts this year's show will be the best ever held in the history of the breed.

Climax of the show will come October 12 with the National Aberdeen-Angus sale in charge of Tomny Brock of Camp San Saba, prominent Texas breeder, who said that this sale will be the best offering of breeding cattle ever put on the block at a breed-promotion sale in the South.

Judging dates are October 11 and 12, with a banquet the night of October 12 at the Baker Hotel, where State Fair Angus awards will be made.

At the Fat Stock Show in Chicago, Aberdeen Angus steers have won 75 per cent of the grand championships in the four major divisions during the past 43 years. In the 41 and 43 carcass contests at the same show, the grand champion beef carcass has been from an Angus steer.

TO ATTEND SESSION

Steve Potts, Field Scout Executive of the Comanche Trail Council, has made plans to attend the Region 9 Scouter's Conference in Albuquerque, N. M., August 12-26. Approximately 250 professional scouters were expected to attend.

Plans were completed this week by Mayor G. C. Rosenthal and members of the city council for the reception of some 100 members of the Convar Flying Activities Club who will arrive in Cisco in 50 small aircraft Sunday, August 28, for their regular monthly breakfast flight.

The details were worked out by Charles O. Unfried, C. R. A. Flying Commissioner, Mayor Rosenthal, city councilmen and local committee members appointed to assist in the technical details.

The Flying Activities Club is composed of amateur fliers who are employed in the Fort Worth plant of the Consolidated Aircraft Company. Some of the members own their own planes while others plan to make the trip in rented craft.

The fliers will begin arriving shortly after 8 a. m., August 28, and plans call for a full three hours of activities. Upon their arrival the visitors will be greeted by Mayor Rosenthal and then transported by private automobiles to the Victor Hotel for breakfast. Mr. Rosenthal stated that a number of Ciscoans had offered their cars for transporting the visitors but that more were needed. He asked those who can assist in the matter to see him or a member of the council as soon as possible.

After breakfast the group will be taken to Lake Cisco where they will swim in the Amusement Company pool as guests of the city and amusement company. Church services will be held at Lake Cisco park under the direction of Rev. Eugene Crosier, who will accompany the group on the flight to Cisco.

Some of the fliers will engage in an air show for the entertainment of Ciscoans and at least two of the members will be towed to the local airport in gliders and will engage in soaring demonstrations over the area.

Mr. Unfried also announced that it was possible that a B-36 bomber would accompany the group and circle the town during the time the fliers were here. Plans also call for the appearance of a number of P-51 fighter planes through the courtesy of the Texas National Guard.

The group asked the city to furnish three "spot landing" judges and ten field men to assist with the landing. A loud speaking system was requested and ambulances and fire-fighting equipment were asked for, in case of accidents.

The city will build a six foot square platform atop the office building to accommodate C. A. A. tower operators who will direct all incoming and outgoing air traffic.

Radio communications have been arranged for and will be used in case of storms or other weather conditions judged dangerous to flying in the area. The unit will be in operation under the direction of the local unit of the Naval Reserve Electronic Warfare Organization.

Winter Wheat Belt Fights Smut



Across the winter wheat belt of Kansas, Nebraska, Oklahoma, Colorado and Texas Panhandle, hundreds of seed cleaning and treating machines are at work preparing seed for the 1949 planting.

Stationary units in elevators and seed houses, and portable units like the one above, are processing seed through cleaners to take out weeds and broken kernels and through treaters which mix "Ceresan" seed disinfectant on the seed to destroy the spores of stinking smut and other disease organisms.

Cliff Manny, left, County Agent of Pawnee County, Kansas, checks the operation on the farm of Enoch Thompson, a state champion wheat grower. Through better stands and higher yields, seed treatment usually returns the farmer ten times or more the cost of treating—in addition to controlling stinking smut according to plant pathologists and agronomists.

Polio Patients Get Best Care, Director Finds

DALLAS, Aug. 6 — Every polio patient in Texas is getting the best available medical care, Joe W. Savage, Executive Director of The National Foundation For Infantile Paralysis, announced here following a 10 day survey of conditions in the major epidemic of the state.

Savage, who directs the nation-wide fight against infantile paralysis from headquarters in New York, came to Texas to inspect polio conditions at first hand and to make sure

that everything possible was being done to aid victims of the disease.

On his trip he visited San Angelo, Dallas, Ft. Worth, Houston and San Antonio. In each city he discussed the situation with local chapter officials, physicians and hospital administrators and inspected treatment centers.

"The Texas chapters of The National Foundation are doing an outstanding and heart-warming job," Savage reported after surveying all areas in Texas where serious outbreaks of polio have occurred.

"In one or two places I found there was a shortage of trained personnel but steps were taken on the spot to supply this need. Texas is adequately equipped with hospital facilities, physicians, nurses and special equipment to meet the threat of polio."

Savage disclosed that \$315,000 in additional funds have already been furnished to local chapters in Texas so far this year by The National Foundation.

In addition to money, the Foundation has dispatched 62 nurses, 16 physical therapists, 5 physicians and 1 epidemic aid team to sections of Texas needing help.

Also furnished were 23 respirators, 28 hot pack machines and a considerable amount of hospital equipment.

Savage disclosed that in 1948 Texas had a total of 1,756 polio cases As of July 30 this year some 1,203 cases have been reported.

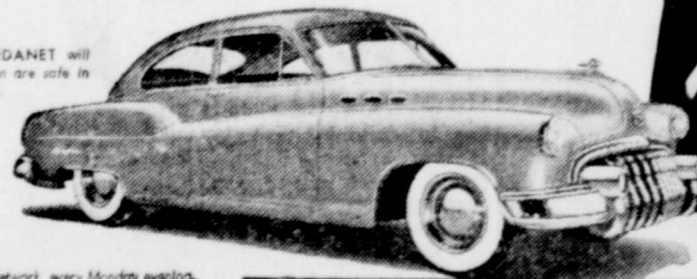

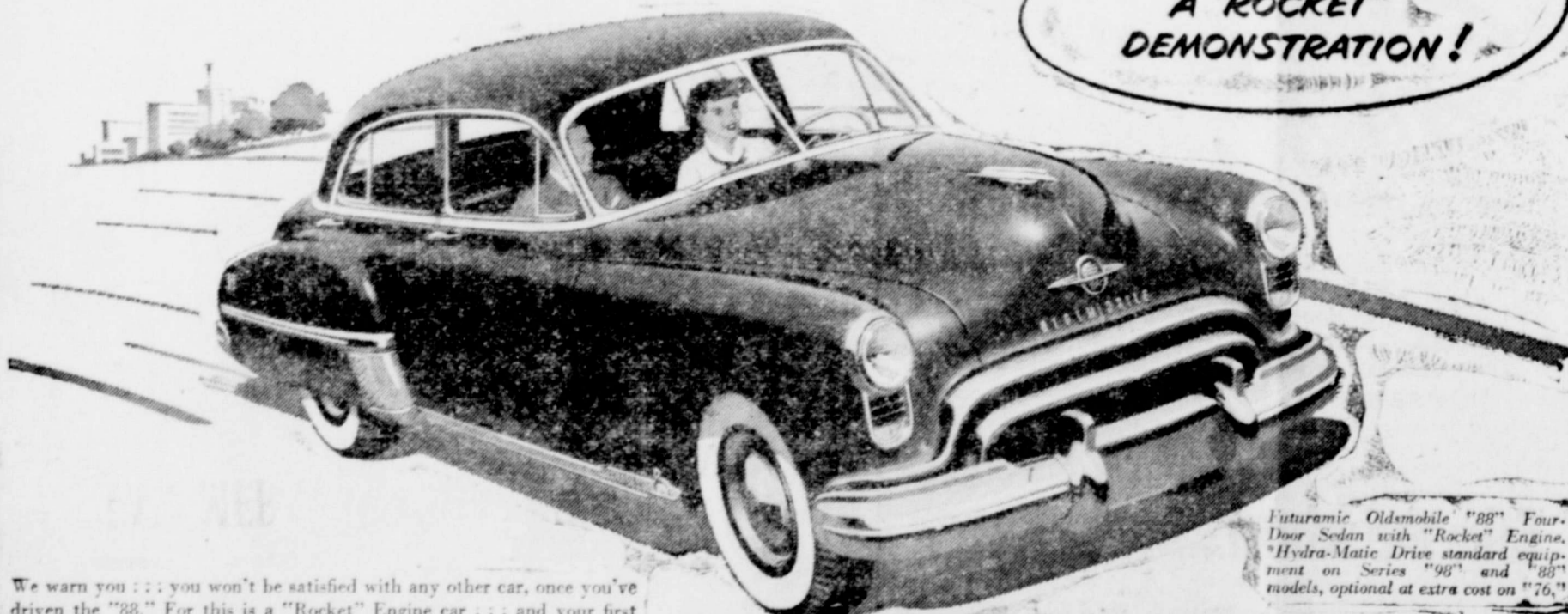
