This recommendation came from Gilbert Smith, former President of the Texas County Judges and Commissioners and now Executiv Director of the Texas Rura Roads Association, speaking here today before the 19th anhual convention of the West Texas Press Association.

In sounding a warning, Smith said: "The day is inexorably coming when the natural resources of this state will be exhausted, as oil and natural gas are being drained off to other sections of the country in such a rapid fashion that within 25 years Texas will be a great blighted area."
