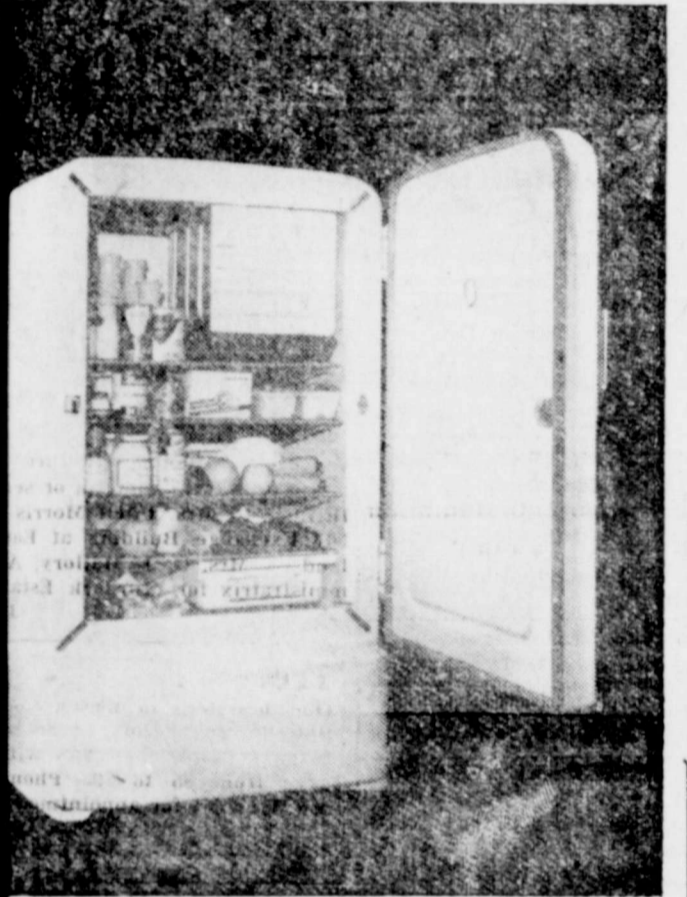

West Texas Water Needs Explained

ABILENE, Aug. 10. — A further examination of the facts upstream water development in the light of domestic water change conclusions of the department of Interior, D. A. Egan, manager of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, written Secretary J. A. ...

The statement follows the 33-letter written by Secretary Krug, in transmitting ... water study to Senator ... Johnson. In this letter Krug said: "It is doubtful the repayment ability of water users of many of the stream developments in Texas will ever be found to be sufficient to equal the reimbursement costs."

This statement was challenged by the WTCC. ... called upon Secretary ... to apply the formula of economic loss to lack of water as well as flood damage to criteria upon which multi-purpose

dams may be built by the federal government.

"A further examination of this conclusion, we believe, will produce a wholly contrary result," the letter said.

"You will note in our report several new approaches to and facts on this water resource development problem, which I am sure will intrigue you."

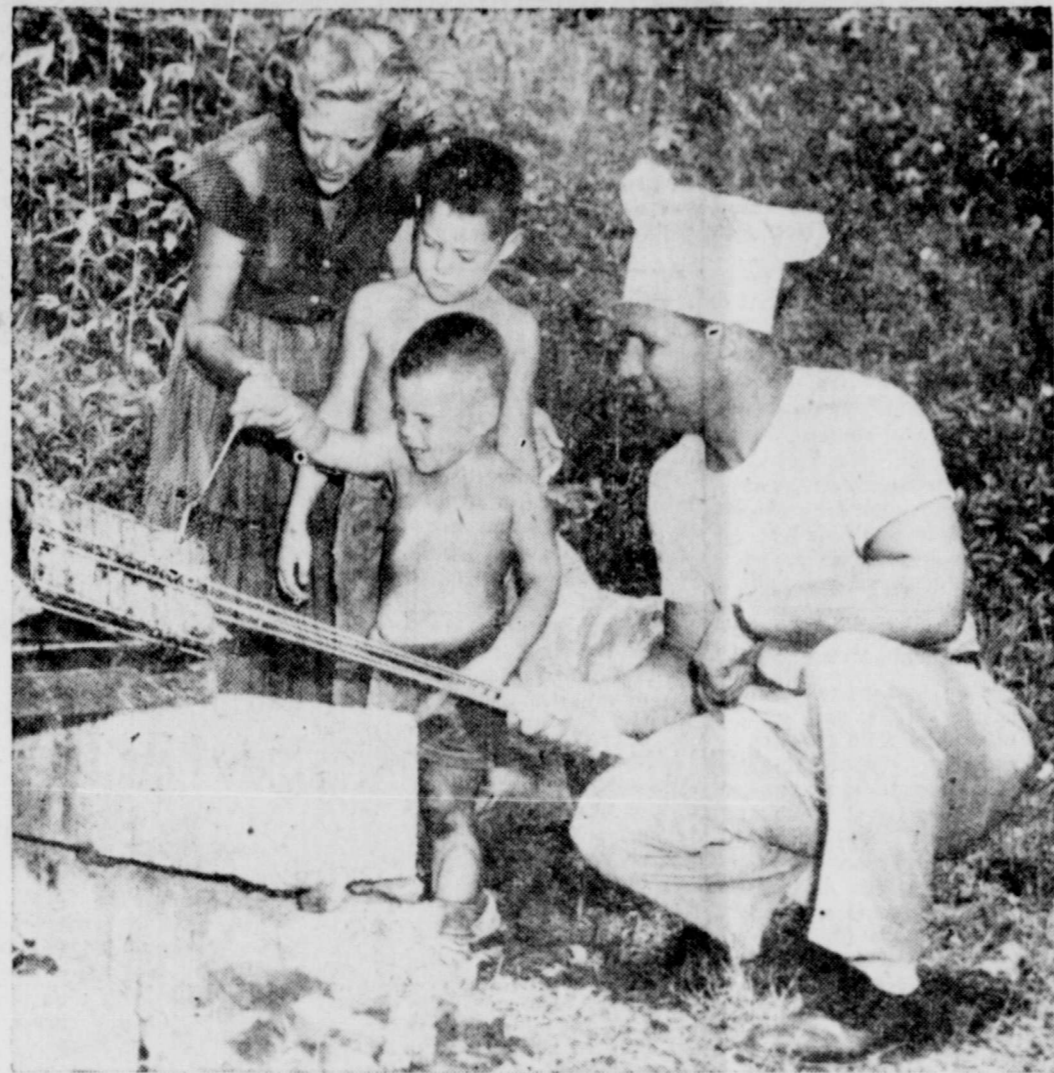
They were listed:

First, that West Texas has wholly insufficient water for domestic and industrial needs, which can only be overcome by upstream development.

Second, a new approach to the water problem in computing the economic loss from lack of water as well as from flood damages.

Third, is the possibility of the government obtaining more reimbursable revenue from the sale of domestic and industrial water from small dams on the upper tributaries than under the present multi-purpose dam policies.

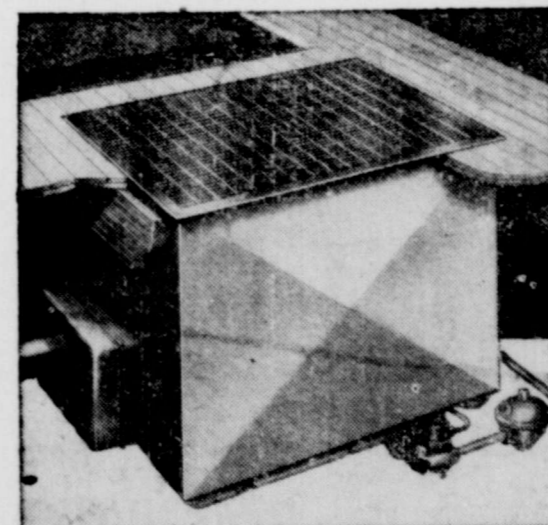

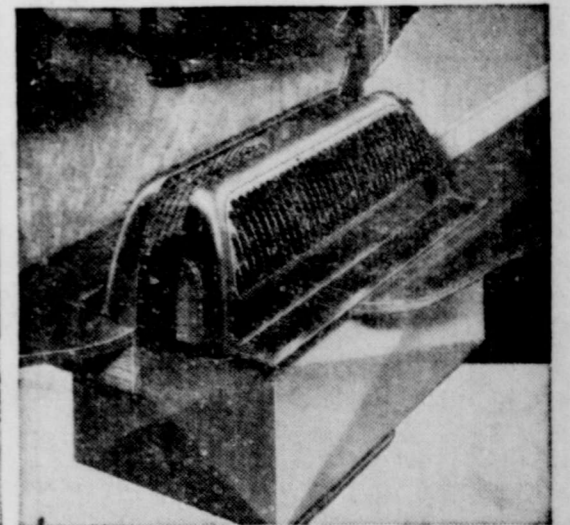

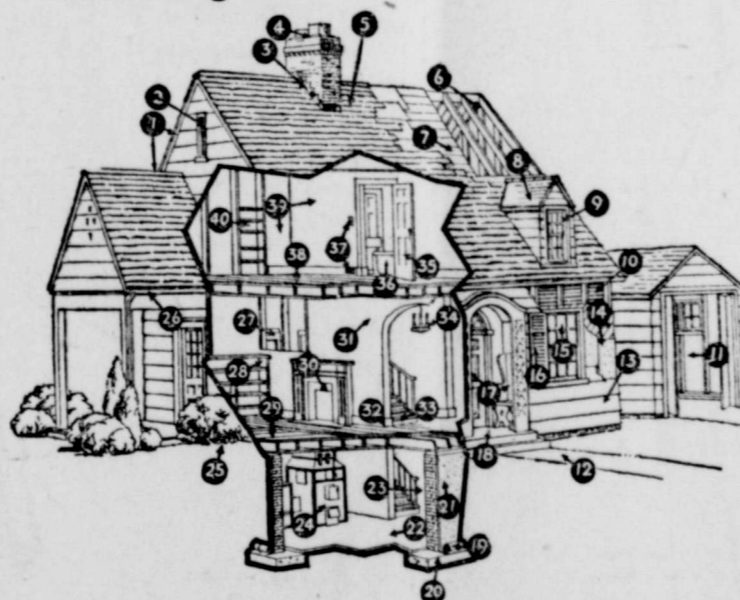

New Duck Bill Passes Congress

WASHINGTON, D. C., August 13. — Ducks, geese and other waterfowl will have more protection and more refuge with the recent passage of the Johnson-Thompson Duck Stamp Bill (S-1976), reports the National Wildlife Federation, which has supported this and similar measures for several seasons of Congress.

By a voice vote the Lower House of Congress gave its approval to the Senate Bill. Briefly, the provisions of the bill are (1) increase the price of the Duck Stamp from \$1 to \$2, (2) retains the provision that 10 per cent of the revenues arising from the sale of stamps shall be used for protection of waterfowl and administrative expenses including payment to the Post Office Department, for printing and distribution of the Stamps, (3) provides that the remainder of the revenues (90 per cent) shall be used for the acquisition, development, maintenance and administration of wildlife management and inviolate sanctuaries for migratory birds and (4) authorizes the Fish and Wildlife Service to open not to exceed 25 per cent of any newly acquired refuge to public hunting under a regulation and management when the waterfowl population is not on a downward spiral.

The House adopted a Committee approved amendment providing that the revenues from the sale of Duck Stamps would be available to the Fish and Wildlife Service only through annual Congressional appropriations. This means that the Service will have to justify annually the amounts which it requests from this fund through the Budget.

Ninety Million Persons Hold Social Security Cards At Present Time

There are now more than 90 million holders of social security cards, representing Federal insurance accounts," said Ralph T. Fisher, manager of the Abilene Field Office of the Social Security Administration. This makes the Federal social security the largest single group insurance effort on earth.

Although the Social Security Administration keeps an individual account on each worker, taxes are withheld by the employer, and only one tax report per quarter is made by each firm. One such report will contain from one to several thousand names. The large group handling of employees records lowers the per unit cost.

This pooling of the risks of dependency in old-age and at death among millions of citizens, plus the savings from economical administration explain in part the high individual benefits paid in comparison to individual taxes paid.

It also helps explain why the law does not provide for selection of risks. There is no need to exclude a person of poor health when so many are in the system.

Humble Company Plans To Build New Pipe Line

HOUSTON, August 6. — An \$18 million pipe line from West Texas to the Gulf Coast will be started by Humble Pipe Line Company toward the end of 1949 and completed around the middle of 1950. The new line will be of 18-inch pipe, extending 375 miles in a direct route from Kemper in Reagan County to Satsuma, 20 miles north of Houston, where it will connect with Humble's existing lines to Baytown.

It is being built to provide a more economical transportation system for Humble to West Texas. Upon completion of the

new line, Humble plans to take up a part of its old system from West Texas to Baytown by way of West Central Texas which has a capacity of 50,000 barrels per day. No changes contemplated in Humble's other line from West Texas with a capacity of 70,000 barrels per day to Corpus Christi.

The direct route to be built by the new line from per to Satsuma will pass through sixteen counties: Bexar, Crockett, Schleicher, Kimble, Gillespie, Mason, Co, Hayes, Travis, Bastrop, Fayette, Austin, Waller, Harris. Kemper is a point on Humble's extensive line system serving West Texas and New Mexico.
