Among the types of clerk poions to be filled from this exnination are: Appointment, rrespondence, docket, accountng, time leave, pay roll, statistial, coding, test rating, property and supply, mail, file, informaion, proofreading, editorial, inexing, purchasing, traffic, trans

No previous training or experence in clerical work is required. To qualify, applicants will e required to pass a written test which will consist of quesions designed to test their apttude for learning and adjustng to the duties of the positions. A higher standard will be required for eligibility for grade CAF than for grade CAF-2. Sample questions will accompany ,the examination announcement. The age limits, 18 to 62 years, are vaived for persons entitled to veteran preference and, under certain conditions, for war ser-

vice employees. Further information and application forms may be obtained from Civil Service Commision's Local Secretary, Mr. Sam B. King located at Cisco Post Office, from Civil Service regonal offices, or from the Comission's Washington office. Applications must be received in the U. S. Civil Service Commission, Washington 25, D. C., not later than September 6, 1949.



#### SURVEY SHOWS LARGE AMOUNTS OF TOOTH DECAY AMONG TEXAS YOUTH

A large part of a tal health." tooth may be destroyed by decay with little evidence of decay on the surface, says Dr. George W. Cox, state health officer. Surveys of large groups of preschool children reveal that 50% of them have decayed teeth at three years of age, 75% at four years of age, and 90% at five years of age. Six out of ten children, age four and five, have as many, as seven or more cav-

Decay begins most frequently in the small pits and fissures on the chewing surfaces and at the points of contact between the teeth. Pits and fissures with structural flaws should be filled at once to prevent decay.

Dr. Cox said, "Dental examination and care should begin with the three year old child, and periodic examinations and necessary care should follow, thereafter, as often as the dentist advises. The first or baby teeth should be kept in a healthy condition until it is time for them to be lost.

"X-rays aid the dentist in finding hidden cavaties, especially those between the teeth. Many of these beginning cavities are located in areas where they cannot be found in any other way. X-ray pictures are also useful in finding other conditions that require immediate attention such as abscesses, impacted teeth, broken roots, bone destruction due to pyorrhea, extra teeth and other information that is important in treatment

## **National Guard Gets Equipment**

The arrival of one of three armored cars to be issued for use by Cisco National Guardsmen, was revealed here Wednesday by Sgt. Frank Schleapfer, administrative assistant.

The armored car, better known as a half track, was issued to the Cisco unit for patrol duties in case a state or national distrubance. Equipped with long range radio apparatas, the vehicle is manned by a crew of five.

In addition, the Cisco unit, Schaleapfer said, is expecting the arrival of two self propelled and two more armored cars before the end of this month. At that time, the guardsmen will be maintaining 13 vehicles at the armory.


