Loboes End First Week of Drills With Intra-Squad Game Saturday

A full fledged intra-squad scrimmage was held, Saturday by Coach Jack Everett's 44-man football squad, drawing to a close the first two weeks of pre-season training at Chesley stadium.

The scrimmage was used by Coaches Everett and Buck Overall in an attempt to form a tentative starting lineup against the Necona Indians, who will invade the Loboes territory on September 9.

Since the Loboes began work last Monday, Coach Everett has been stepping the squad through a daily course of blackboard study, stiff head-knocking drills and dummy plays. Some stress has been placed on passing, but both mentors are grooming this year's team for an offensive ground machine.

As can be expected, the Loboes have sustained several injuries, but only James McGowan, back, has been put out of action. He was sent to Graham Hospital Thursday afternoon after suffering a blow on the neck. Still in the hospital, he was doing nicely Saturday. Earlier, Reo Evans, center, suffered a cracked nose bone.

The Lobo backfield was by no means a settled proposition but it was beginning to look like the starting eleven might include Jerry Cowan at fullback, Doug Johnson at quarterback and Hub Harwell and Robert Jackson at the halfback positions.

Oil, Gas, Utility Property Show Greatest Jump

The taxable valuation on property in Eastland County for the coming year will be approximately \$3,000,000 higher than it was for the past year, it was announced by the Commissioners' Court after a meeting last week in which the tax rate was set and the annual operating budget established.

The tax valuation for the county jumped from \$20,818,610 to \$24,000,000 with the greater part of the increase coming on revised assessments on oil and gas and utility properties.

The tax rate remained at 60 cents on the \$100 as it had been for the past two years and the budget differed only slightly from that of the year 1949.

It was announced that the increase in valuations of oil, gas and utility property came after a study was made by Thomas Y. Pickett of Dallas, who made the recommendations. A valuation engineer, Pickett has handled valuations of this type for a number of years and in many of Texas' 254 counties. He signed a two year contract with Eastland County this year.

The services of Pickett's firm are paid for by the county on a basis of work accomplished and it was estimated his fee for the first year would be close to \$4,000. The county will receive about \$18,000 in additional taxes through the increased valuations.

Another factor in the increase in valuation was the development of many of the oil and gas leases in the county and the improvement of some of the taxable properties.

The budget hearing was open to the public but was attended only by the county judge and commissioners.

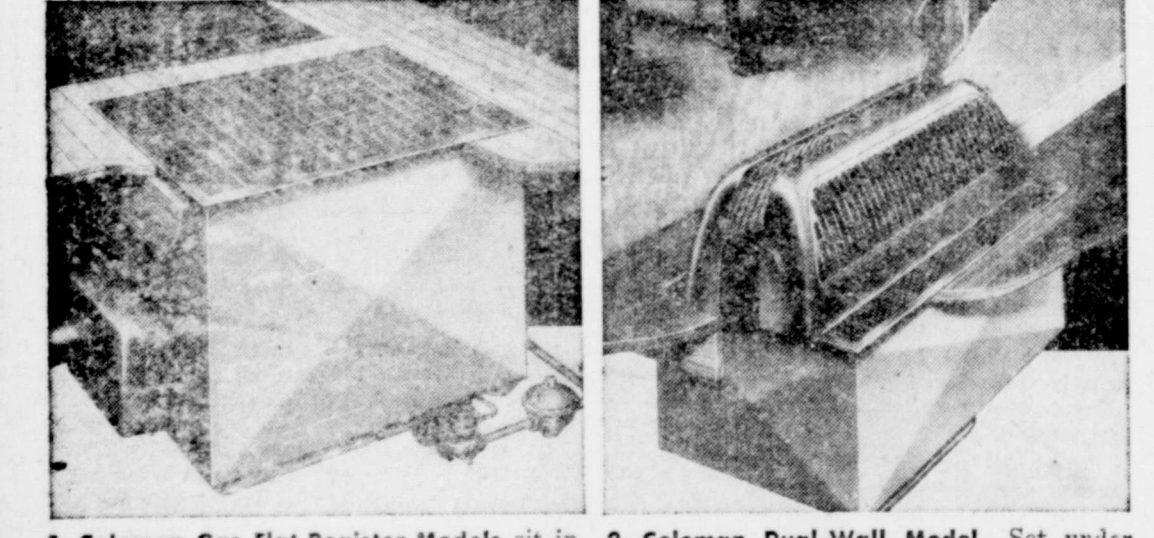

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
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
