FUNERAL SERVICES FOR C. S. SURLS TO BE HELD HERE AT 3 P. M. THURSDAY

Funeral services for Carroll S. Surls, 62 year old real estate and insurance agent, will be held at 3 p. m. Thursday in the First Baptist Church with Otis Strickland, minister, officiating. He had been a faithful member of the Baptist church since his conversion in Putnam at the age of 14.

Mr. Surls died suddenly Tuesday morning while returning from a fishing trip to Possum Kingdom Lake. He was in a car with Joe Coats, also of Cisco, when he was stricken with a heart ailment. He died before aid could be summoned. Death occurred on U. S. Highway 80 near Santo.

Mr. Surls had recently returned to his office after a serious illness of a month.

He was born in Callahan County near Putnam on October 31, 1886 and lived in and near Putnam until he moved to Cisco in 1922. He was married to Miss Ione Martin on August 2, 1908, in Putnam.

Survivors include his wife, two sons, and two daughters. The sons are Wendell Surls of Dallas and Major Donald Surls, stationed at an Army Air Forces base near Topeka, Kan. The daughters are Mrs. Doris

Cunningham and Mrs. Adrian Allen of Cisco.

Also surviving are three sisters and six grand children. The sisters are Mrs. J. L. Kennedy of Fort Worth, Mrs. Gera Tarrant of Houston and Mrs. L. R. Burnside of Midland.

Palbearers will be Judson Kennedy of Grand Falls, Marshal Tarrant, Odessa; Billy Tarrant, San Antonio; Lloyd Surls, Marston Surls and Wesley Smith of Cisco.

Burial will be in Oakwood cemetery with Thomas Funeral Home in charge of the arrangements. A Thomas coach returned the body to Cisco.

Jaycees Endorse Lunacy Change

DALLAS, August 24 (SP)—The constitution amendment authorizing trials without the necessity of a jury in lunacy cases, to be submitted to the vote in November, has the full support of the Texas Junior Chamber of Commerce, it was announced in Dallas Saturday.

Jim Mahon, chairman of the Jaycee's mental committee, made the announcement after conferring with E. M. Korpatrick, Jr. of Baytown, President of the Texas Jaycees. Mahon said the committee will "work for the passage of the amendment with every facility at our command."

Texas is the only state in the union which still requires mandatory jury trial in cases for the commitment of mental patients to state hospitals. Experts in the field of mental health regard the elimination of mandatory jury trial as the step in placing proper emphasis on the medical nature of mental illness. These experts state that the present Texas jury trial system frequently aggravates mental illness, reducing the patient's chance for recovery.

Present Practices with respect to "Trial" of the mentally ill have been strongly criticized in that they cause an unwarranted stigma to attach to mental illness, thereby discouraging many persons from seeking hospitalization for themselves or members of their family until too late for effective treatment.

LOBOS STAGE FIRST INTER-CITY GRID SCRIMMAGE AGAINST RISING STAR

In their first real test under fire, Coach Jack Everett's band of Cisco High School Lobos, now numbering more than 54, staged a 90-minute inter-city scrimmage with the Rising Star Wildcats at Chesley Field Tuesday afternoon.

Boasting a team that lost only three lettermen, the visitors scored five touchdowns to a pair for Cisco. Buck Gibson led the strong Wildcat offense.

Mass Meeting Called For Friday Night At City Hall Auditorium

Plans for a city-wide street paving were announced Wednesday following a meeting of the City Commission at the offices of Mayor Rosenthal Tuesday night. Mr. Rosenthal said that the decision was reached after a large number of citizens had asked the city to study the plan.

A mass meeting was called for Friday night in the city hall auditorium at which time citizens will be asked to sign a petition asking for the paving. The meeting was called for 8 p. m. Mr. Rosenthal asked interested persons to attend the meeting. He said that streets or blocks could appoint committees to represent them at the meeting and it would be necessary for the entire group to attend. The committee should be authorized to sign for the group.

Tentative bids have been submitted for the paving and the prices will be announced at the meeting Friday. Royce L. Boyd Contracting Co. of Cisco and Montgomery Construction Co. of Kermit have submitted bids. Mr. Montgomery has been awarded contracts in this area and Mr. Boyd has handled similar projects over Texas.

Specifications on the proposed project call for the grading of the streets, placing fill where necessary, seal coating and the laying of a one and a half inch of asphalt mat. The bidders stated that they would use Uvalde asphalt and as much local material as possible. No plans have been made as to which streets will be paved first, it was announced. That will be determined by the outcome of the meeting.

Mr. Rosenthal stressed the importance of the project and urged a large turn-out for the mass meeting. He pointed out that it was the first time in many years that a citywide paving project had been attempted and that the commissioners and civic leaders believed that now was the time to begin on an improvement campaign.

New Plane To Be Shown For First Time Here Sunday

T. W. Keith, manager of the Cisco airport, announced Wednesday that he had received word from Johnson Aircraft Company of Tyler that the Johnson Bullet, the firm's new plane, would be shown for the first time since its completion at the local airport Sunday in connection with the Consolidated-Vultee Air Activities Club's visit.

It is an all metal four place plane, powered with a 185 horsepower Continental engine. The plane is just off the assembly line and the first produced by the Tyler concern. Other ships are nearing completion, it was announced.

Mr. Keith stated that the airport was rapidly being placed in top shape for the aerocade Sunday. The mowing machine has been working and runways are being graded and filled. They should be in first class condition when the visitors begin arriving Sunday morning.

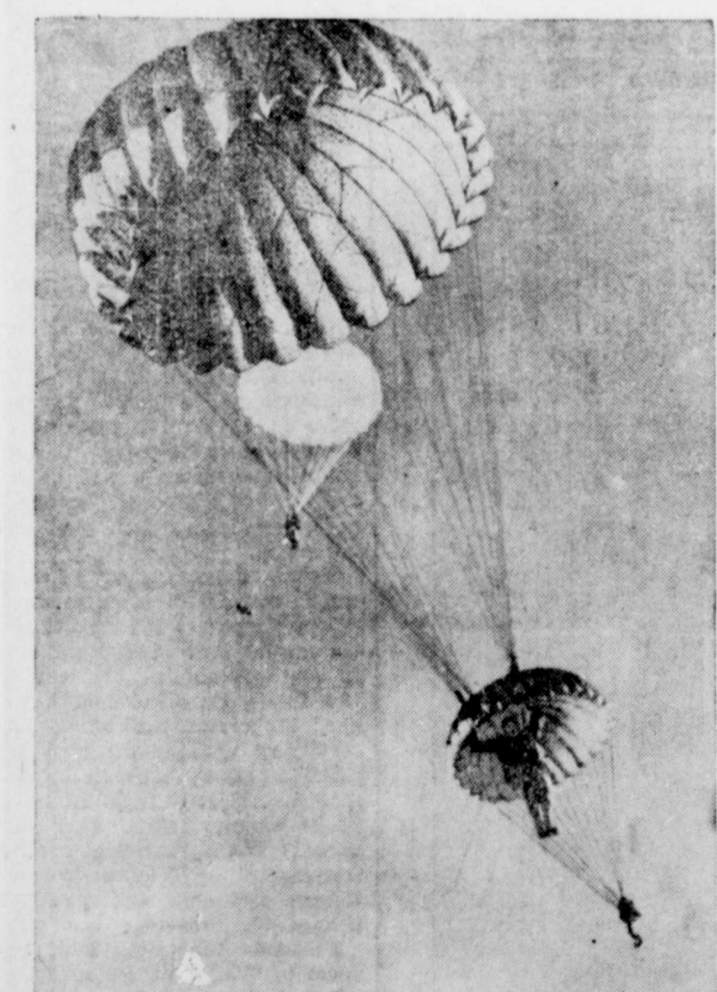

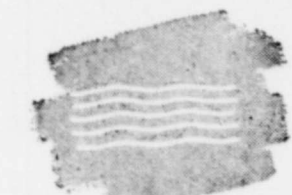

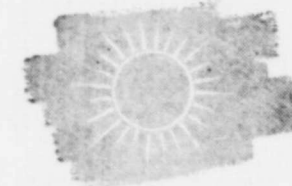
