New Fishing Law Is Effective On September 1st

New universal fishing license and laws will go into effect in the state Thursday regarding the use of artificial lure and baits.

According to an act of the state legislature, any person 17 years of age must have a license to fish, he said.

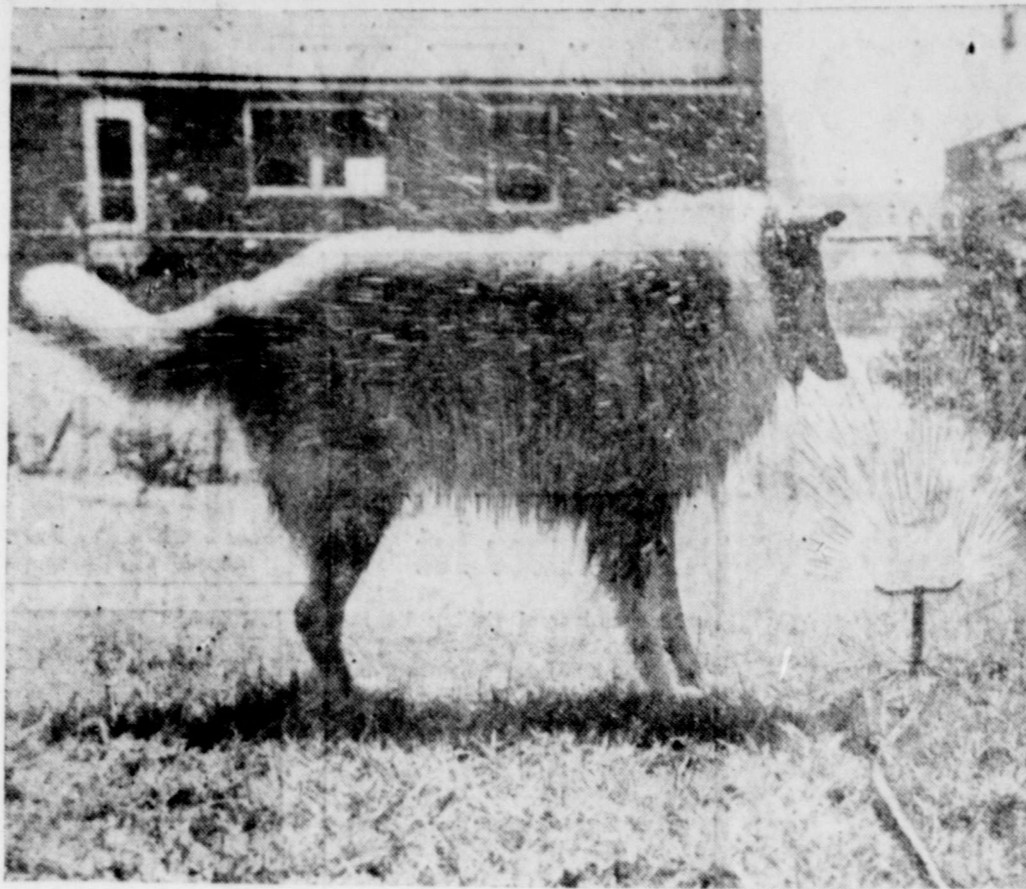
J. W. Brandon Gets Degree From Sul Ross State College

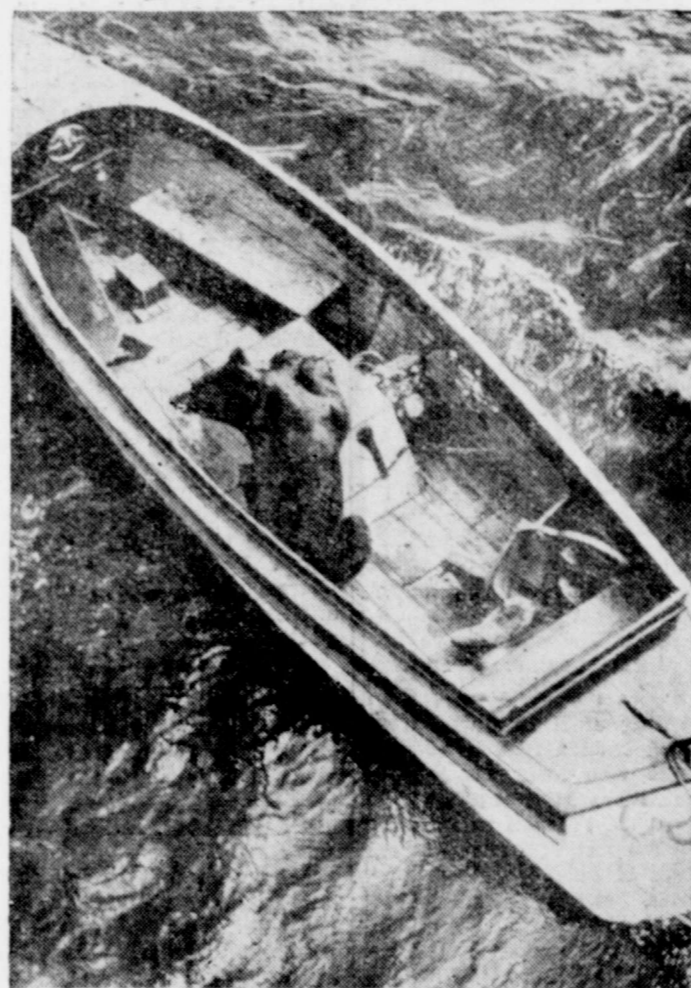

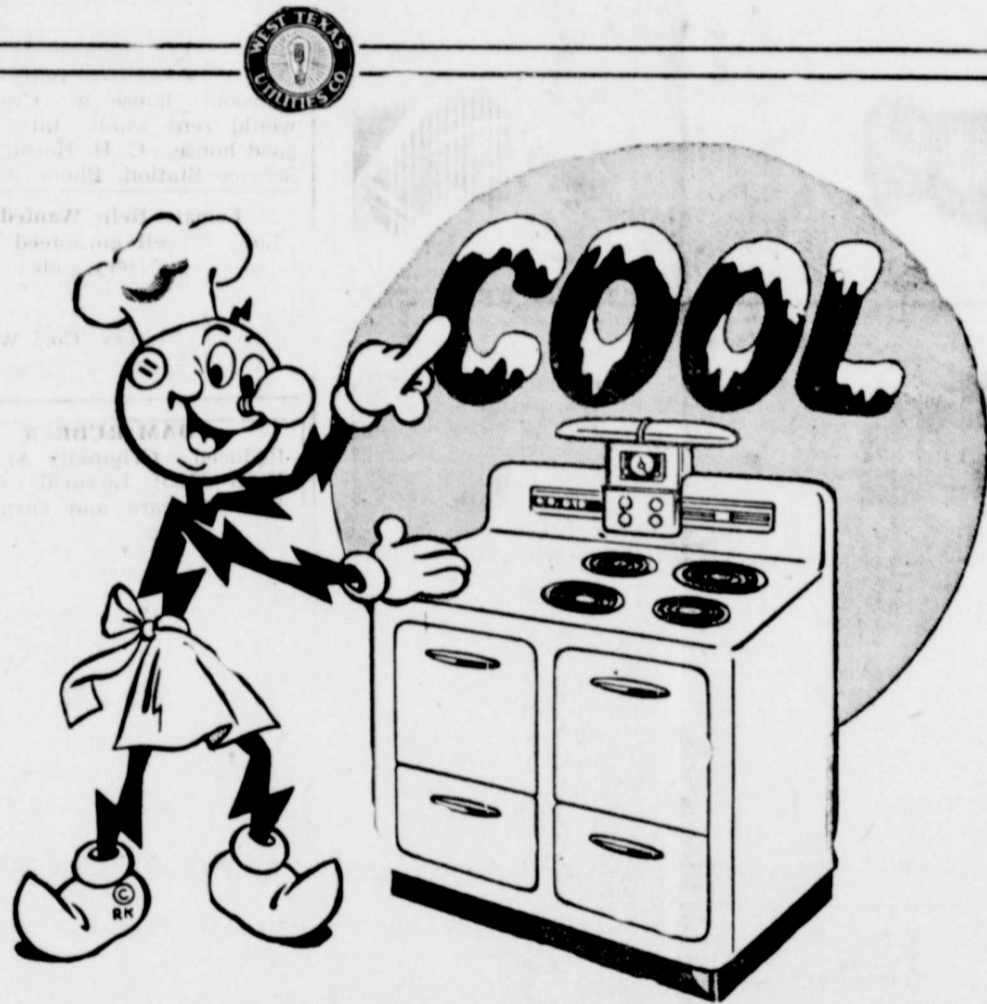
Plans For County Fair Being Made

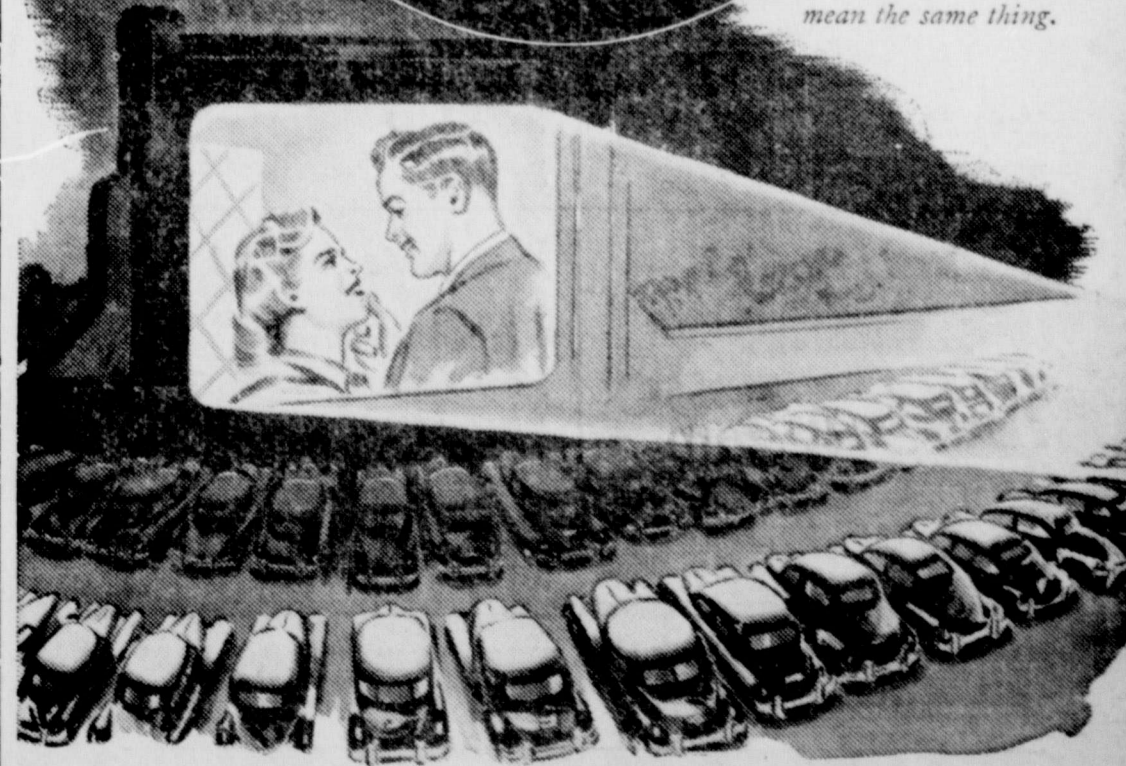

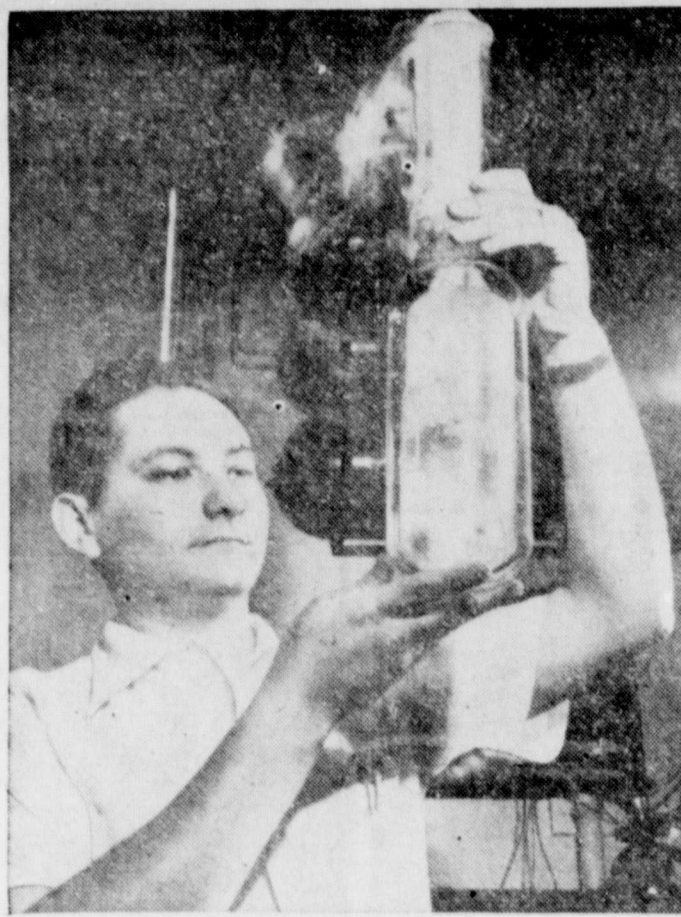
