## **New Fishing Law** Is Effective On September 1st

New universal fishing license and laws will go into effect in the state Thursday regarding the use of artificial lure and baits, Mike Stricklin, Cisco game warden announced today.

According to an act of the state legislature, any person 17 rears of age must have a licene to fish, he said. Also, any person using live bait. Also, any ishing out of the county of his residence must have a license The same applies to all persons using dead baits while fishing in any county other than the county of his residence

The license, Stricklin said, does not entitle the holder to fish on enclosed or posted lands without the consent of the owner.

The new license, which will be sold at \$1.65, supercedes all special license, with the exception of Lake Texoma, he said.

## Regional Water Project Now Up To Congress

neers can undertake to provide municipal water supplies where flood damage is not excessive, according to Major General Lewis A. Pick, in a letter written

to Senator Lyndon Johnson. The general was meeting the challenge of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce in whch economic loss from lack of waorganization, the Cisco bowling ter in West Texas is greater than port covering the West Texas flod loses. The WTCC in a rewater shortage damages and auulication of the Hoover Commission's Domestic water recommendation, the organization points out these losses in the West Texas area and is now asking Congress to give domestic water first priority in all dam building programs. A copy of the report, made by WT CC manager D. A. Bandeen was sent to General Pick by Sena-

tor Johnson. "The need for such water appears urgent in many parts of the country, but it is obvious that the question raised by Mr. Bandeen is one of broad policy, as to whether such work should be undertaken by the Federal Government. This is a matter which can be decided only by Congress," the general wrote.

General Pick was assured the WTCC report was-not prepared as a "complaint on any of the several federal agencies handling water projects, but to seek for these agencies a legislative policy wherein economic loss due to lack of water can be a criteria for dam building, and wherein domestic water can be given priority on Federal water

projects." Meantime resurveys of West Texas watersheds have been authorized by the Bureau of Reclamation, using domestic water as a criteria.


