TABLETS of the TIMES

This week and next a vast young army of 32 million boys and girls will start trooping into classrooms where they will be confronted by 1,200,000 teachers in about 90,000 independent. school districts. It will be the greatest legion of young people ever enrolled in elimentary and high schools. Nearly every youngster will have in his possession the familiar school tablet and is likely to use between three and 15 of them by the end

of the term next spring. This worthy American invention supplanted the slate with its soapstone and grimy erasing rag about 60 years ago, thus revolutionizing the teaching techniques in education. The tablet provides constant edification for students. And sometimes, as illustrated tablet tops here show, it makes a fine historical comment on contemporary affairs.

This tablet top, in use 1885-1911 did not sell well at first, as merchants thought slates could not be replaced.







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
