

Military Setup Change Ordered

ganization of Texas military district will be changed to give the chief the authority to command and will be placed in effect as quickly as possible, Colonel O. B. Abbott, the present executive of the headquarters, announced here today.

The Fourth Army Commander will delegate to the military district chief the authority to command. The district chief will command all national guard instructor personnel, the organized reserve corps and all ROTC units in Texas. The present military district in Texas will contain the following setup: military district headquarters, organized reserve corps instructors groups, national guard instructors groups and ROTC instructors groups.

The Texas miliitary district is a standard organization to be formed in each state and the District of Columbia to supervise and coordinate the organized reserve corps, the national guard and the ROTC program.

Heretofore, the Texas military district has only been concerned with the administration and training of the organized reserve corps, has performed liason only with the national guard and been directed to perform the formal and informal inspections of all ROTC units in the state.

New License Law Effective Oct. 5

House bill No. 588 of the 51st Texas Legislature, profides no marriage license shall be issued unless each aplicant files with the county clerk a health certificate from a physician.

The law directs that the phyician shall not issue such certificate until he has made an examination and has received a report from an approved labora-The certificate shall state that

the applicant has been given an actual and thorough examination including tests for syphi-Examinations shall not have been made more than fifteen days prior to date of issuance of marriage license. The license becomes in valid unless the marriage is performed within 15 days from the date of the Physicians examination. Any misreprentation will constitute a misdemeanor on conviction and the perpetrater may be fined not less than \$500 and not

After a two hour period, a worker employed on the lease with Lowry, came by. After failing to extradite Lowry with a small car jack, the worker left and returned with three other men and a larger jack.

The car was raised and Low ry was pulled from under it. He was then taken to Graham hospital here. The child, who had managed to get out of the car after the mishap, escaped in-

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




