Dr. Livius Lee Langford Leaves On Goodwill Cruise Aboard Carrier

A message has just been received by Judge and Mrs. Eugene Langford from their son, Dr. Livius Lee Langford, who is in the Navy with the rank of Lt. (j. g.), stating that his ship, the Leyte, one of the biggest aircraft carriers, second only to the Franklin D. Roosevelt, is leaving Newport, R. Move To Lessen Traffic Hazards Is Undertaken

A Citizens Traffic Committee for Cisco was formed at a meeting of civic workers at 10 a. m. Saturday in the offices of the Chamber of Commerce. Charlie Burke was selected to serve as chairman and Cathryn Cunningham was named secretary.

The committee was organized for the purpose of making the city and vicinity a safer and better place to live by helping citizens to become better and safer drivers through a campaign of observing traffic errors and calling them to the attention of the driver and pedestrian. The committee will appoint secret observers to be known as T-Men, whose duties are to observe traffic in Cisco and report violations to the Chief of Police by means of a card that will be issued by the police commissioner, who is a member of the steering committee. The identity of the observers will be known only to the committee and the police commissioner, who will issue a number to the observer. The police department will know the observer by number only.

When the T-Men observe a traffic violation he has a card on which the violation is listed. The license number of the vehicle will be placed on the card and the owner will be traced. The card will be mailed to the chief who will caution the driver and explain the infraction. Continued violations will result in disciplinary action. Names of convicted persons will be made public and habitual violators can be deprived of driving privileges.

According to a report issued by Homer Garrison, director of the state department of public safety, Cisco and Eastland County rate among the highest in the state for accidental traffic deaths per capita.

Glen Covington, safety supervisor of the Lone Star Gas Co., Ranger, met with the committee and aided in the preliminary work.
