A fighting Wrangler eleven battled a heavier San Angelo Junior College team to a standstill on the opponents home field Thursday night and held the highly publicized Rams to a scoreless tie in the opening game for both teams.

The game was played on a rain soaked field and intermittent showers soaked players and fans alike. A rain soaked ball and hard defensive play on the part of the Wranglers forced the Rams to fumble 13 times during the game and an alert group of Cisco Junior College boys recovered nine of them.

The play was highlighted by two goal line stands by the Wranglers after the Rams had driven deep into their territory. On one occasion the locals held for downs on the seven yard line and again they took possession of the ball on the one foot line after the Rams failed to score on four successive tries.

The Wranglers threatened one time when Black intercepted a pass and sped 34 yards toward the enemy goal. A fumble nullified the chances to score. The Wranglers emerged from the game without serious injury and the entire squad will be ready for work on the game with Odessa Junior College at Chesley Field on September 29.

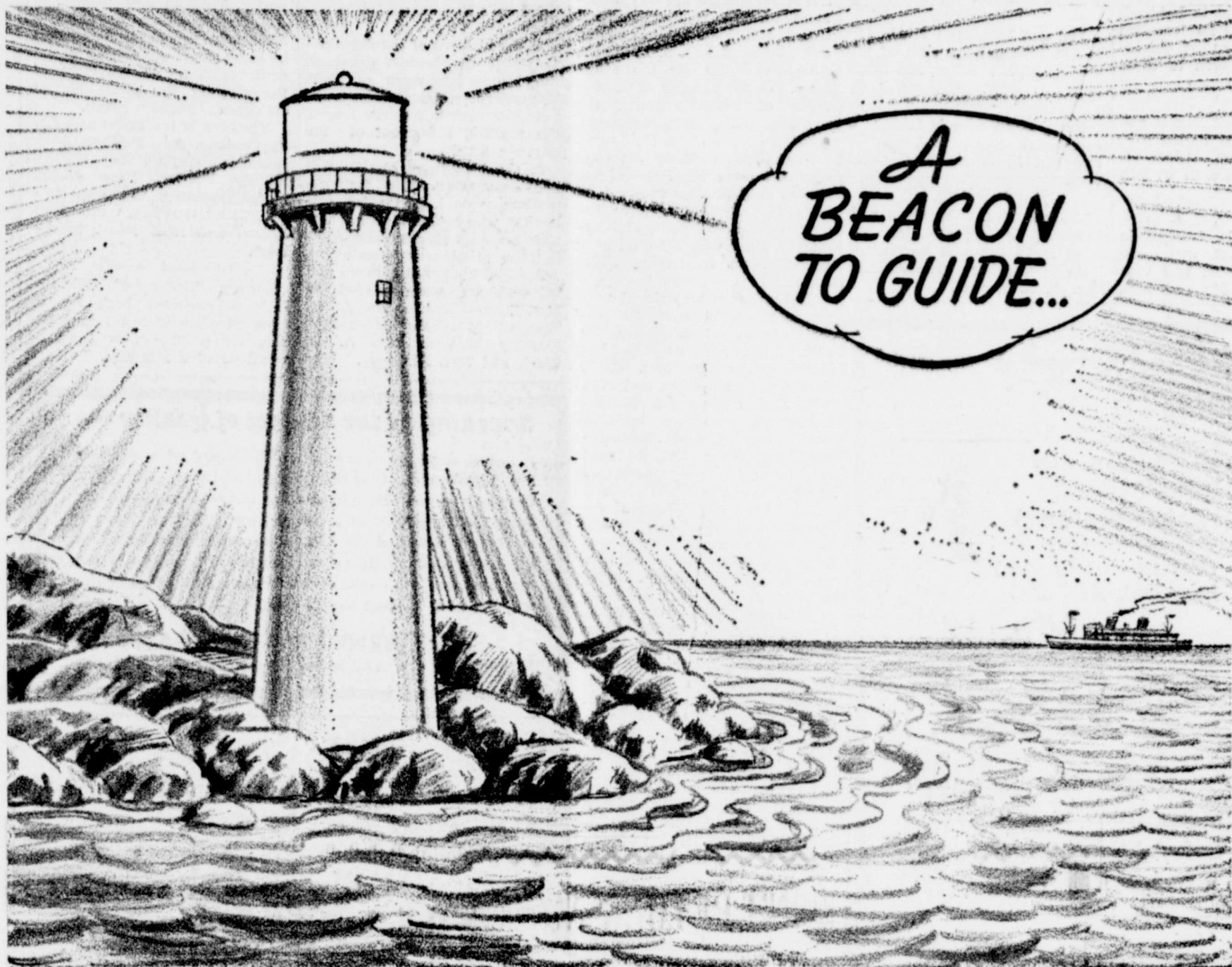

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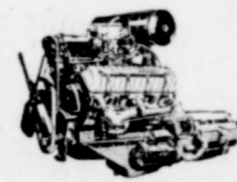
