

Officials of the state fair have extended a hearty welcome to stockmen to visit this exhibit of top - quality Aberdeen - Angus cattle, states Frank Richards, secretary of the Amerian Aberdeen-Angus Breeders' Associa-

tion, Chicago. In addition to the silver trophie that is to be presented the top exhibitors, cash premiums totaling \$11,500 will be awarded. Judging of the cattle will begin on October 11. Folling the completion of the judging on Ottober 12, a sale of 70 head of registered bulls and females will be held in the livestock arena on

Plans were being made to place into operation the Citizens Traffic Committee's educational program on October 1, it was an nounced Tuesday by Chairman Charles Burke.

The committee was formed at a meeting held recently which was attended by representatives of all civic organizations, churches, schools and chamber of commerce and city officials.

At the meeting it was decided to appoint secret observers, to be known as T-men, who would observe violations of traffic ordinances and report them to the local police officers. The officer would in turn write a letter to the offender, telling him of the infraction and asking him to use caution in the future.

The program was designed to educate the public on safety and to remind citizens of their obligations to their community and their fellow man. In working with the committee, local police officials promised to follow up all cases and in instances of repeated violations to take diciplinary action.

The project was designed to lessen traffic accidents resulting in death or injury to citizens and extensive property damage. Cisco rates high in the number of accidents and deaths among towns of its population group and it is hoped to make a better showing through a process of education.

Prior to the opening of the actual campaign the committee decided to publish traffic laws in order to acquaint the public with the things which will be observed. The first group is as

1. A flashing yellow signal neans a driver may proceed only with caution but without being required to stop.

2. Failure to stop at the scene of an accident in which you have been involved and which felony.

3. An accident resulting in football star now playing with death or personal injury must

4. When overtaking a school bus a driver may proceed past the halted bus after stopping and assuring himself that the way is clear. He may not exceed 10 miles per hour.

5. It is against the law for a pedestrian to walk across a street intersection against a red

6. It is a violation of the state law to double park. 7. Vehicles engaged in the

transportation of passengers, including school busses, must be equipped with fire extinguish-8. Trailors must be equipped

with two reflectors at the rear, in addition to a red tail light. 9. It is unlawful for any per-

son to drive a vehicle while under the influence of any narcotic drug. Violation of this rule makes the driver subject to confinment in the county jail for. ten days to two years or a fine of not less than \$50 nor more than \$500 or both.

10. Every person who drives t vehicle in willful or wanton disregard of the safety of others or without due caution and at a speed or in a manner so as to endanger a person or property shall be guilty of reckless driv-
