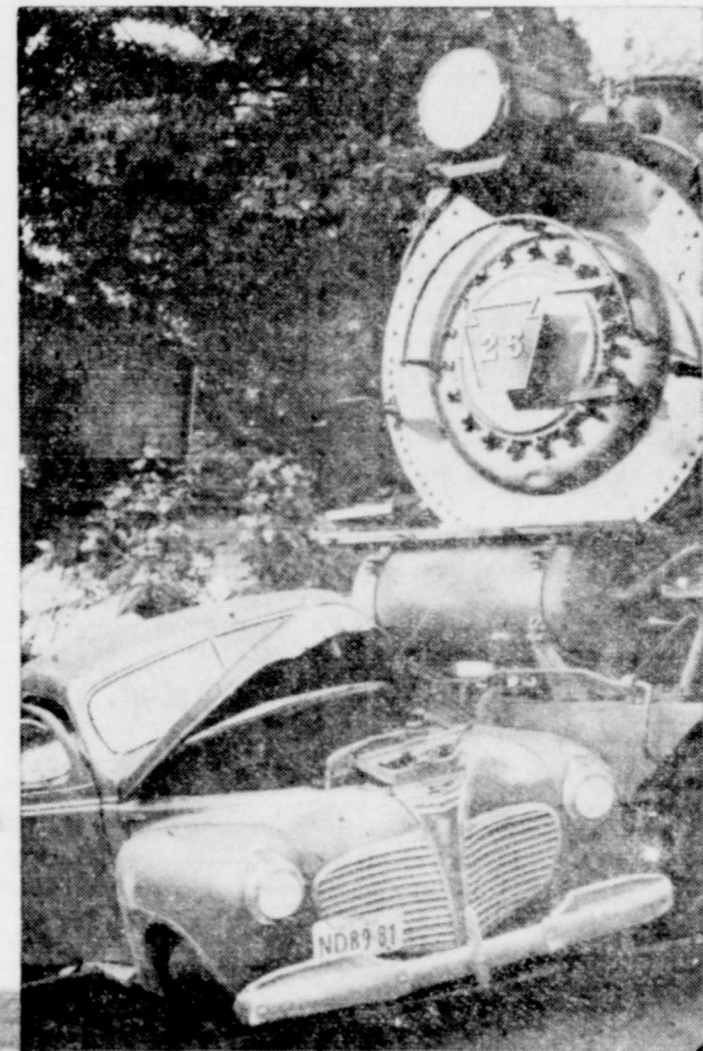

Traffic Committee To Begin Program October 1; Lists Common Violation

Plans were being made to place into operation the Citizens Traffic Committee's educational program on October 1, it was announced Tuesday by Chairman Charles Burke.

The committee was formed at a meeting held recently which was attended by representatives of all civic organizations, churches, schools and chamber of commerce and city officials.

At the meeting it was decided to appoint secret observers, to be known as T-men, who would observe violations of traffic ordinances and report them to the local police officers.

The program was designed to educate the public on safety and to remind citizens of their obligations to their community and their fellow man.

The project was designed to lessen traffic accidents resulting in death or injury to citizens and extensive property damage.

Prior to the opening of the actual campaign the committee decided to publish traffic laws in order to acquaint the public with the things which will be observed.

Street Paving Project Expected To Get Under Way Here This Week

Initial work on the citywide paving program was expected to get underway this week when the Royce L. Boyd Company will move in equipment to begin surfacing the 200 block of West 10th Street.

All property owners on the block, including the Cisco Independent School District, signed the petition asking for the paving. The block to be paved is in front of the north entrance of the West Ward School.

Preliminary work calls for the laying of a curb on some of the property and for the filling and leveling of the block before the laying of the primary coat and topping.

When work is completed on the first block the workmen and machinery will move to the 900 and 1000 block on Front Street where approximately two blocks will be paved.

THINK OF THE NEXT GENERATION

Excerpts from "The Economic Outlook of Tomorrow" by Herbert Hoover
An Address By HERBERT HOOVER at the reception tendered by Stanford University on his 75th birthday, August 10, 1949

No nation can remain static and survive. But dynamic progress is not made with dynamite. And that dynamite today is the geometrical increase of spending by our governments—federal, state, municipal and local.

But beyond this the seriously proposed further spending now in process will take another 20 days' work from Mr. and Mrs. Average W. Citizen.

Taking out holidays, Sundays, and average vacations, there are about 235 working day's in the year. Therefore, this total of 81 day's work a year for taxes will be about one week out of every month.

One end result of the actual and proposed spendings and taxes to meet them is that the Government becomes the major source of credit and capital to the economic system.

There is a considerable group of fuzzy-minded people who are engineering a compromise between free men and these European infections. They fail to realize that our American system has grown away from the systems of Europe for 250 year. They have the foolish notion that a collectivist economy can at the same time preserve personal liberty and constitutional government. That cannot be done.

—The steady lowering of the standard of living by this compromised collectivist system under the title "austerity" in England should be a sufficient spectacle for the American people. It aims at an abundant life but it ends in a ration.

In the long run it is the Average Working Citizen who pays by hidden and other taxes. I have made up a little table showing the number of days which this kind of citizen must work on average to pay the taxes.
