The Texas Railroad Commis sion Friday denied the request of the Missourl-Kansas-Texas Railway Co. to stop two passenger trains now being run on the Texas Central Division between Waco and Stamford.

The railroad first asked for the discontinuance last May and the request was protested by a few of the towns along the route Whitney voiced the loudest protest and demanded a hearing before the board. Cisco entered no protest but entered into the request for the hearing. Other towns, including DeLeon and Stamford joined Cisco in filling no protest. Albany also offered no protest and asked no hear-

The railroad stressed the fact that the request was not for a discontinuence of service but for permission to substitute mixed trains along the route. A careful check by local chamber of commerce officials revealed that there would be no disruption of service in the mails, freight or passenger service Freight service would be benefitted by the change because the company would be forced to run freight trains seven days per week If mixed trains were permitted.

The Railroad Commission left the door open to further hearings when they advised railroad officials that they could renew their request in 1950 when they were able to present a full years figure on revenue and expenses.




