

# Texas Farmers Take Advantage Of Open Weather To Harvest Fall Crops

fields over most of the state Trans-Pecos area was producing from early to late, harvesting unusually good late grass. Shomature crops in the warm, open weather and drilling small grains with near ideal moisture counties where range feed was open bolls; however, many gins were already operating on a 24 hour basis.

In the northwest, drilling and re-drilling wheat made excellent progress. A substantial acreage was already up to a stond. And some fields were being re-planted because of additional volunteer sprouting after seeding and also because of crusting following recent rains.

Cotton harvest was active in weather. In central and north central Texas, rapid maturity of an exceptionally good crop was over taxing available harvesting and ginning facilities. Early attempts to use mechanical strippers have been unsatisfactory due to the excessive number of green bolls. Picking was resumed in the southern high plains and low rolling plains as warm, sunny weather dried fields and stimulated the opening of bolls,

### Public Backs Stand Of Grocery Firm

As letters, telegrams and telephone calls continue to deluge stores and offices of the Great Alantic & Pacific Tea Company, protesting anti-trust efforts to disolve the company, the 90-year old food chain released this week a second full-page advertisement to 2000 newspapers across the country.

A flood of endorsements of the A&P came from housewives, farmers, manufacturers and labor leaders. According to the new message appearing under the headline "Why Do They Want To Put A&P Out of Business?" the Company reported: "an enormous number of customers are telling our store managers and clerks that they want to continue to enjoy our low prices and quality foods: farmers and other suppliers are asking what they can do to preserve this efficient outlet for their products, and our 110,000 employees are asking us to protect their jobs and pensions. Labor leaders are wiring us their opposition to this threat to labor's living standards. If all of these people will be hurt why then do the anti-trust lawyers want to put A&P out of business?"

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
