Cotton Use Jumps 17 Percent Over July Figures

AUSTIN, Sept. 29 — Cotton consumption in Texas, totaling 12,237 running bales in August, rose 17 per cent from July, but slid 5 per cent from August 1948, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reported.

Consumption of cotton linters in August fell 10 per cent from July to 2,866 running bales, a level 40 per cent above August a year ago.

Active cotton spindles in August rose 2 per cent from July, while average spindle hours increased 5 per cent. Active spindles decreased 11 per cent and average spindle hours 12 per cent under August 1948.

Electric Consumption Shows Increase

AUSTIN, Sept. 29. — Electric power consumption in Texas increased 3 per cent from July to August and 6 per cent from August 1948, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reported.

All types of power use showed gains in August over both July and August a year earlier. Residential consumption rose 6 per cent from July to August and commercial and industrial consumption increased 3 per cent.

Compared with August 1948, commercial consumption rose 13 per cent in August; residential 4 per cent; and industrial, 1 per cent.

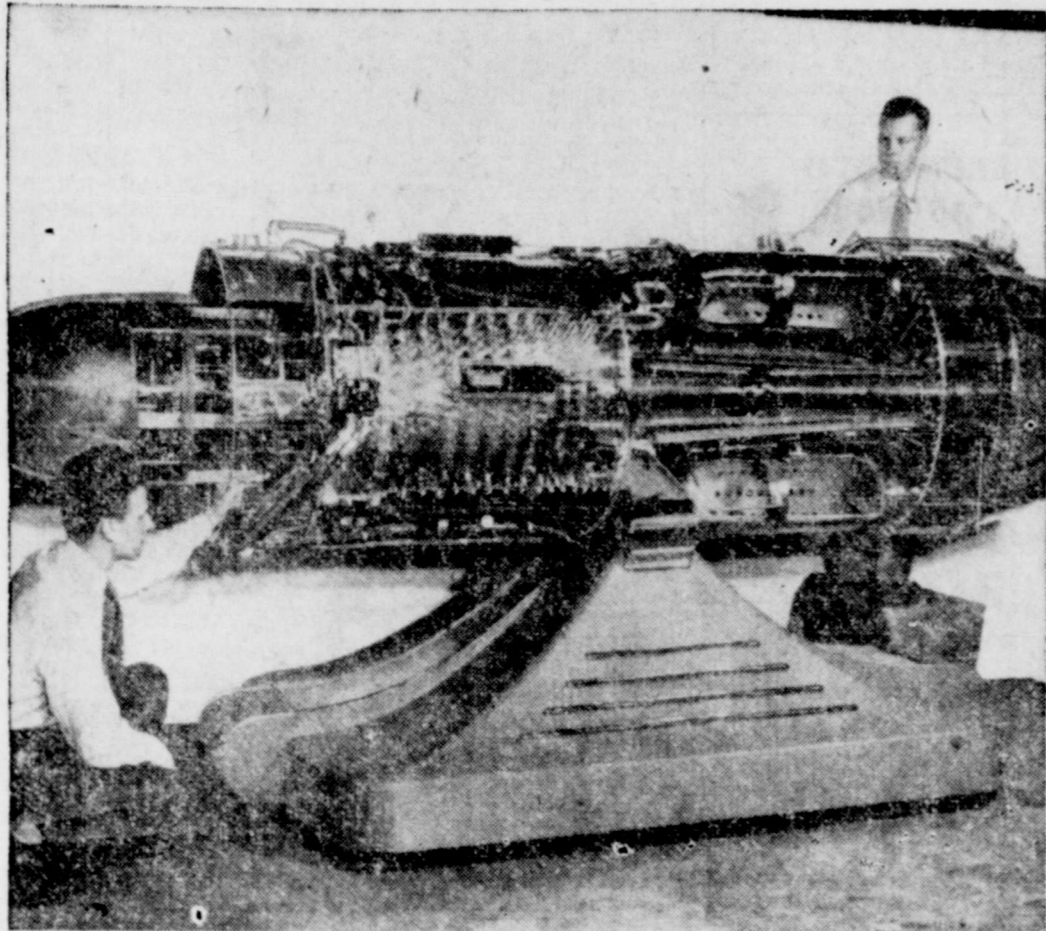
Lions Hear Reports On Zone Meeting

Texas Farmers Take Advantage Of Open Weather To Harvest Fall Crops

Texas farmers were in the fields over most of the state from early to late, harvesting mature crops in the warm, open weather and drilling small grains with near ideal moisture for germination. Additional cotton pickers could be used as many fields were white with open bolls; however, many gins were already operating on a 24 hour basis.

In the northwest, drilling and re-drilling wheat made excellent progress. A substantial acreage was already up to a stand. And some fields were being re-planted because of additional volunteer sprouting after seeding and also because of crusting following recent rains.

Cotton harvest was active in most areas favored by open weather. In central and north central Texas, rapid maturity of an exceptionally good crop was over taxing available harvesting and ginning facilities. Early attempts to use mechanical strippers have been unsatisfactory due to the excessive number of green bolls. Picking was resumed in the southern high plains and low rolling plains as warm, sunny weather dried fields and stimulated the opening of bolls.

All classes of livestock were doing unusually well on the generally plentiful range feed

supply. Additional rain in the Trans-Pecos area was producing unusually good late grass. Showers also in most southern counties where range feed was dry will be very beneficial. A few plains farmers were beginning to turn stock on volunteer wheat, but most wheat will not be ready to graze for at least 30 days.

WACO, Sept. 29 (Spl.) — Stanley Williams and Mitford Johnson of Cisco will be with the Baylor Bears when they board a special charter plane Friday morning for Starkville, Mississippi where they will meet the Mississippi State Maroons Saturday afternoon.

The Bruins came out of their 20-6 victory over the South Carolina Gamecocks in perfect physical condition, though Coach Bob Woodruff admitted that his defense and ground game in the contest was far from what he wanted.

Big Adrian Burk showed that caliber by completing 10 out of 12 passes against South Carolina for a net gain of 130 yards and two touchdowns. He received much help from ends Stanley Williams and J. D. Leon, both of whom made outstanding catches between two Gamecock defenders for touchdowns.

EASTLAND COUNTY FARM BUREAUS TO CONDUCT MEMBERSHIP DRIVE

"Plans are developing for Eastland County Farm Bureau's participation in State-wide Membership Enrollment Week, October 20-27," E. E. Blackwell, President, said today. Approximately fifty workers will vol-

unteer their services during Enrollment Week to contact friends and neighbors inviting them to join Farm Bureau.

Membership Week will be officially launched by State Farm Bureau president, J. Walter Hammond on October 20 at 8:30 p. m. when he addresses Texas farmers over the radio network. Other agricultural leaders of prominence will also be heard on the program.

On October 21, the Farm Bureau leadership expects to have 10,000 workers throughout the State soliciting Farm Bureau memberships. Mr. Blackwell said. The state goal is 70,000. Eastland County's goal is 300.

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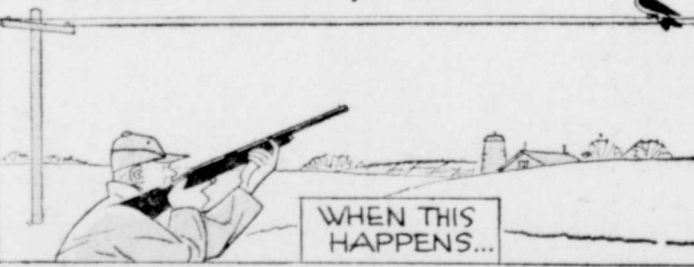

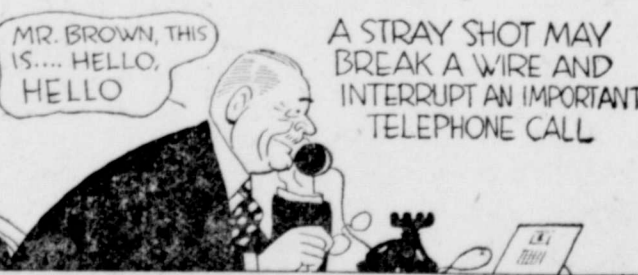

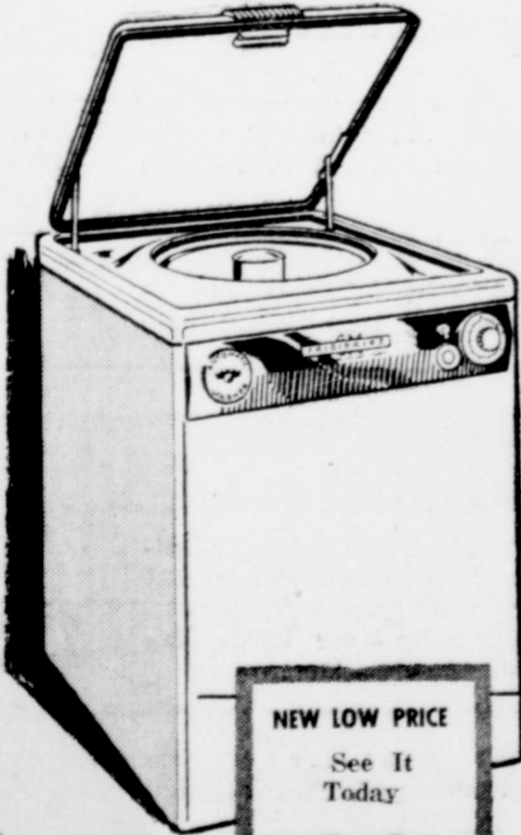
