Lobos Shift Line-Up For Game With Graham Friday

Coaches Jack Everett and Buck Overall will present a shifted lineup and a change in formation to fans who accompany the Cisco High School Lobos to Graham for the game Friday night.

The change in the line places Watts at center in the place of Leo Evans, who has started all games this season.

The addition of Watts will give some needed weight in the center of the line. Waddell has been shifted from his tackle slot to guard and will divide his time with McMurphy and Suggs.

Porter has been shifted from end to a tackle post and McGowan and Brunkenhoefer will be in at ends.

In the backfield in the T-formation it will probably be Johnson at quarterback, Jackson and Farley at halfbacks and Harwell at fullback.

Much of this week has been spent in earning plays used in single wing formations. Johnson plays at tailback, Harwell at full, Jackson at blocking back and Callerman and Farley at the wing.

Pippen will be used much of the time in the backfield in both formations.

Coaches Everett and Overall have changed their defensive plays to meet the speed of the Graham Steers and expressed satisfaction with the progress of the team.

The Lobos will leave after lunch Friday and will arrive in Graham in time for a light meal and rest before the 8 p. m. kickoff. Some 24 squad members will make the trip. A large number of fans were expected to make the 63 mile trip with the band and pep squad.

Texas farmers made rapid progress for the second consecutive week harvesting corn and getting small grains and winter vegetables planted under ideal conditions. All available cotton pickers were in the fields, and many gins continued to operate on a 24-hour basis. Wheat seeding was near completion in many high plains counties, and soil preparation and seeding made rapid progress in the low rolling plains counties.

In the northwest, drilling of wheat made excellent progress and a substantial acreage is up to a good stand. Farmers in a few central areas were waiting for more favorable moisture.

Cotton harvesting neared completion in south central counties and continued active in the north central and northwest

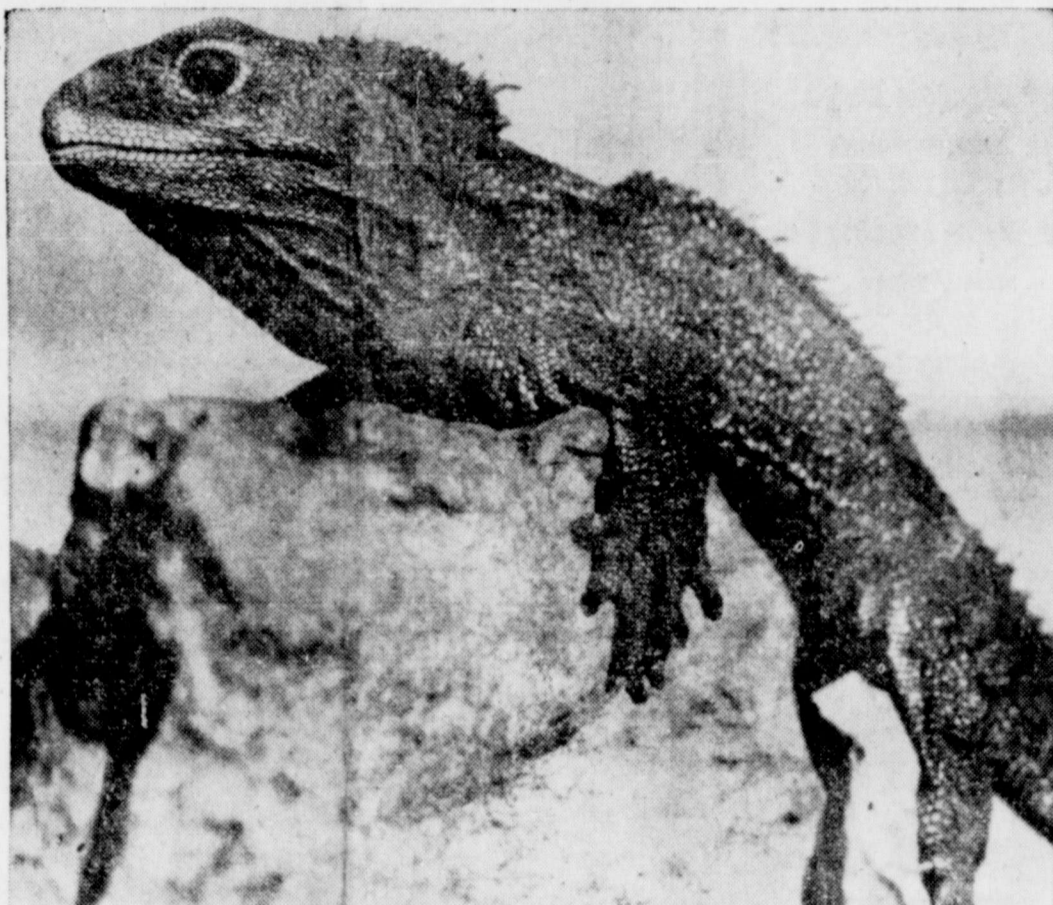

The Texas State Department of Health recommends that vaccination against this disease be administered at three months of age with a booster dose of vaccine when the baby is two years old. Two Men Wanted On Check Charges Held In Lubbock

Local Housing Authority Set Up; Body Applies For 250 Rental Units

A Cisco Housing Authority has made application to the Federal Housing Authority for the erection of 250 housing units here, it was reported today. The application was filed this week with FHA's regional office in Dallas and has been forwarded to Washington for action.

The request was made by the local housing authority composed of Charles Spears, chairman; S. H. Nance, vice chairman; R. L. Ponsler, Charles S. Sandler and Norman Houston. The local group will supervise the project upon its acceptance and completion and will work out the details required by the government as to location and so forth.

Guardsmen To Get Pay For Special Camp Work

Checks for members of Battery A, 648th Field Artillery, who were sent on special detail to prepare for summer camp were at the office at the armory located at Cisco Junior College and will be distributed on week days according to an announcement by Capt. O. O. Odom and Sgt. Frank Schlaepfer.

Capt. Odom also announced that the recruiting campaign had resulted in building the unit to 70 enlisted men and two officers. The unit is now the largest of its type in the state and the drive was still in progress. Openings for 29 enlisted men and three officers remain to be filled and officers expressed confidence that the full quota would be reached soon.

Officers needed are maintenance officer, executive officer and platoon officer. Several veterans of World War II were enrolled during the drive and others were expected to follow.

Capt. Odom also announced the arrival of a new Half-track with SCR radio equipment. It will be used in Military Amateur Radio Station work. At the present there are two men assigned to the unit as operators. They are Glen Henson and Charles Wende. There are three openings for radiomen.

Three men received honorable discharges recently. One member moved from Cisco and two are working away from the city and unable to attend drills.

Those interested in becoming a member of the unit were asked to contact Capt. Odom, Sgt. Schlaepfer or any member of the Battery.

It approved the buildings will be of permanent construction, either of brick or stucco. The project will be built and maintained by the government without cost to the city except for the laying of service lines to the property lines.

The units will be built according to housing authority specifications, to cost approximately \$1,750 per room. Each unit will be equipped with central heating units, laundries and playgrounds and nurseries for children.

The project can be composed of either single, double or multiple units, at the option of the housing authorities and can be located at places decided upon after a study has been made of the need.

If the application is approved plans call for the erection of a part of the units in the negro and Mexican section of the city.

The program was designed as a low rental project and certain requirements as to earnings and character have been set up. It was a part of the President's program to provide adequate housing for the low salaried group, which was passed by the present Congress.

The local housing group was given a careful study and every consideration.

The play entitled "Gone With the Girls" will be put on by the girls basketball teams of Desdemona High school.

Admission will be 15 cents for students and 35 cents for adults and the proceeds will be used for purchasing warm-up suits, first aid kits and jackets for the Queens.

Under the tutelage of Dorothy Shaver the Queens have been working out for the last few weeks and have played two games. They dropped the opener to Desdemona 12-19 and defeated Eastland Monday night 39-12.

Tuesday night they go to Scranton where they will play the Scranton girls. Desdemona also defeated Scranton earlier in the season. On Thursday night of next week the Queens go to Williams for a game. On Tuesday night, October 18, Desdemona will play at the Community Gym.

Admission price for the home games, until regular season starts, has been set at 10 cents for college and public school students and 15 cents for adults.

Both teams are strong contenders, with the visitors holding a slight edge because of speed and experience.

Coach Clark of the Buldogs has built his attack around the speed and passing ability of

Halfback Reed, who was largely responsible for the defeat handed the Wranglers in last year's encounter. Reed is a fine ball carrier and keeps the opponents guessing. He can pass from any angle and with an enviable record of completions. Hopson at the opposite halfback post is also an able runner and will have to be watched on every down.

The Wranglers will pit a slight weight advantage and a fast charging line against the

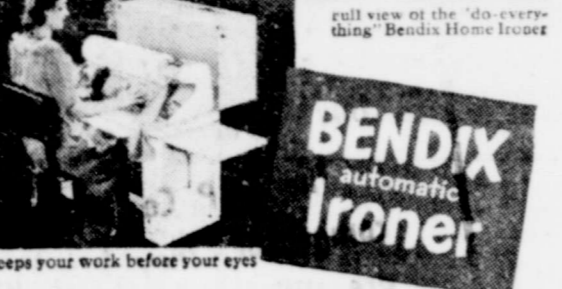
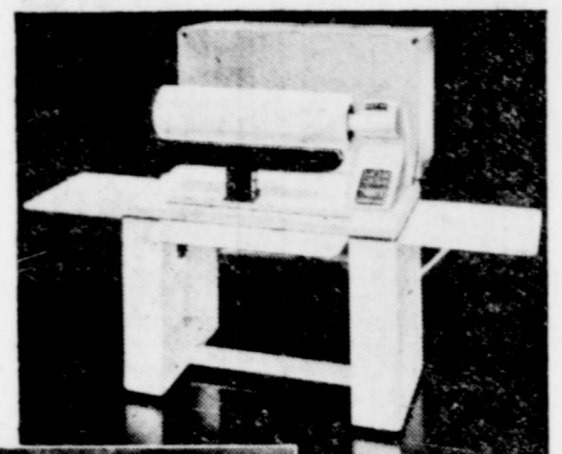
