A verdict of murder and suicide was rendered Monday by Justice of the Peace E. N. Turner in the deaths of Mr. and Mrs. C. J. Williams of Carbon. Williams, 55, and his wife, 47, were found dead on the floor of the living room of their home just east of Carbon Sunday afternoon. The bodies were found by relatives who broke into the house after they became alarmed when Mr. Williams failed to report for work in an Eastland grocery store Friday or Saturday. Mrs. Williams' head was resting on the arm of her husband and a .410 gauge shotgun was on the floor between the bodies. One empty shell case was found on the floor and another in the gun. The relatives called the Eastland County sheriff, who sent officers to the scene of the shooting. The investigation showed that the shooting occurred some time Thursday night. An oven burner was on in the kitchen and a fire was burning under a coffee percolator. A light was burning in the house. The couple was last seen alive at 10 p. m. Thursday night. Records showed that Mrs. Williams had filed suit for divorce in the 91st District Court about two weeks ago. She had been visiting her son, an ex-Navy man who resides with his family in Fort Worth, and returned to Carbon last Monday. Funeral services will be held in Carbon Wednesday afternoon and burial will be in the Carbon cemetery.
