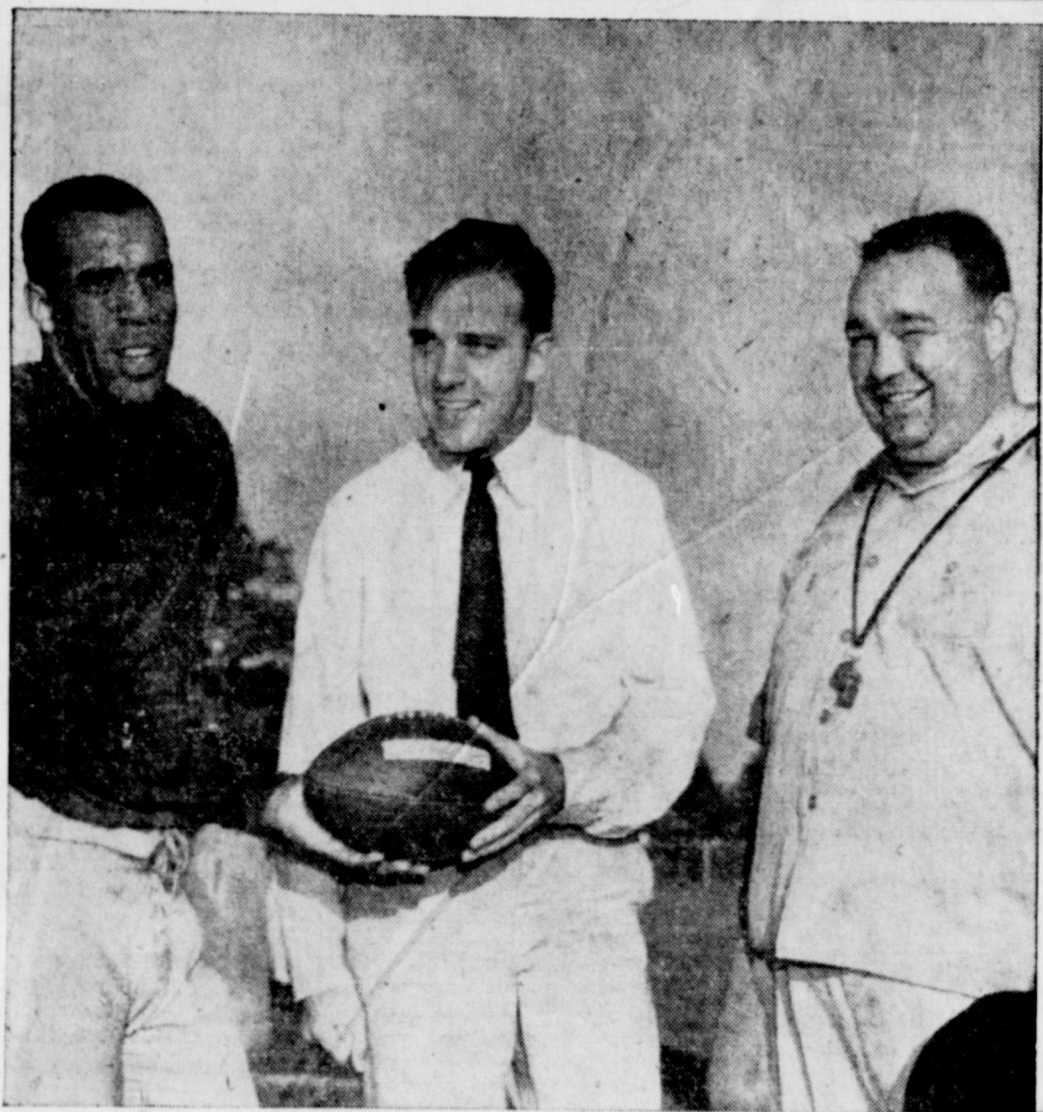

Stephenville's Air Power Too Much For Lobos Friday Night

The fighting Lobos roundly outplayed the Stephenville Yellowjackets on Stephenville's new football field Friday night only to see the gold shirted boys from Erath County take to the air to score four of their field touchdowns in the first half. The Lobos scored only one field goal in the second half.

The other touchdown came after the Jackets recovered a Lobo fumble on their own 35. The two teams fumbled a total of 10 times during the course of the game which was played on a wet field.

After a scoreless first quarter Sophomore quarterback Jimmy Everett tossed a 35 yard pass which was taken in by Hal Pilgrim on the Lobo 17. He carried the ball to the 12 and Billy Ross scored from there. Ross was the whole show for the yellowjackets — scoring four of the teams five touchdowns.

The Lobos took the kick after the touchdown on their own ten yard line and worked it up to the 35 where they lost the ball on a fumble. The Jackets took it to the 12 where Ross went over for a six pointer. The kick was good and the score stood 13-0.

After the intermission the Yellowjackets took the kick-off and ran it back to tie 40. On passes and running plays they took the ball to the two and Ross went over for the score. The kick was no good.

Late in the third quarter the Stephenville team recovered a Lobo fumble on the Cisco 20 and Everett faked the ball to Ross and dropped back and hit Jimmy Howell with a pass. Howell was in the clear and went over without opposition.

Polio Decline Noted During Past Week

The Texas State department of health reported that the number of polio cases in Texas dropped to 36 last week, the lowest since last May 7.

The latest report brought the total for this far this year to 2,946 cases. A total of 191 counties have reported cases.

Last year at this time, 1,553 cases had been reported from 154 counties. Counties having one case each include: Bexar, Cooke, Dawson, Fisher, Howard, Lamb, McLennan, Rains, Stephens, Taylor, and Wilbarger. Haskell, Jones and Throckmorton Counties, two cases each; Harris, three; Tom Green, four; and Dallas and Tarrant counties, six.

According to a report issued by the City Tax Department, collections were setting an all-time record during the month of October. Approximately 48 per cent of the entire 1949 tax roll has been collected, according to the figures.

Collections' as of the close of business on October 20 were \$36,761.83 and at the present rate almost 70 per cent will be in by the end of the month.

The city was allowing a three per cent discount on taxes paid in October and many of the tax payers were taking advantage of the allowance.

Collections for the same period in 1948 were \$21,187.30 or \$15,574.50 less than the figure for this year.

The total taxable valuation for 1949 was \$158,000 higher than last year. The 1949 figure was \$3,021,000 as compared with \$2,863,000 for 1948.

The increase was due largely to the building of new homes and increased utility values. There was little change in valuations on older properties. Officials attribute the increased payment of taxes to the fact that more people see the value of saving the three per cent for early payment. The early payment will allow the city to plan better how to use the receipts.

Five From Cisco Invited To Attend SMU Homecoming

Five Cisco residents, active members of the SMU Alumni Association, have been extended personal invitations to attend Southern Methodist University's annual Homecoming celebration Oct. 28-30.
