

Lt. Bailey arranged for these trips by taking leave from the Squadron. He is due to return to the United States in the near



peanut growers were expected to cut a \$3,600,000 pie this year when the 1949 crop has all been gathered and sold, according to estimates by buyers and governnent graders in the six market

Some 40,000 acres were planted to the quick cash crop this year and they were averaging to the acre for what is said to be a record crop for the county. Buvers were paying an average of \$202 per ton over the county r slightly over \$3 per bushel

Each bushel is inpected by s based on a seven percent mois ure content basis. Peanuts will be accepted with up to nine and one half percent moisture but the price is slightly reduced to take care of the extra amount.
