Safe Crackers Loot Local Firm; Take \$5,000 In Cash And Checks

Safe crackers Tuesday night looted a local lumber yard and escaped with more than \$5,000 in cash and checks and an undetermined amount of valuable papers and merchandise. Sheriff J. B. Williams and local officers were working Wednesday seeking clues to the robbery which occurred at the Cisco Lumber and Supply Company sometime between 9:30 p. m. Tuesday and 7 a. m. Wednesday. The knob was knocked off the firm's safe and the cash register was forced open by the looters.

Sheriff Williams reported. The manner in which the job was handled led officers to believe it was the work of professionals. The safe was equipped with a tear gas attachment which the robbers got around by setting up an electric fan that blew the escaping gas from the office. Investigation showed that all finger prints were wiped off before the robbers left the scene. Preliminary checks showed they escaped with \$832.65 in cash and some \$5,000 in checks. Also taken in the loot were promissory notes, mortgages, liens,

sales contracts, wills and stocks and bonds. A check had not been made of merchandise but the robbers left a trail of items scattered from the building to the south gate, leaving officers to believe that some merchandise had been removed. The robbery was discovered by Clyde Cooper when he arrived to open for business at 7 a. m. Wednesday. The front door was unlocked but closed. Charles Sandler, owner, reported that he was at the yard at 9:30 p. m. Tuesday but did not notice anything out of the ordinary. The night watchman was on duty but officers believed the robbers kept a close check on him and worked between rounds. The robbers took time to eat part of a box of chocolates that was in Mr. Sandler's office and evidence showed that they went all over the store and warehouse. The fan which was used in blowing the gas from the office was taken from a store room next to one of the offices. Mr. Sandler reported that a part of the loss was covered by insurance.

Drug stores will remain open until noon. A full day of football will be on the menu for celebrants. Many Ciscoans will follow the Lobos to Breckenridge where the local team will play the Buckaroos in the final District AA game of the season for both teams.

Many will stay by their radios to listen to the Texas A&M and University of Texas game and others during the afternoon. Football fans can get an early start by going to Ranger Wednesday night when the Cisco Junior College Wranglers take on the Ranger Junior College Rangers in an important Texas Junior College Conference contest.

All in all, it will be a day of rest and Thanksgiving that the nation is at peace and enjoying prosperity.

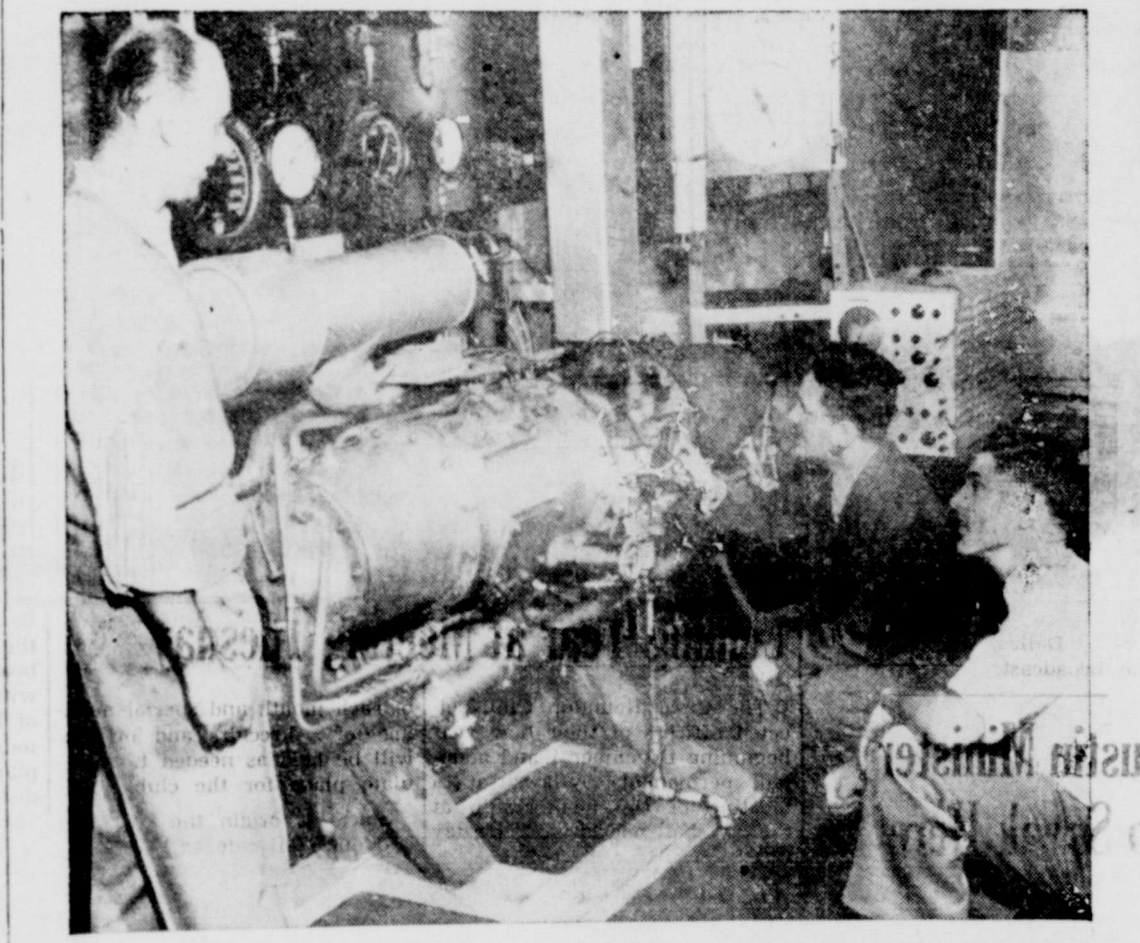

200 Bales Cotton Ginned Against 44

Cotton census report as given at by John Shrader, shows that 200 bales of cotton were ginned in Callahan County, Texas, from the crop of 1949 prior to November 1, as compared with 44 bales during the same period of 1948.

This is more than a four hundred per cent increase from the 1948 crop ginned up to November 1st, 1948. This means an income for Callahan farmer of about \$320,000 not including the seed.

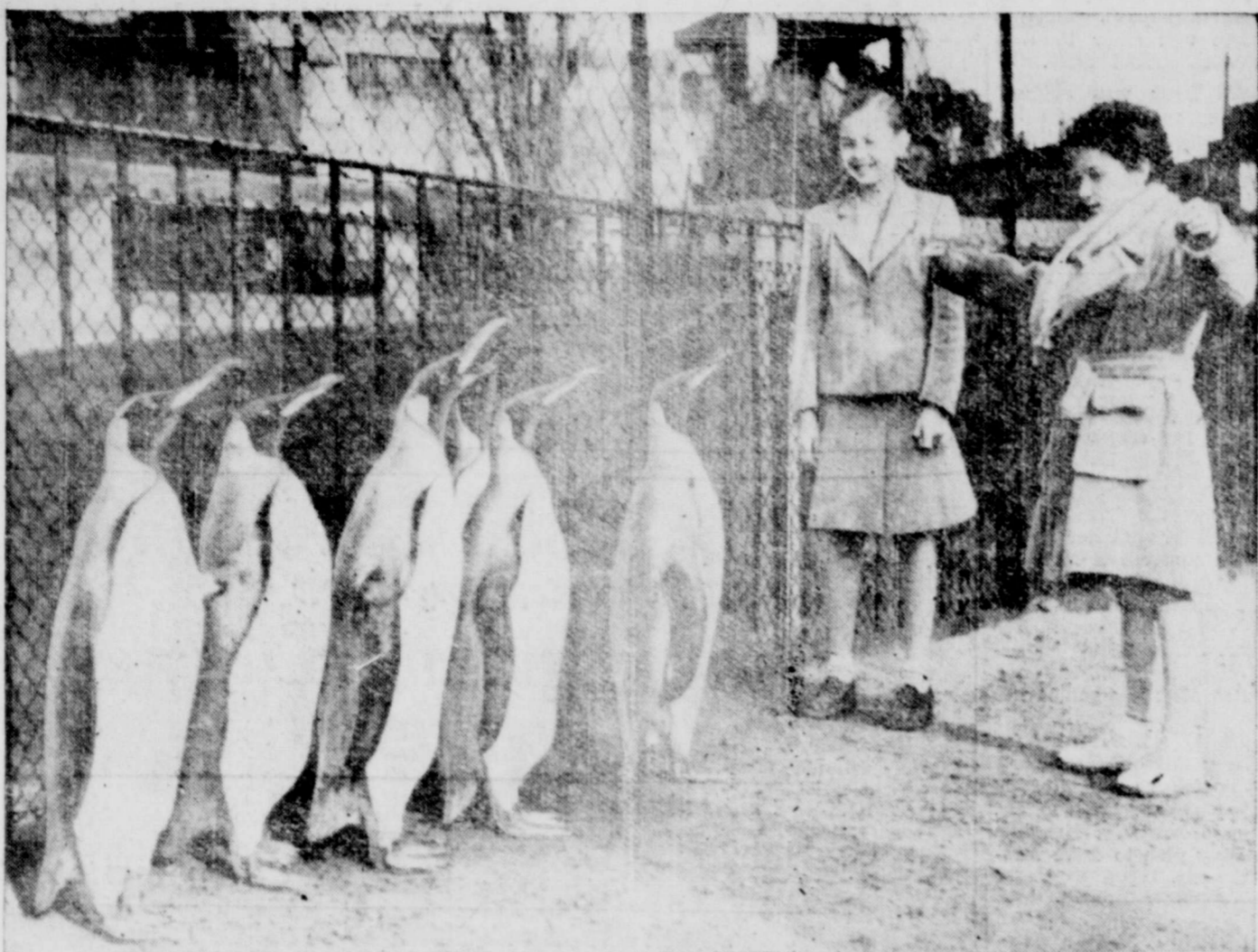
