Sally Gallagher is here from TSCW visiting her mother, Mrs. Bethel Gallagher, and other members of the family during Thanksgiving week.

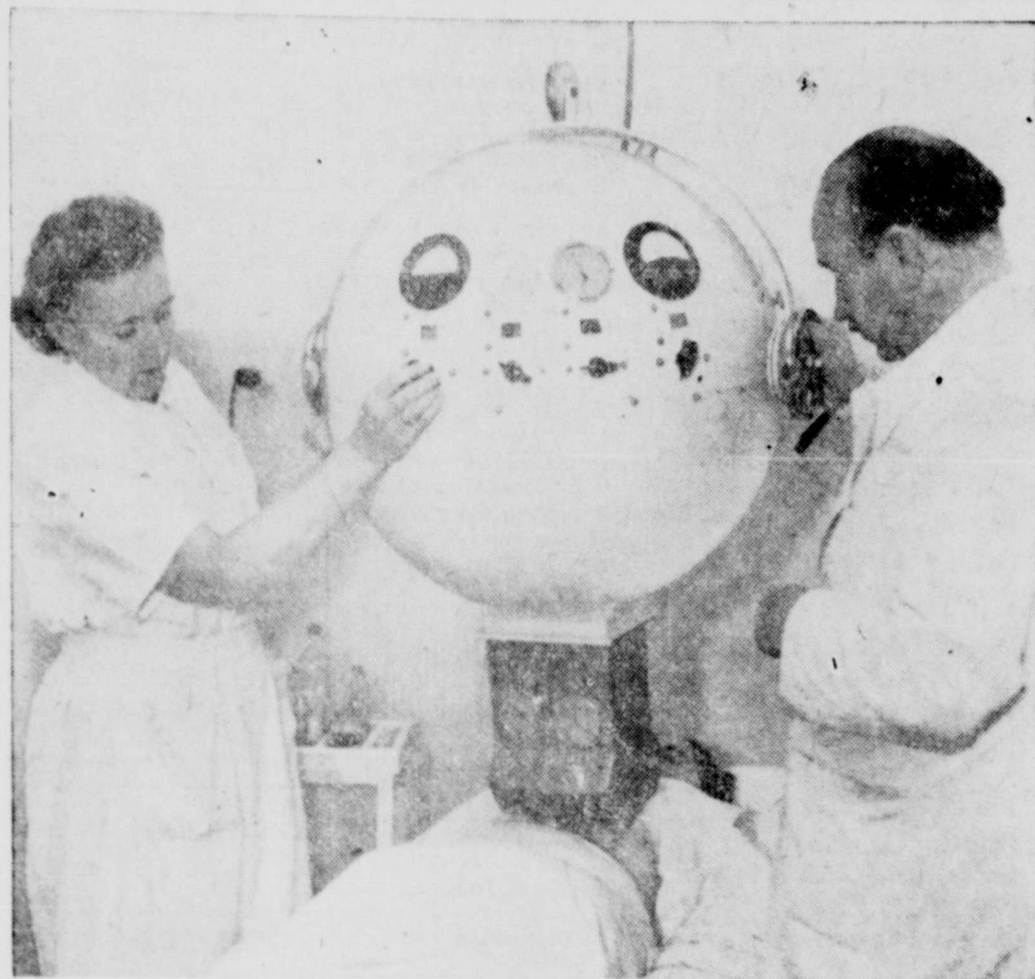

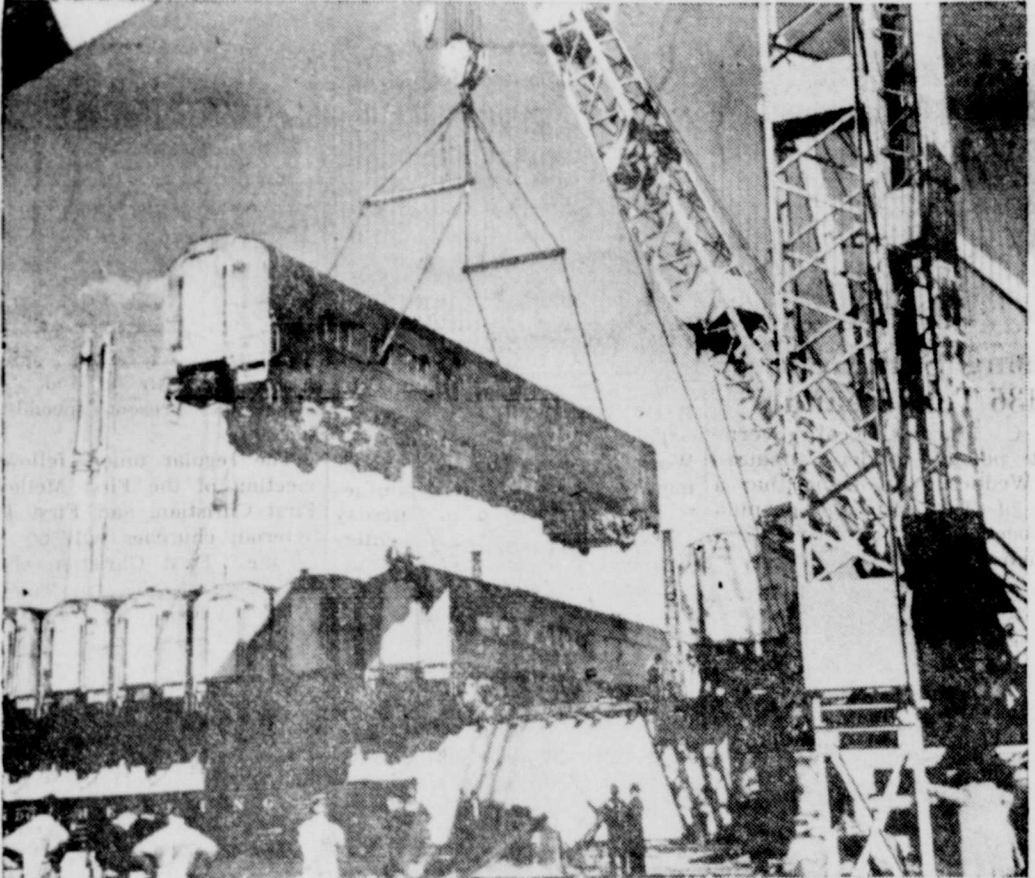

The boy king will reign on the observance date, Saturday, Nov. 19, as a symbol for all American youth while the queen will represent those who have overcome serious ailments, or other handicaps to enjoy normal lives. The Shreveport boy, eighth in a family of nine children, is the son of a widow, Mrs. Emma Smith. 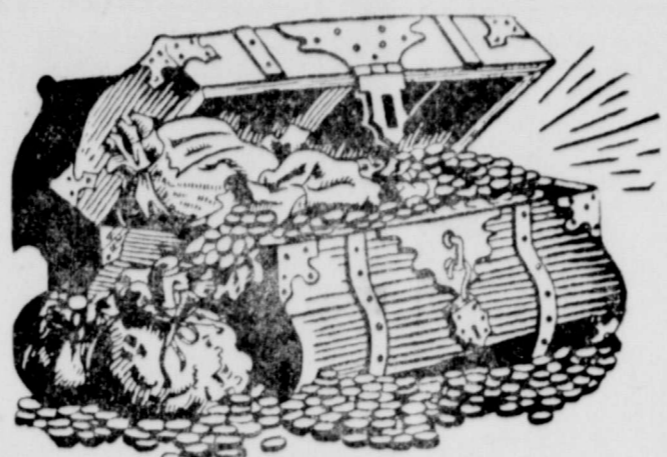

Fill a pretty new basket with several glasses of jams and jellies and send it appropriately wrapped to a friend who likes unusual containers for flower arrangements, or to a creative young bride who designs most of her clothes and needs a handy place for her sewing things. The little extra thought and planning will be appreciated and will convey the warm hospitality of one home to another.

It's easy to include a few jars of homemade jams and jellies with your Christmas gifts, too, and the result is superb.

After you've tried the recipe below, using powdered fruit pectin, I'm sure you'll agree that it is your

favorite Holiday Goodie. Make this year a "Very Merry Christmas" by giving homemade jams and jellies.

**APPLE JELLY**  
6 cups juice  
7 cups sugar  
1 box powdered fruit pectin.

To prepare the juice, Remove blossom and stem ends from about 5 pounds fully ripe apples; cut in small pieces. Do not peel or core. Add 2 cups water; bring to a boil and simmer, covered, 15 minutes. Crush with masher and simmer, covered, 5 minutes longer. Place in jelly cloth or bag and squeeze out juice. Measure 6 cups juice into a very large saucepan.

To make the jelly, Measure sugar and set aside. Place saucepan holding juice over high heat. Add powdered fruit pectin and stir until mixture comes to a hard boil. At once stir in sugar. Bring to a full rolling boil and boil hard 1 minute, stirring constantly. Remove from heat, skim, pour quickly into glasses. Paraffin at once. Makes about 13 six-ounce glasses.

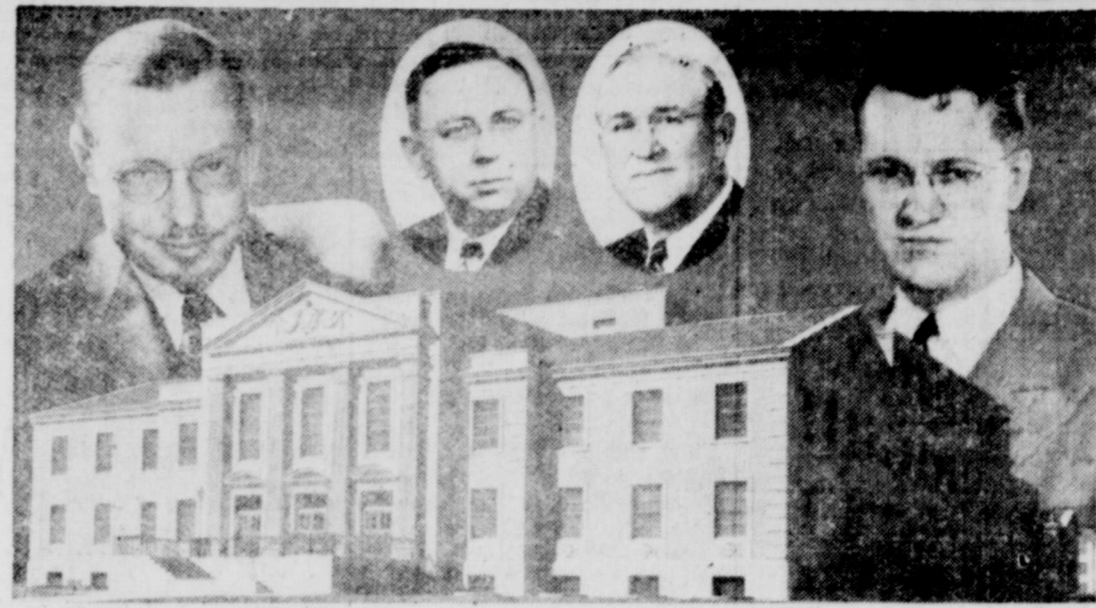

### Texas 4-H'ers Win Chicago Trips

SUPERIOR records of achievement in National 4-H Better Methods Farm Safety, Garden, and Girls' Record programs have won 1944 state championship honors for four Texas club members. Each received an all-expense trip to the 28th National 4-H Club Congress, Chicago, Nov. 27 to Dec. 1. The winners, who were selected by the state club office, and brief outlines of their records follow:

Putting to practical use the know-how gained through participation in the 1943 National 4-H Better Methods Electric program won for Hubert Ferlich, 17, of Eowena, highest State honors. Hubert, with bees as his favorite livestock project, found he could save 15 months' time and eliminate carrying 19,950 gallons of water by installing a hog waterer. This cost \$10.00, but resulted in \$150.00 extra profit through handling more hogs in the same amount of time. He saved further time and labor by using electric fencing, electrifying the farm workshop, and adding an electric motor to the gasoline run washing machine. Although spending many hours on his projects, Hubert found time to serve as president and as junior leader of his local club. His record of an educational trip to the Chicago 4-H Congress was provided by Westinghouse Educational Foundation.

To be named State winner in the National 4-H Girls' Record program means that the young lady is most proficient in not only one home-making project, but in several. This honor went to Mary Keith, 17, of Whiteface who completed six years in 4-H Club work. She has earned 587 lbs. of food for her family, sewn 176 garments of clothing and grown a 3 1/2-acre garden from which all the family vegetables are supplied and some sold in town. Mary made curtains for her brothers' room and helped put partitions in the chest of drawers. This year she plans putting a clothes closet in her own room. Mary has found time to serve her local club in almost every office and is their leader. She has been secretary and treasurer of the district, treasurer, secretary and president of the county. In recognition of her achievement, Mary was awarded an educational

trip to the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago provided by Montgomery Ward.

For doing an outstanding job in making his home, farm and community a safer place in which to live and work, Archie Martin, 16, of Memphis, was named 1944 State champion in the National 4-H Farm Safety program. Archie led a safety campaign in his home community, Estelline. Every farm was visited and a check made of hazards. Interest in correcting these hazards was furthered through community meetings and 3 radio broadcasts. To lead the way, Archie found and corrected 26 hazards around his own home and farm. During his seven years in 4-H, he followed the rules for farm safety in carrying out other projects. He also served the local club as president for two years and vice-president for three years. Archie was awarded an educational trip to the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago provided by General Motors.

Completing 14 projects in six years of 4-H Club work, Emily Weber, 15, of Victoria, was named 1944 State winner in the National 4-H Garden program. She tended 1-acre of garden, supplying the family table with fresh produce in season and enough left over to preserve for winter months. Emily experimented with new tested varieties of seed, and followed recommendations of the county agent. She gave 1 demonstration on treating seeds, placed first in county as garden demonstrator for the last two years, and won \$15.00, an all wool blanket, and 11 blue ribbons in prizes. She values her garden project at \$402.25. For her efforts, Emily was awarded an all-expense trip to the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago provided by Allis-Chalmers.

All of these winners are conducting Extension Service projects in cooperation of the Extension Service and USDA cooperating.
