Local School Board Votes To Drop To Class A Next Year

After playing in Class AA football for almost as many years as the Texas Interscholastic League has been operation, Cisco High School will be in Class A during the 1950 school year, it was announced today following a meeting of the local school board Monday.

The decision came after it was decided unanimously by the board members not to request the District Committee to consider Cisco as desiring to remain in Class AA.

The Interscholastic League placed Cisco in Class A again this year, as it had in the past, because the total number of students registered in high school did not meet the minimum requirements for Class AA competition. For the past few years the league has followed the same procedure but the district committee voted to keep Cisco in Class AA.

Cisco was placed in the District composed of Eastland, Ranger, Dublin, Comanche, DeLeon and Hamilton and will play regularly scheduled games with these schools during the next football season.

Cleburne and Graham were placed in District 6AA when the local school indicated that it desired to drop to Class A competition. District 6AA will be composed of Breckenridge, Stephenville, Weatherford, Mineral Wells and the two new schools.

The action was taken by the school board and school officials after it was decided that the step would be better for school athletics until more interest can be built up.

Cisco will finish out the school year in Class AA and will play a regular AA basketball schedule.

The District Committee was informed of the decision at a meeting Monday and members expressed regret at losing the school and indicated that the door would remain open if Cisco should decide to return in the future.

Doctors Needed In Alaska Areas

Alaska needs doctors of medicine, nurses and medical technicians. Paul H. Figg, Director of the 14th U. S. Civil Service Region announced today. Positions are available in Alaska Native Service Hospitals and salaries will include a 25 per cent boost over that paid to Federal employees holding similar positions in the United States.

Medical Officer appointments will be to the interior hospitals at Barrow, Bethel and Tanana and it is contemplated that appointees will be in charge of hospitals to which they are assigned. Living quarters are available for a physician and his family at a nominal rental.

Staff Nurses' positions are now open at Barrow, Bethel, Kanak, Kotzebue, Juneau, Tanana and Mt. Edgecumbe. Medical Technicians are needed at various Native Service Hospitals.

Doctors will be paid \$6750.00 and \$8000.00 per annum. Nurses and Technicians will be paid \$3875.00. Furnished quarters and subsistence are available at each hospital except Juneau at a rate of about \$35. per month.

Persons interested in these positions should forward their applications to Don C. Foster, General Superintendent, Bureau of Indian Affairs, Juneau, Alaska.

## Letters

West Texas' most critical problem, that of adequate water supplies, must not become a political football, to be booted around every section of the state. That was the attitude of WTCC in its annual convention last week in Ft. Worth, when it overrode all opposition and invited the U. S. Dept. of Interior to make surveys and plans for a complete conservation for the area.

Members of the legislature had proffered support of a \$200,000,000 bond issue, if control of water conservation were kept within the state, but the West Texas organization rejected the state-supported plan, and accepted co-operation of the Interior Dept. almost unanimously.

The acute water problem takes different forms in different sections of the state. In West Texas it is to conserve every drop that falls, to water the thirsty land, and enable this great rich area to develop.

Farther East it is to keep violent floods from destroying property and washing away valuable topsoil to the Gulf of

Mexico. To do this, hundreds of millions of taxpayers' funds are being expended to build reservoirs and levees, while the priceless water resource is handed over as a free gift to large cities and Eastern corporations.

In everything else, the receivers of valuable property pay for it, but in Texas natural resources, the tendencies of generous Texas legislatures are to give them away. It's time to stop giving away our valuable resources and start collecting value received for them, from those who receive and profit from them. Instead of asking for a \$200,000,000 bond issue, the legislature should vote for a water royalty.

## Gas Has Got It!



**KITCHEN MEMO**  
BY JEAN CLARKE

Persuading the children to eat their daily quota of vegetables is sometimes rather difficult unless you camouflage them with a dish like *Spicy Vegetable Casserole*. Arrange 1 1/2 cups canned green beans, cut in half, and 1 pkg. frozen asparagus (or 2 cups canned) in greased casserole dish. In a saucepan melt 2 tbsps. fat. Add 2 tbsps. flour, stir in 2 cups milk and 2 bouillon cubes. Cook until sauce thickens, then add 3/4 tsp. salt, 1/4 tsp. celery seed, 2 tbsps. prepared mustard. Pour sauce over vegetables, cover and bake in moderate gas oven (350°F.) for 25 mins. Garnish with 2 hard cooked eggs, finely chopped. Serves 6.

For every hour needed to dry a blanket on an outdoor line in average weather, it takes only 2 to 4 minutes in an automatic gas dryer. Time saved: at least three hours.

Equal parts of potato chips and corn flakes make a good topping for casserole dishes and a delicious coating for croquettes.

The average homemaker washes six tons of dishes a year—a tremendous chore unless you have plenty of hot water. The thermostat of an automatic gas water heater is usually set at 140°F. Around 120°F. is the hottest the hands can stand. For dishwashing, mix in a little cold water unless you want to re-set the thermostat each time.

Rest your stirring spoon on absorbent paper towel on the work surface of your gas range. Saves cleaning up food stains.

Canned cling peaches topped with mint jelly and broiled four inches from the flame until bubbly are good company for lamb chops.
