Retailing Guide Released By Commerce Dept.

Retailers and others engaged in distribution who wish to take advantage of the various forms of assistance available to them from Federal Government agencies will be helped by a new publication issued recently by the U. S. Department of Commerce. It is titled "1949 Guide to Government Information on Retailing." This booklet, "1949 Guide to Government Information on Retailing" is a bibliography of periodicals related to the retail trades.

It was prepared at the recommendation of the Department's Retail Trade Advisory Committee. This group of retail trade representatives from 41 national retail trade associations felt that there was a need for a simplified guide to the large amount of government-produced information of value to the nation's retailers, said the head of the Government agency producing it and also indexed by type of business and by the operational subject with which it deals. Among the latter are accounting, advertising, credit, displays, financing, merchandising, personnel training, and many others. Also listed are sources of statistics on production, trade volume, and price trend, and helpful information on the development of marketing programs.

In addition the 38-page booklet indicates which Federal agencies can be assisted to retail business men and to which of their special trade problems should be addressed. The new guide of Government retailing services may be purchased from the Dallas Field Office of the U. S. Department of Commerce, 1114 Commerce Street, at 15 cents a copy.

Eastland Pastor Talks To Lions

Rev. J. B. Blunt, Eastland minister, addressed the Cisco Lions Club on the subject of "Communism and Its Spread" at the weekly luncheon meeting at noon Wednesday at the Hotel Victor. The program was in charge of Austin Flint.

"You can't be a Christian and a Communist," Rev. Blunt said. "There is no place in the Communist doctrine for Christ and the Christian principals," he pointed out that the Communism exist primarily for the state, without considering morality or man. He warned, however, that it cannot be ignored, "for it now covers one-fifth of the world."

Rev. Blunt regarded Christianity as the only tangible challenge to Communism, pointed out that "we can't see how a doctrine can last that totally disregards God."

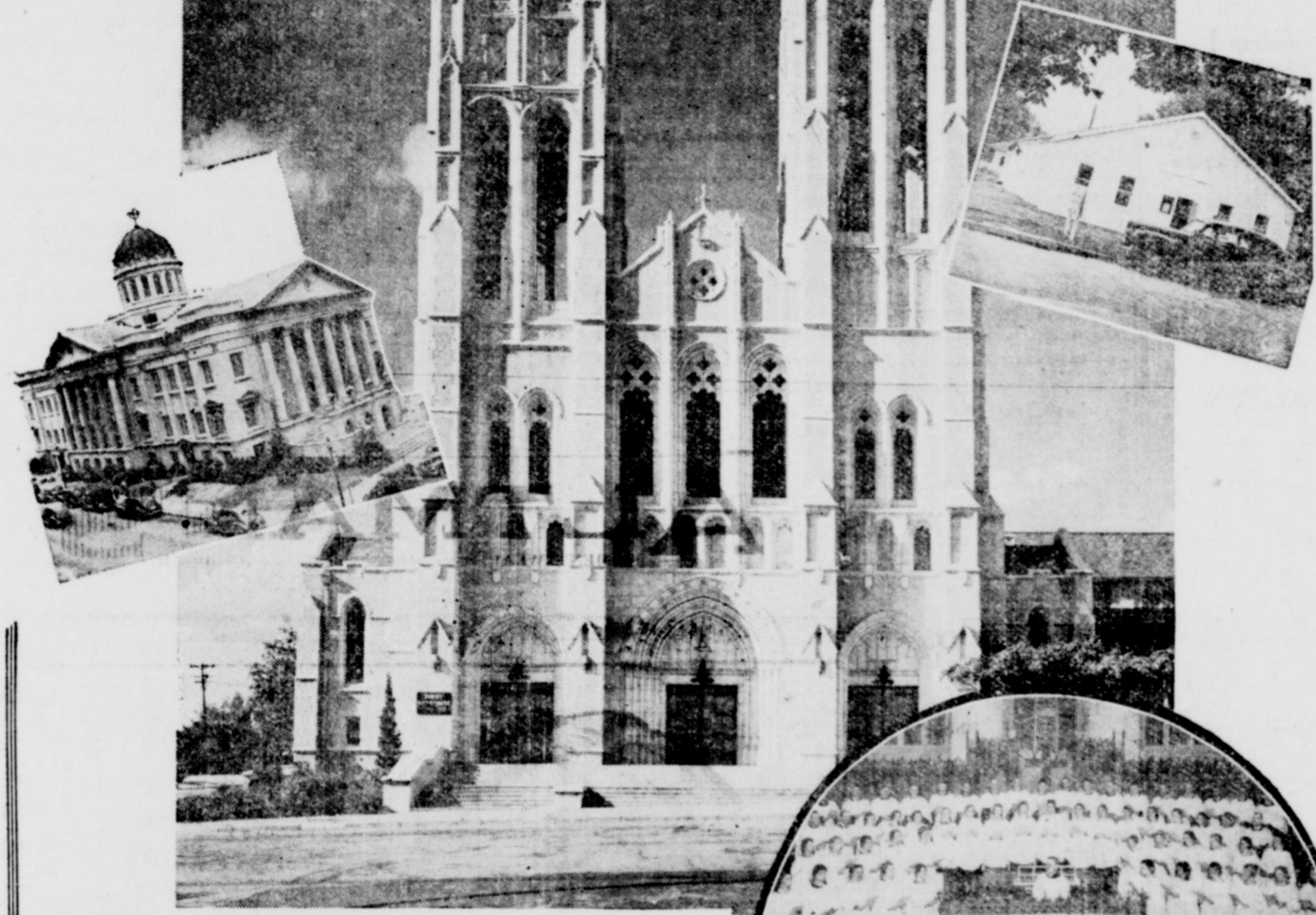

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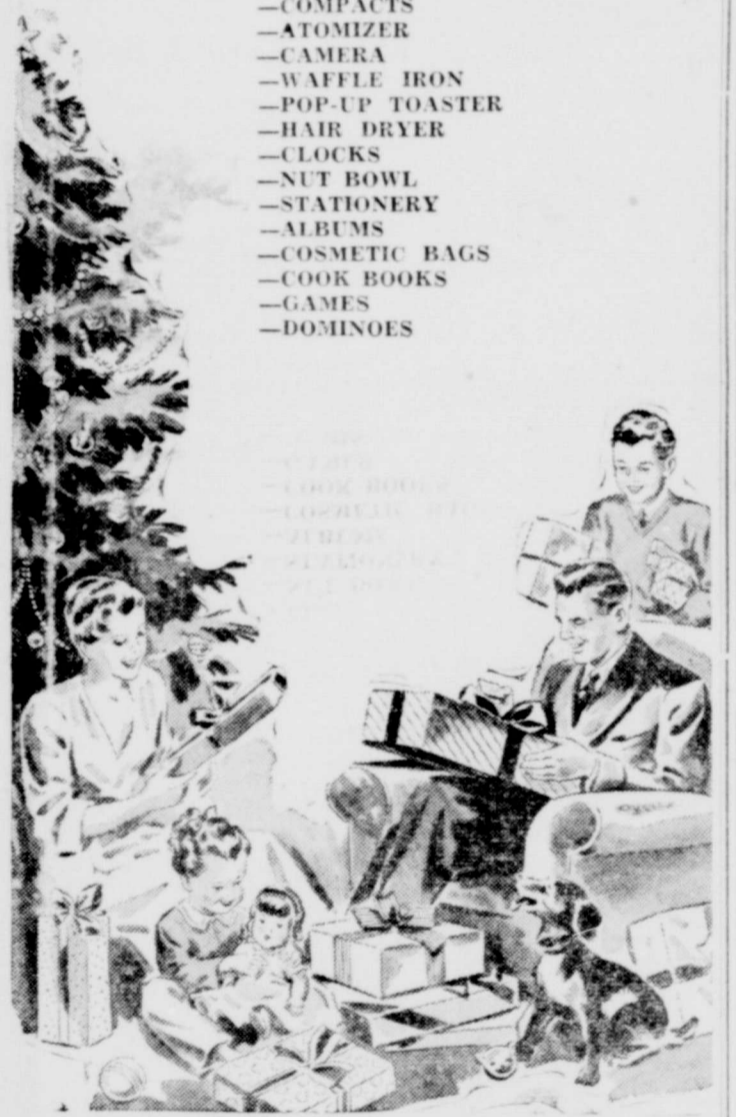
