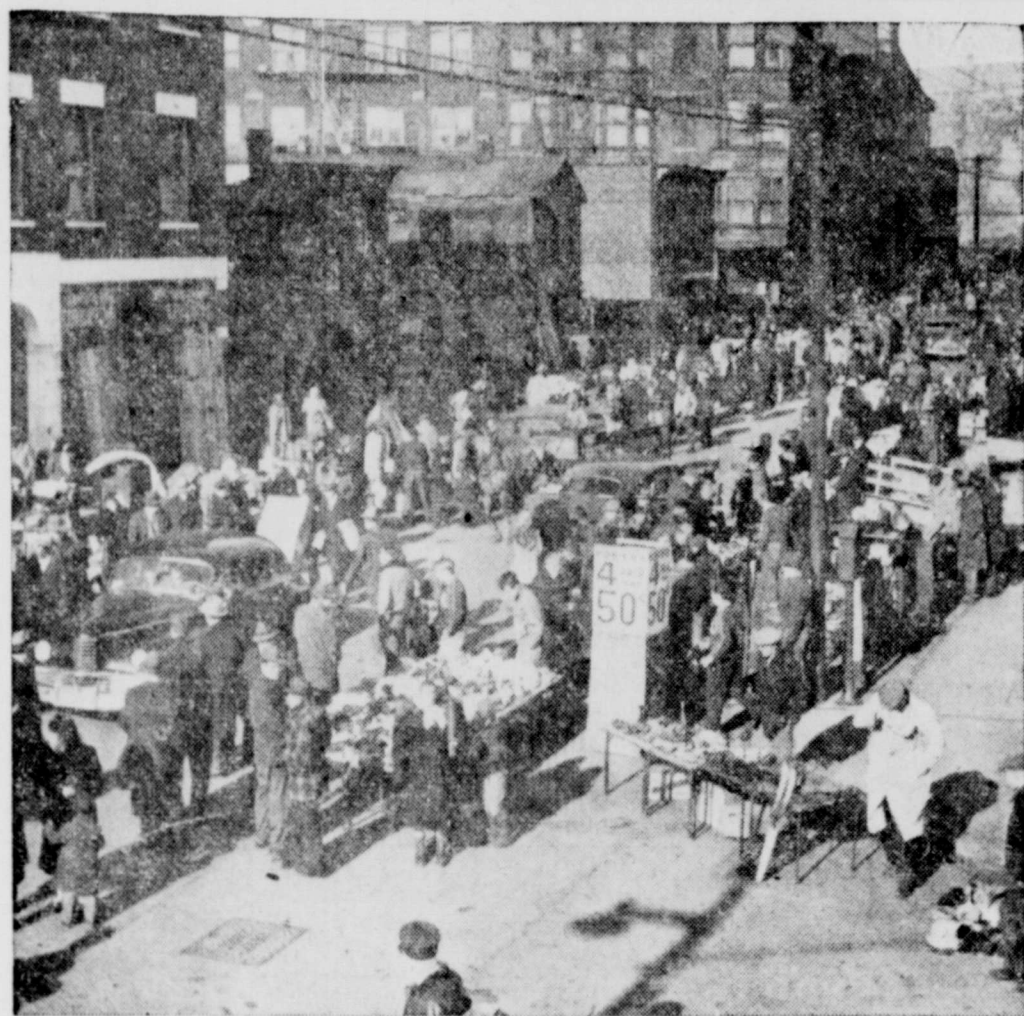

Grisham, who was serving his second term, submitted his resignation to the court last Friday in order to accept a partnership in a Dallas law firm. The resignation is effective Jan. 1.

Grisham is well known in Cisco and Eastland County, having resided in the county most of the time since 1913. The law firm he plans to join is headed by an uncle.

## Retail Stores Plan To Remain Open at Night to Aid Shoppers

Retail stores in Cisco announced today that they will be open nights for the remainder of the week, beginning Wednesday, to accommodate Christmas shoppers in the completion of their holiday buying.

The stores planned to remain open until at least 8:30 p. m. and possibly longer if there is demand.

A survey of the business district today indicated that business is definitely good. The shopping season was a little late in starting this year, buyers began shopping in earnest last week.

Mrs. Lucile Huffmyer, secretary of the Merchants Credit Association, believed that business was as good or better than it was during the same period last year. Several stores reported a slight increase in volume over figures for last year.

Stores reported, in several instances, that this will be a practical Christmas as shoppers were showing an increasing preference for "useful gifts." In some cases, luxury departments were lagging a little behind last year's figures.

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## 87,000 Texans Are In Good Health, Thanks To State

AUSTIN, Dec. 19.—More than 87,000 Texans are enjoying better health today because of the Texas State Department of Health's program of hospital treatment of indigent and semi-indigent venereal disease patients according to information released here.

"The treatment program for these patients is carried on through two hospitals known as rapid treatment centers, located at San Antonio and Overton," State Health Officer George W. Cox said.

Born of wartime emergency, in 1943 the rapid treatment center plan has continued because of its role in protecting public health from the ravages of venereal disease.

Dr. Cox stated that the Rapid Treatment Centers are concerned mainly with treatment of syphilis, which is usually accomplished in 8 to 10 days. Treatment of indigent gonorrhea cases is handled through local health units which maintain from one to three clinics each for venereal disease diagnosis and treatment.

"However," said Dr. Cox, "Patients with the less prevalent and little known venereal diseases—granuloma inguinale and lymphogranuloma venereum—are also admitted to hospitals."

"I am not in accord with the assumption that increased taxation is necessary," he wrote. "I do not believe that taxation is the answer to our problem. "That our eleemosynary institutions are in a deplorable condition and that something must be done to relieve the situation is apparent to everyone who has studied the problem for five minutes.

"There are three proposed solutions: "First, increase taxes. "Second, sell state owned lands in and near Austin and purchase other lands not so expensive. "Third, repeal the regular session appropriations and reduce the amounts enough to take up the deficits."

Mr. Collie said he favored a combination of the second and third proposals. "I would favor a tax increase as the last resort," he said. "With the governing bodies of the state and nation now taxing the people to the extent of approximately one third of their income, in my opinion it is a very poor time for adding more taxes, however worthy the cause."

PIONEER MAN DIES

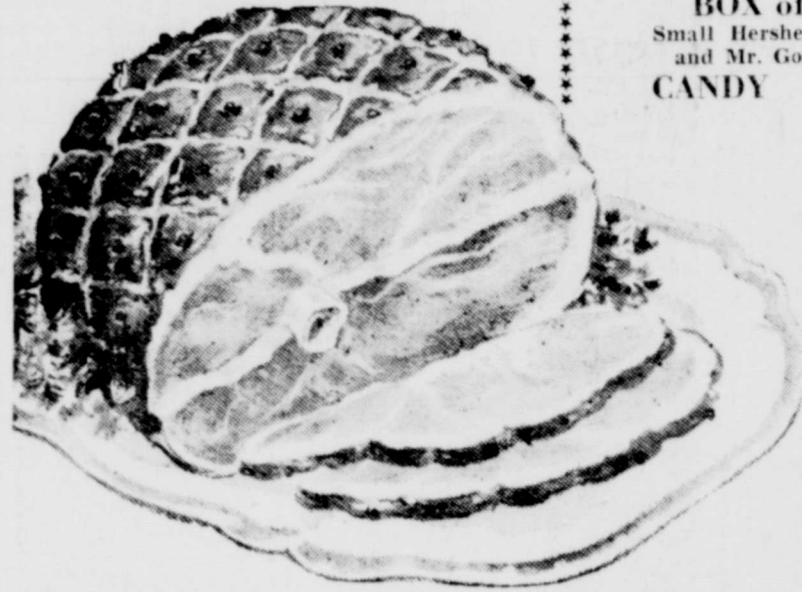

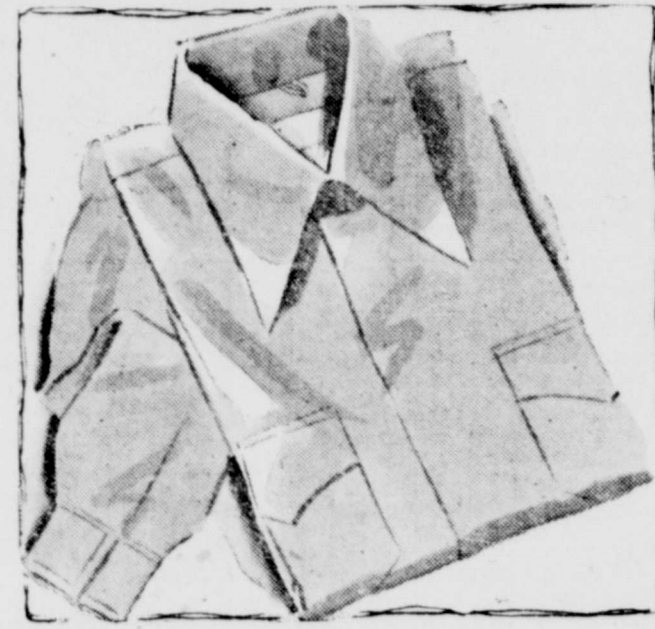
