Drilling on Wildcat Test Near Here to Get Under Way Soon

Drilling operations on the Lone Star Producing and Developing Corporation's No. 1 Dennison located some six miles southwest of Cisco in the Dan Horn area were expected to get under way shortly after January 1, it was reported Wednesday.

Actual work was awaiting the awarding of the drilling contract by the companies Dallas office. Everything on the lease was in readiness for the work to begin. The location has been made and the site cleared. A road to the location has been constructed and gates and cattle guards installed.

Much interest has been manifested in the area and leasing has been going on for several months. Preliminary geophysical work was completed several months ago and geologist expressed optimism over the prospects.

It was reported that several companies were ready to explore their holdings in the area upon completion of the Lone Star well.

The permit calls for the exploration of all possible pay zones. The Lone Star well will be a rotary operation.

Church's Place In Community Told Lions Club

The importance of the church in any community was shown in talks at the weekly luncheon of the Cisco Lions Club at noon Wednesday at the Victor Hotel Coffee Shop. E. L. Jackson was in charge of the program.

Jackson pointed out that Cisco has 21 places of worship, representing most faiths of man. He pointed out that the purpose of the program was to "take inventory of our churches and study their worth."

He then introduced Rev. Maurice D. Swisher, pastor of the First Christian Church, whose talk pointed out the growing influence of religion over the years. He said that religion has been the cause of wars, of persecution, and of troubles.

He added that "many things have been done in the name of religion that are contrary to the teachings of the Bible." It has been a tremendous force in all parts of the world, he said.

Rev. Swisher doubted whether the American continent would have been settled so speedily if it had not been for religious persecution. He pointed out that the churches were among the first structures built in every new village and town.

"Religion is not the tool of capitalism as has been charged," he said. He pointed out that the government recognizes the importance of religion by encouraging it in every way possible.

In the absence of President Jay Garrett and Vice President Charlie Burke, A. R. Westfall presided over the meeting. He appointed a committee composed of Wallace Smith, Charles Clark and Ray Judia to direct a forthcoming membership drive.

To Assure Duties On January 1

Judge Elzo Beene, prominent Eastland County Jurist, was named county attorney for Eastland County by the commissioners court at a special called meeting held Wednesday morning. Judge Beene will succeed Everett Grisham whose resignation will become effective January 1.

He is well known in Eastland County having held public office prior to his retirement several years ago. Some 20 years ago he held the office of county attorney for two terms and for eight years was judge of the 88th District Court. He resigned in 1932 and was replaced by Judge B. W. Patterson.

Since his resignation he has operated his farm six miles south of Cisco and has been out of politics.

Mr. Beene was raised in Eastland County, having spent most of his life in the Carbon area.

The vacancy in the \$3,875 a year job was created by the resignation of Everett Grisham who had served half of his second term. Mr. Grisham announced plans to enter private law practice with an uncle in Dallas.

It was learned unofficially that the place was offered to County Judge P. L. Crosley who chose to retain his present position at the same salary.

Since the County of Eastland also comprises the 91st District Mr. Beene will serve as county and district attorney.
