

Provide Fresher Vegetables for You

U. S. Department of Agriculture is experimenting with a new proces that promises to give southwest home makers fresher Sept. 15 - Brady at Cisco.

This new process is called vacuum cooling. It makes practical use of the drop in temperature Oct. 13 - Cisco at Coleman. when the water is evaporated rapidly.
