'Reports were current several months ago that Ford might enounter competition in the low-price ight-cylinder car field. The manuacturer considering such a develpment, however, apparently has lecided against it.

"The temptation to enter compeition for this market is strong. Ford derives considerable sales appeal from ability to offer an eight as well as a six in the low cost bracket. Buyers are attracted by the additional moothness and power performance Phone (home and office) 979 afforded by the extra cylinders.

"Principal reason why rivals have steered clear of eight-cylinder power plants is cost. Ford has been able to hold expenses down by manufactur-ing economies not often duplicated v others.

'In pioneering the low-price V-8, the Dearborn producer had to strike the heart of the cost problem. The company was the first to evolve method of making an integral V-block and crankcase casting.

The Ford Company is noted for excellence of manufacturing techique. Part of the reputation is based on willingness of the manageent to spend money on workaving equipment. The Rouge plant oundry, for example, is a model of fficiency. Air-conditioning elimi-nates some of the disagreeableness mmon to most foundries, while conveyor systems and automatic nachines obviate much of the usual ack-breaking-and inefficient-hand
