Regional Office Of VA To Move

All divisions of the Veterans Medical and Dental will move from Love Field to the newly constructed building at 912 South Ervay Street, Dallas, on the week end of January 20-22. Scott B. Harrington, Manager, has announced. The newly-located Regional Office will be open for business on the morning of January 23.

Complete medical and dental service will continue to be given eligible veterans at Love Field until necessary professional equipment can be installed in the downtown building. At that time Harrington said, medical and dental service will be provided at the 5-story fireproof building which VA has leased.

VA has been occupying 38 semi-permanent buildings at Love Field, war-time home of the Fifth Ferrying Group, since August 1, 1946. Although it will be necessary for VA to move approximately a half million miscellaneous veterans records, together with 1000 filing cabinets and other necessary office equipment to the 108,000 square feet it will occupy in the new building, every endeavor will be made to effect the movement without interference to operations, Harrington said.

LONE STAR WELL IN DAN HORN AREA DUE TO SPUD IN THURSDAY

Spudding in of the Lone Star Producing and Developing Company's No. 1 J. W. Dennison, wildcat oil test southwest of Cisco, is scheduled for Thursday, it was announced today by officials of the company. Gray Drilling Co. of Cisco was moving in and rigging up on the lease.

Rotary drilling equipment was moved from a location in Brown County and will be set up and ready to begin operation sometime Thursday.

The test will be drilled on a 2,000 acre tract held by Lone Star in the Dan Horn Community some five miles southwest of Cisco and is being watched by oil men throughout this section.

Geologists have expressed the belief that the location has a good possibility to open production.

Army Will Give Therapy Instruction

The course has been established to provide additional personnel, who will be students in the occupational therapist field; and to provide a number of occupational therapists, who will be eligible upon completion of their clinical training in Army installations for appointment in the Womens Medical Specialist Corps Reserve.

Students accepted for the course will receive training as civilian graduate students for not less than three months nor more than one year, according to Col. Liston.

Dallas Man Buys Eastland Building

Sale of the top four floors of the Petroleum Building in Eastland to T. K. Irwin, Dallas attorney, and Earl W. Patton of Austin and Kansas, was announced this week. The sale was made by C. P. Porter and Morris Cannon of Dallas.

The transaction was said to involve a cash consideration of some \$45,000. Porter and associates purchased the top four floors of the building from the Eastland National Bank last year and moved offices into the building. Mr. Irwin stated that an announcement as to the use of the space would be made later.

The Eastland National Bank still holds ownership of the first floor.

Breckenridge To Get 75 Housing Units

Notice was received by the Breckenridge Housing Authority Tuesday that the Public Housing Authority in Washington had approved 75 low rental housing units for the city. Also approved was a \$30,000 preliminary loan to get the two year project under way. It was announced that 40 of the units would be built in 1950 and 35 in 1951.

President Guinn expressed his appreciation to the retiring members for their untiring efforts and co-operation during their term of office and welcomed the new members.

Reduce Federal Costs, Economic Committee Asks

WASHINGTON, Jan. 11—The Research and Policy Committee of the Committee for Economic Development outlined today a Federal taxing and spending program for fiscal 1951 which would reduce expenditures \$6.7 billion below current levels, make possible a tax reduction of more than \$2 billion, and create a cash surplus of \$3 billion under conditions of high employment. The surplus would be applied to debt reduction.

"Because of its size—over \$40 billion—and its composition, the present tax burden is a serious impediment to economic growth and a source of important inequities," the Committee said.

"There is no ideal solution to the budget problem," the Committee said. "We can not have, at the same time, all the expenditures that might be desirable, all the tax reforms and reductions that might be desirable, and a sound budget policy" until the growth of the economy's productivity can meet such demands.

The Committee believes that the best solution for the fiscal year which begins July 1, 1950, "the one most consistent with the demands upon the Federal budget, with the requirements of sound finance, and with the conditions of economic growth, would be:

"(a) Provide for a moderate budget surplus to be realized under conditions that make a surplus possible and desirable, namely, conditions of high employment.

"(b) Reduce or postpone expenditures that are not essential to the national security or general welfare, and operate all programs more economically and efficiently.

"(c) Revise the tax system in ways that will yield the most benefit to the whole economy from the small net revenue reduction that seems possible with the achievable expenditure reductions."

Letters Gov. Allen Shivers designated Jan. 5, 1950, as George Washington Carver Day. Thinking of his great work and influence, I am moved to write these lines. I had the good fortune of an interview with him 15 years ago. For many years Dr. Carver was connected with Tuskegee Negro Institute, Tuskegee, Alabama. Founded by Booker T. Washington, who began life a slave, Tuskegee specializes in scientific agriculture, like Texas A&M and Prairie View A&M, although many other subjects are taught. Most of the students are from rural areas of the South. While an instructor in agricultural chemistry at Tuskegee, Dr. Carver began the research that made him famous and has increased the earnings of Southern farmers, white and Negro, hundreds of millions of dollars in that area raised peanuts and sweet potatoes, and it has been in developing scores of uses for these two vegetables that Dr. Carver has dedicated his genius. That Congress recognizes the importance of his work is shown in the following episode. Back in the hungry days of the early thirties a Congressional committee on agricultural affairs was about to wind up its hearings. The legislator introducing witnesses offered the then unknown Dr. Carver, adding that as no Negro agriculturalists had been heard from, it might be of value to listen to him. "We'll give him ten minutes," said the chairman. Dr. Carver had an exhibit of a few dozen of the food and industrial products he had developed from the peanut. He spoke of them briefly, then said, "Gentlemen, my ten minutes are up. Thank you for your courtesy. I had a little more time. Ten more minutes were given him, then an hour. As they finally left for their delayed lunch, one of the committee said, "We nearly missed our most important witness." In 1934, returning from Atlanta, I stopped off for a day at Montgomery to see a friend. As I had read with interest of the late Booker T. Washington and the work of Dr. Carver, I resolved to visit Tuskegee, four miles distant. It was a beautiful spring day and the well-kept grounds and fine buildings showed to good advantage. The Negro students who were taking summer work were going to breakfast. One of them showed me the small plain building that was Dr. Carver's office and laboratory. An elderly grey-haired Negro in worn blue jeans was unlocking the door. Imagine my surprise when he told me, "I am Dr. Carver." As he had a busy schedule he could talk to me only 15 or 20 minutes, but it was a very interesting and inspiring conversation. He has the simplicity of greatness. After talking with him I met the president of Tuskegee, a son of the late Booker T. Washington. He showed me his father's grave, marked by a modest stone. I uncovered my head beside the resting place of this great leader whose life work had made possible a college for 3,600 young Negro men and women, to fit them better for citizenship in the United States. Not all of us are endowed by nature with the qualities of leadership, but we can all be of some service to our fellow man. Which reminds me of one other Negro, Sid McIntyre of Cisco. He lived here 40 years before his death, and I saw him often. A friendly, hard working, honest man. He and a white friend were partners in a grocery. One morning I saw a clerk in their store sacking potatoes. "Fill those pecks fuller," he said. He smiled at me and added, "If I go to hell it won't be for giving

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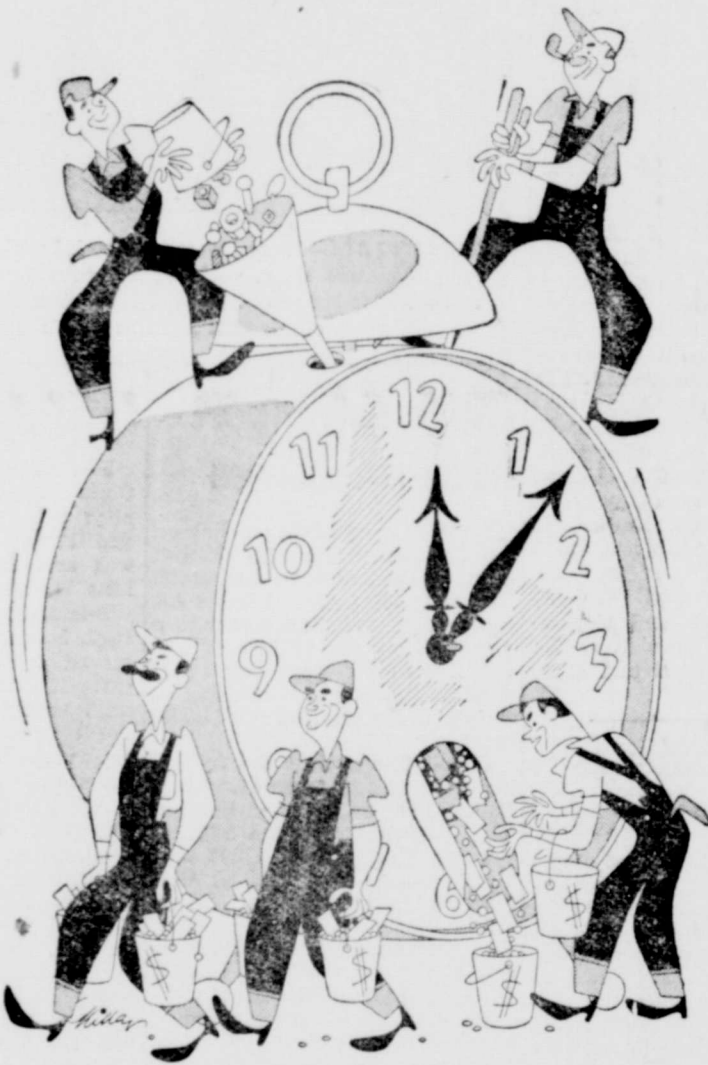
