Income Tax Book Is Best Seller

"Your Federal Income Tax," the official guide for tax-payers published by the Bureau of Internal Revenue, has established itself near the top on national best-seller lists, according to information released today. Over 200,000 copies of this 138-page tax book, which is available from the Superintendent of Documents, Government Printing Office, at 25c a copy, were sold during the first 5 weeks since publication.

This new and improved edition of "Your Federal Income Tax" covers, in a series of short articles, questions which may come up concerning tax returns; it covers the latest laws, Bureau rulings, and court decisions. Chapters have been added which cover installment sales and the important appeals procedure. Also included are facsimiles of tax forms and detailed index.

TEN CISCO VETS AMONG FIRST TO RECEIVE INSURANCE DIVIDENDS

Ten Cisco veterans were made happier Monday and Tuesday by receiving their National Service Life Insurance dividend checks and at least three of the men have indicated that they plan to put the money to good use.

Among the first to receive dividends from insurance made possible to service men during World War II was Allen Burnam, postal employee, who was off duty when the checks arrived. Burnam's check, in the amount of \$181.50, will be used in building

a garage at his residence on West 4th. The Burnams have planned the garage for some time and the receipt of the check enabled them to begin work sooner than they had expected.

Ronald Rhodes, variety store manager, received a check in the amount of \$165 and immediately "salted" it away in savings bonds.

Standlee McCracken, local grocer, opened his mail and found a check in the amount of \$330. It will be used in paying doctor bills resulting from an illness last year that called for several operations.

The remainder of the first ten to receive checks were not available for interviews.

Postmaster L. H. McCrea said that eight checks were delivered Monday and two Tuesday. He pointed out that some checks will not be delivered for possibly four months depending on the serial number of the veteran. They are being mailed at the rate of some 250,000 per day according to the veteran's number. The last three digits in the serial number govern the time of mailing.

Eastland School Man Goes To Cross Plains

James Alexander, assistant football coach and history teacher in the Eastland High School, has resigned to become principal of the Cross Plains High School. It was announced by W. G. Womack, Eastland superintendent.

Alexander will take over his new duties at mid-term. He came to the Eastland school system this year from Cross Plains where he was coach and instructor.

He will fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Jack Stout who became a rural mail carrier at May on January 16. Alexander is a graduate of Abilene Christian College and a native of Pioneer.

CHARLES ELLIOTT DIES IN LOCAL HOSPITAL FOLLOWING MISHAP

Charles Jeffery Elliott, 47-year-old construction worker, died almost instantly at 6:30 p. m. Monday in the crash of a freight train and a pickup truck truck at the Texas and Pacific Railway crossing on the Breckenridge Highway in the city limits. He died of injuries received in the crash soon after being rushed to a local hospital in a Thomas ambulance.

The accident occurred when Elliott drove onto the track in the path of the of the approaching freight which was slowing down to take on water in the local yard. Eye witnesses said that Elliott was driving toward Breckenridge on East 6th Street and apparently did not see the train until too late to stop.

The pickup, in which Elliott was driving alone, was completely demolished. The wheels were torn loose from the body and the frame was twisted and torn. The body of the pickup was reduced to a mass of mashed metal after being carried some 900 feet following the impact.

Hospital attendants reported that Elliott apparently had died of internal injuries, and Ambulance Driver Odell Rains reported that there appeared to be no outward injuries. The only noticeable mark on the body was a bruise on the head.

Train Engineer R. L. Minter of Fort Worth reported that Elliott, who was going north, swerved his pickup into the path of the train after entering the right-of-way.

Highway patrolmen from Eastland assisted local police investigating the crash.

Elliott worked with construction firms at odd jobs and was a painter and concrete man. He lived with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. T. H. Elliott, 2100 Avenue E. His father is a retired Humble

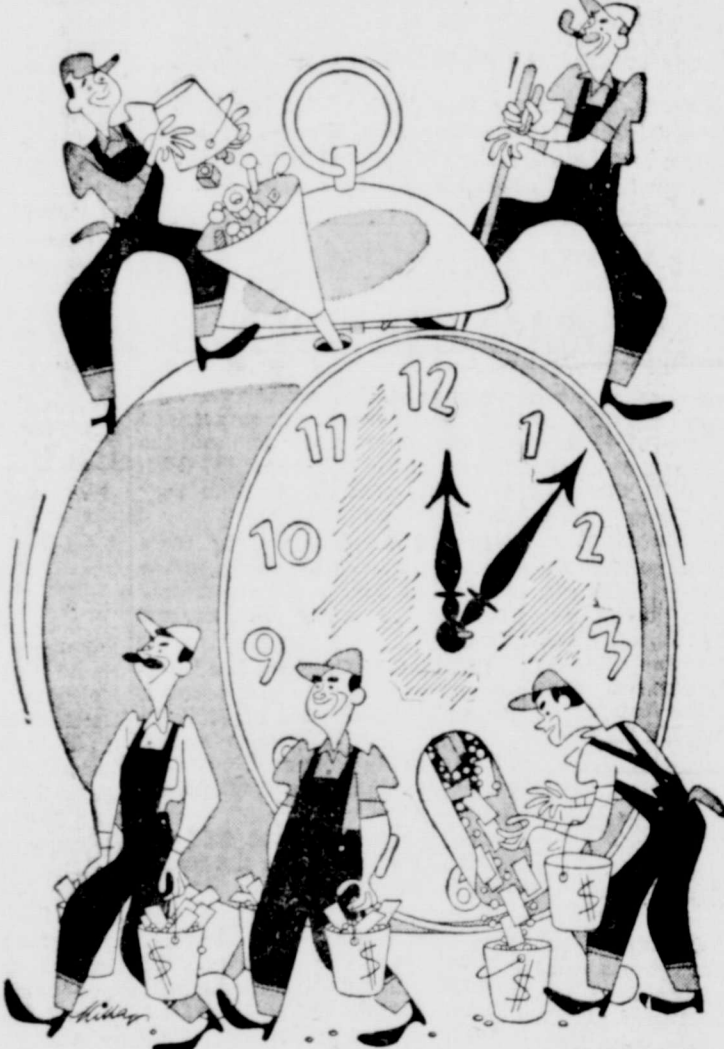

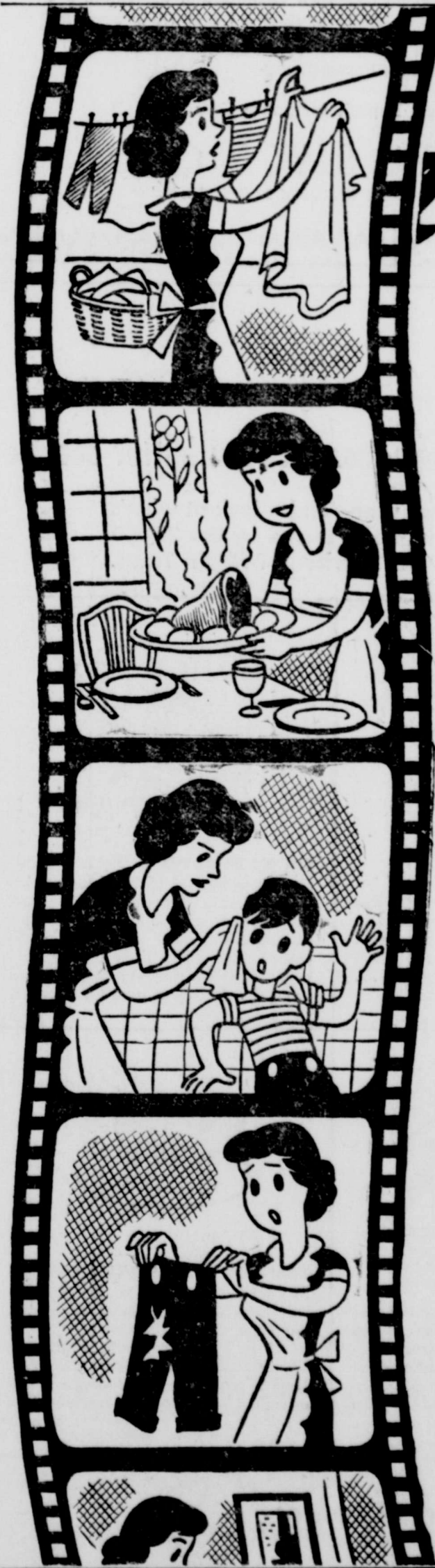

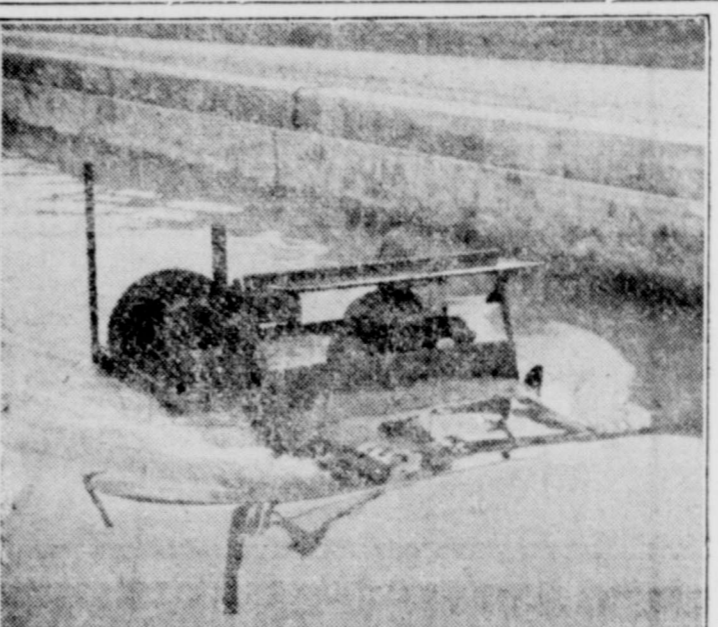

Americana, History and Horseflesh

INDELIBLY inscribed on the minds of all interested in art, Americana or horseflesh are the names of Remington, Russell and Leigh. The latest welcome news coming to this public is a circuit of exhibits featuring a variety of paintings by W. R. Leigh that will tour the United States from coast to coast. Besides the more or less permanent exhibitions on display at Grand Central Art Galleries, New York, Gump's Galleries in San Francisco and Frank Phillips' Woolaroc Museum in Oklahoma, an important show is to be given January 8 through 22 at The Maryland Institute, Baltimore, where Leigh, as a lad of 14 from Martinsburg, West Virginia, obtained his first instruction. Vital to American history are such canvases as "The Buffalo Drive," "The Buffalo Hunt," "Land of the Navahos" and "Open Season on Bighorn," included in this show. A later display is announced for February at the Washington County Museum of Fine Art at Hagerstown, Maryland, and a special exhibit of burros and Western ponies at the Heard Museum in Phoenix, Arizona, during the tourist season. Leigh's cloud studies and others made in Africa during his two trips there for the American Museum of Natural History are scheduled for a large number of museums and art galleries throughout the U. S. A. Descended from the first settlers of Virginia and with the blood of Pocahontas also in his veins, the artist was stirred in his childhood by accounts of Custer's last stand, and a buffalo robe — his prized possession — inspired him even then with the overwhelming passion to depict these phases of American life in which Indian, buffalo and cowboy were then playing vital parts. Study abroad, years of travel and life in the West have culminated in the success of Leigh's early dreams and ambitions with the result that The Maryland Institute, his alma mater, has invited him, as their most distinguished pupil, to exhibit his paintings in their Baltimore Gallery.

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
