READ A statement recently that "if you live in Texas, you're in the oil and cattle business. So you'll probably be interested in a few things we've put up about the oil outlook in this area."

FOR INSTANCE, we're told geologists consider the Lone Star Denison No. 1 which is believed to be one of the best prospects in this section. They were drilling at 2,100 feet late Thursday. Understand Lone Star is doing extensive coring on this to enable their geologist to make all formations.

geological friends report from the surface they have most hopes for Caddo production. There are four or five other prospects, however, and all are being explored.

ACCORDING TO records, some royalty and lease owners in this area include Lone Star with 2,000 acres, McElroy Ranch with a reported 4,000 acres, Henry Drumwright, A. D. Pearson, Reark Production Company, H. A. Bible, Jim Florey, R. A. Bearman, L. M. St. A. C. Green, J. J. Callahan and others.

It is rumored that McElroy is to drill a well in this area before too long. A good friend, Mr. W. B. is one of the largest landowners in the area. He has 640 acres and one geologist said it is "very well located." Seismograph crews have been active in this area for months.

ABOUT EIGHT years ago, we're told the old McElreath Well was drilled there — 1500 feet east of Lone Star's lease. It's owned by Daniels of Breckenridge and is producing from the Mar-falls at about 3200 feet.

ACCORDING TO our scouts, a well known as the Roberts and is drilled in the area. It's location was a half north of Lone Star's block and called a dry hole. But when the casing was pulled, oil flowed. Nothing like this has ever been done about

PROBABLY NO oil well in the area has a more colorful story than the old Luce well south of Cisco. It has been producing for many years. No one knows exactly what pay zone produces from. For years, it flowed exactly 20 barrels of high noon each day. Never broke in two, and nobody knows just where.

DRIVING A little closer to town and understand that some 50 years ago the city drilled for water at the top of the 4th street hill. And was uncovered at a very shallow depth. City dads, we hear, pretty upset because the oil was just where.

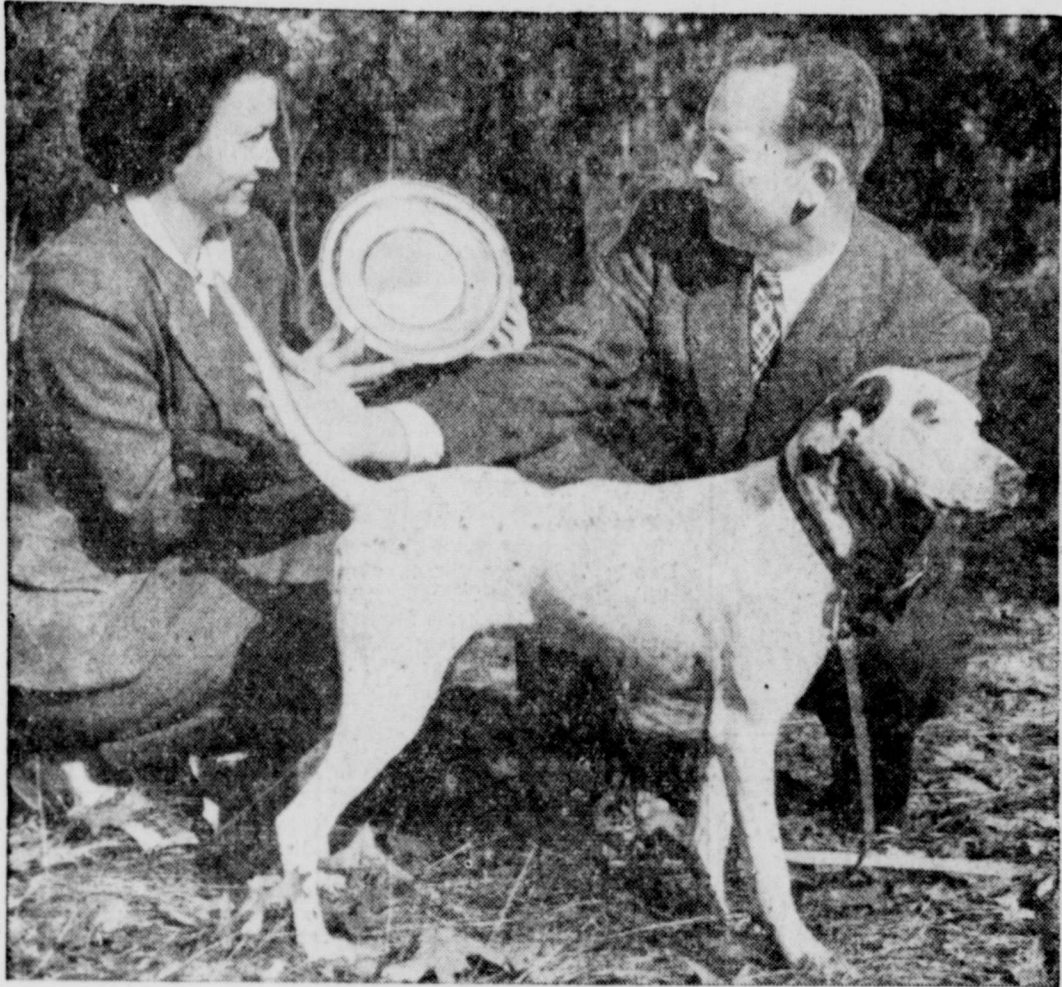
EVER IN THE Moran area, one of the state's first oil wells came in, the original distillate well still produces, we're told. It's relatively shallow, but more than a million barrels are to have been sold from it. Our information is correct, the state's first oil came from a well around Nacogdoches. Next, prolific Spindletop Field at present came in, followed by that of Petrolia in Clay County, came Moran.

YOU CAN HEAR all kinds of things, such as there's supposed to be a very big oil pool in the Iber area. The T. & P. Railroads own all the land and coal in that area. And we're told that there is much oil in the Iber area but that T. & P. isn't ready to develop it. Our guess is as good as ours is true.

ANY EVENT there's nothing more interesting than oil and gas as profitable.

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Catholics Plan Bishop's Jubilee Program This Year

A group of 39 prominent Catholic laymen of the Abilene area pledged themselves Tuesday night to honor the forthcoming jubilee of Bishop Joseph P. Lynch by instituting an extensive program to strengthen and extend the work of the Catholic charities throughout the 64 counties of the Dallas Diocese.

The meeting, which was held at Sacred Heart Rectory, was one of a group of five similar organizational gatherings held at key spots in North Texas through which the 75,000 Catholics of the diocese are making plans to do honor to their bishop.

Bishop Lynch will celebrate his 50th year as a Roman Catholic priest and his 40th year as Bishop of Dallas next month.

Dan A. Gallagher, chairman of Tuesday's meeting, announced that the Bishop's Jubilee Program will have a seven-point objective:

To establish a home for the aged. To complete a founding home already being organized.

To extend the facilities of existing Catholic orphanages and establish a Diocesan Charities Organization co-ordinating the welfare program of the Diocese.

To create a sinking fund to assist in the establishment of schools and missions and to subsidize clinics and social centers for the poor.

To create a minor seminary for the education of native-born Catholic priests.

To establish catechetical centers with professional teachers to meet the religious and educational needs of small and scattered communities in the rural areas of the diocese.

To establish central Diocesan offices for all Catholic charitable and administrative organizations.

Wranglers Drop Conference Contest To Clifton College Thursday Night

The Cisco Junior College Wranglers let down in the second half of their game with the Clifton Junior College cagers in Clifton Thursday night and saw an eight point half-time lead dwindle away as the Clifton team put on the steam to hold a 46-42 lead as the final whistle sounded.

The Wranglers enjoyed a 28-20 lead at the intermission due to the sharp shooting of Gunn, who wound up the game with 18 points for scoring honors. They sank all gratis shots with the exception of two in the first half and hit only four in the second half. Bobby

Travis and Doc Rainey went out in the final period on fouls and Clifton took advantage of all the breaks to win the conference tilt. The loss gave the Wranglers a 500 per cent average in conference play for the season. They have wins over Weatherford and Hillsboro and have lost to Ranger and Clifton. Both wins were on the Community gym court.

The Wranglers play Decatur at the Community gym Monday night in another conference game. It will mark the first time the two teams have met in the current season.

Cisco public schools, the high school, and Cisco Junior College were completing their work for the first half of the 1949-50 school year Friday and preparing to begin a new semester at the regular time Monday.

Examinations were completed and teachers were busy grading papers and averaging grades for report cards to be distributed next week.

A vacancy in the staff at Cisco High School was created as Mrs. Couch, librarian, resigned to accept a similar position with the Snyder school system. No action has been taken in filling the job.

Two new students from Maine will be added to the high school student body and increased oil activity was expected to add others to all schools.

Two half-year courses have been planned for the high school. They are in the Economics and Texas History departments.

The college plans new work for 100 students and an increased number of students in both day and night classes was expected. The grade schools planned no changes.

Also planned for the year is a valuation program at the high school. The program was planned in order to class the school according to state standards. The valuation program will be directed by Dr. Collins of Hardin-Simmons U. and committees from surrounding schools will spend a three day observation period in the school to aid the work. The same program was carried out in the lower grades last year and the report was favorable.

Pete Clements Is Gun Club Leader

Pete Clements, foreman at A. G. Motor Co., was elected president of the Eastland County Gun and Rifle Association at a meeting Monday night at the Osborn Studio. He succeeds Zan Burroughs.

Other officers elected were Dr. E. H. Ramsey, vice president; Shy Osborn, secretary; and Blair Clark, range officer. One purpose of the meeting was to stress the need for increasing the membership to bring the club up to the standards of the National Rifle Association, of which it is a charter member.

New members are needed to participate in the range and skeet shooting programs which are held at a new range just north of the airport, Clements said.

The club has been active for the past two years and a junior club has been planned with an enlargement in members.

Electric Program Planned For 4-H Clubs During Year

Announcement has been made of a change in emphasis in the 4-H Electric program, which in 1950 will be known as the 4-H Farm and Home Electric program, according to the National 4-H Committee.

With the change of name, the program will encourage more boys and girls to study and plan how to use electricity, and to demonstrate what electrical equipment they've made, adjusted, repaired, and installed.

There will be no charges in awards, or donor, which is the Westinghouse Educational Foundation. Awards comprise gold-filled medals, all-expense trips to the National 4-H Club Congress, Chicago, and six \$300 college scholarships to county, state, and national winners, respectively.

A merit plaque will also be awarded to the county reporting the most outstanding 4-H Farm and Home program in the state this year.

Plans Made For Growth of College Music Department

Plans for widening the scope of the Music Department of Cisco Junior College for the coming semester and for the next school year were announced by Robert Clinton, head of the Fine Arts Department, and O. L. Stamey, president of the school.

When the plans are completed the school's music department will be among the best of the junior colleges in Texas, and the work will receive full credit in such schools as North Texas State College in Denton, the U. of Texas, and many others. A complete college Freshman course will be offered and fully accredited.

For the second semester of this school year a Music Appreciation study has been added and plans for additions to the chorus have been made. The chorus will make a spring tour, probably in April, to entertain schools in the area.

The college auditorium has been improved and new seats installed. Some 600 people can be seated under the present arrangement. The school recently purchased the seats of the Texas Theater and they have been placed in the auditorium. Also added to the music department is a Baldwin Grand piano to be used in the auditorium, and President Stamey and Mr. Clinton issued an invitation to all music teachers in the area to use the facilities of the auditorium, and the piano, for recitals.

A number of musical programs are being planned by the school for the second semester and many of these will include some of the nation's best musicians.

For the next year the department has planned further work in Music Appreciation. Also planned are courses in Theory, Music Literature, Public School Music, as well as piano and voice.

Mr. Clinton said that if it be desired a community chorus will be started next year and during the summer months a music theory course would be available to high school students.

Next year the school will have four pianos, in addition to the new Grand, and plans call for the equipping of two additional practice rooms.

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Roads Are Big Business

W. A. (Cap) Williamson of San Antonio, president of the American Automobile Association for the Alamo City, says that figures he has compiled from state records reveal that the counties in Texas received more than forty five million dollars last fiscal year for road purposes from state tax sources. He says, "Funds allocated to the counties in Texas from state tax sources for county roads totaled \$45,300,000 for the fiscal year ending August 31, 1944. This allocation comes from three sources: license plate money made available to the counties totaled \$18,212,000. A dozen Texas counties received the maximum amount of \$175,000 from license plate income. In the present registration year, 2,500,000 vehicles have been registered, of which 1,845, 732 are passenger cars. This is an increase of 205,000 over the same date last year. It is anticipated that another 150,000 vehicles will be registered during the remaining four months of the registration year. Another source of income gave to the counties \$5,200,000, which was their portion of the surplus in the bond assumption account. The bond assumption account comes from the gasoline tax levy collected by the state. It is derived from one cent of the gasoline tax which is allocated to the retirement of bond issues voted by the counties on highways which later became part of the state system. These two expenditures are fairly constant in the individual counties. Construction work begun during the fiscal year on the state operated farm-to-market roads grossed \$21,896,000 for the counties. The total of \$45,300,000 of state-collected funds for county allocations does not include other expenditures within the counties on state highway dept. construction on projects other than farm-to-market roads. "These are impressive totals and reveal a significant contribution to the program of improved land ser-

vice on purely local roads in Texas," says Williamson. Texas now has a billion dollar highway system. Such is the gist of a report issued by D. C. Greer, State Highway Engineer. In a year-end summary Greer said that the value of highways in this state is \$1,115,000,000. This figure includes all investments made in roads and bridges which remain in use on the state system. The latest national analysis from Washington shows Texas to be in the lead in federal aid postwar construction. Work contracted on the federal aid system in Texas since V-J Day amounts to \$21,000,000. "Citizens should not become complacent about their motor transportation system, however," Greer pointed out. "With the ever-increasing use of our highways and the modern demand for heavier types of vehicles, more highway mileage is becoming deficient in width, sight distance, strength, and other features necessary to the safe and efficient movement of traffic." The highway commission's basic policy is to put as much as possible of its "income under rubber." Reviewing the fiscal year recently closed there is a challenging note that administrative expense for the department has been held to only 1%. A large and growing item, and one which ought to be viewed with some apprehension, is the cost of maintenance. As the farm-to-market road program expands, maintenance demands will continue to increase. Twenty-two percent of our highway budget must be spent for maintenance each year now. Another significant cost to the system is 2% for the Texas Department of Public Safety. Construction calls for the remainder of the highway budget. READ THE CLASSIFIED ADS

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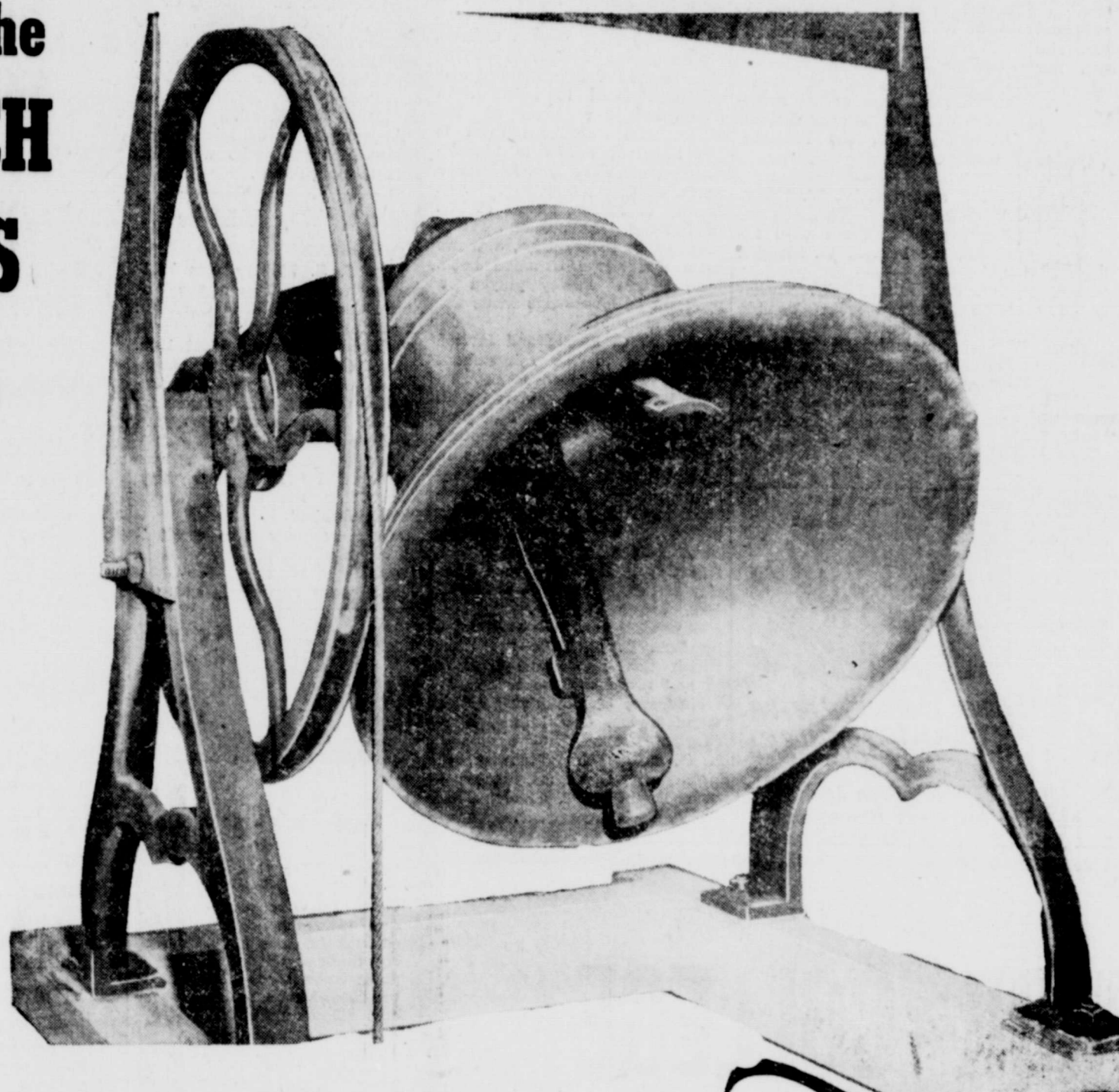
