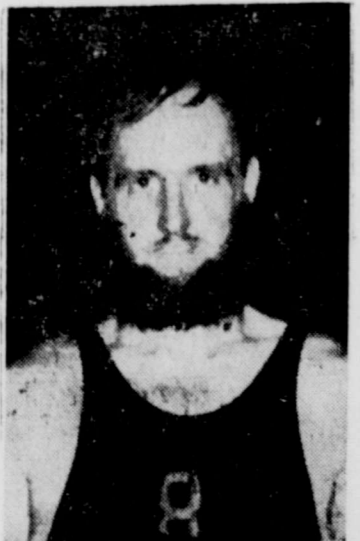

TWO JURORS SELECTED AS MOAD TRIAL BEGINS IN DISTRICT COURT

Two jurors had been selected at noon today as Mrs. Elva Moad of Cisco went on trial in 91st District Court of Eastland County on charges of murder in the fatal shooting of her husband last September 4.

Gaston W. Dixon and S. A. Hightower, both of Ranger, were the two jurors chosen from the first five men examined by the attorneys. A special panel of 100 men had been summoned, but 45 had been excused.

County Attorney Elzo Been and Special Prosecutor Frank Sparks, representing the state, and Earl Connor Jr. and Allan Dabney, counsel for Mrs. Moad, expected to complete the selection of the jury today.

Witnesses for both the defense and the state were excused as the trial was called early today.

Sheriff Williams Returns Forgery Suspect To County

Eastland County Sheriff J. B. Williams has returned from Lufkin with a suspect wanted in the county on at least two cases of forgery and passing of worthless checks.

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JUNIOR COLLEGES GROW

The junior college movement is one of the most significant advances of the past 20 years for higher education and community cultural development, University of Texas President T. S. Painter said at Carthage Sunday.

In a dedicatory address at the opening of the new Panola County Junior College plant, Dr. Painter stressed the importance and function of junior colleges.

"Junior colleges are essentially local institutions whose primary functions are to meet the educational needs of young men and women who cannot afford or do not wish to take senior college training; and to enrich the intellectual life of the supporting community," he said.

The University of Texas president outlined the part played by the University in helping to set up and improve Texas junior colleges. Through Dr. C. C. Colvert, educational administration professor, a consultation

service, a journal, and a news letter are provided to junior colleges and to prospective junior college teachers.

"Junior colleges do compete with senior colleges at the freshman and sophomore levels," Dr. Painter declared. "Many of the 38,000 students trained at junior colleges last year would have gone to four-year colleges if junior colleges had not been available. But it is equally true that thousands of local students would not have considered going to a four-year college and that many decided to go on with their education."

University of Texas enrollment patterns have shifted as the junior college movement has grown, he pointed out. Twenty years ago about 40% of U. students were freshmen coming directly from high schools. In September 1949 only about 20% were freshmen, more than half with some college credit.

This decrease in freshmen registration has been accompanied by a great increase in college transfer students and in the size of the sophomore, junior, senior, and graduate classes. The per capita student cost at the U. has greatly increased with the growth of professional and graduate classes, Dr. Painter said.

"The economy of junior colleges is a question of major interest. The local institution is spared the need for providing costly equipment for advanced

technical training, and can concentrate on essential and basic fields of knowledge," he explained.

"As the capstone of the state's educational structure, the U. of Texas is tremendously interested in seeing higher education made available to all, no matter where the teaching job is done."

The better prepared junior college grads are when they enter the University or other state senior colleges, the better they can be educated there, Dr. Painter stated.

OLD FASHIONED VIRTUES

The state of Florida wants industries which are suited to its resources and climate. These industries are not of the "smoke-stack" variety—Florida hasn't the raw materials they need. Instead, enterprises which require small amounts of raw materials and the work of many technicians and craftsmen are desired. Watchmaking is cited as one example.

A few months ago, Governor Fuller Warren of that state did something concrete to turn the desire into reality. He formed a Florida Industrial Development Council. He staffed it with nine of the state's outstanding industrialists, along with the heads of various public and private research agencies. Of great importance, the Council is 100% non-partisan and non-political. The Governor and some of the members are on opposite sides of the political fence. It is to the Governor's credit that, regardless of this, he picked the best men available and set them to work.

Much progress has been reported so far—new payrolls are coming into the state. Industry, agriculture, and the tourist business are to be locked together to give Florida a year-round stability of income.

Here is a fine illustration of how those old-fashioned virtues of local initiative and self reliance still work. Florida has an economic problem—but she didn't run to the federal government for help. She figured out how to solve the problem with her own resources and acted. If that spirit were more prevalent, this country would be in a far sounder condition.

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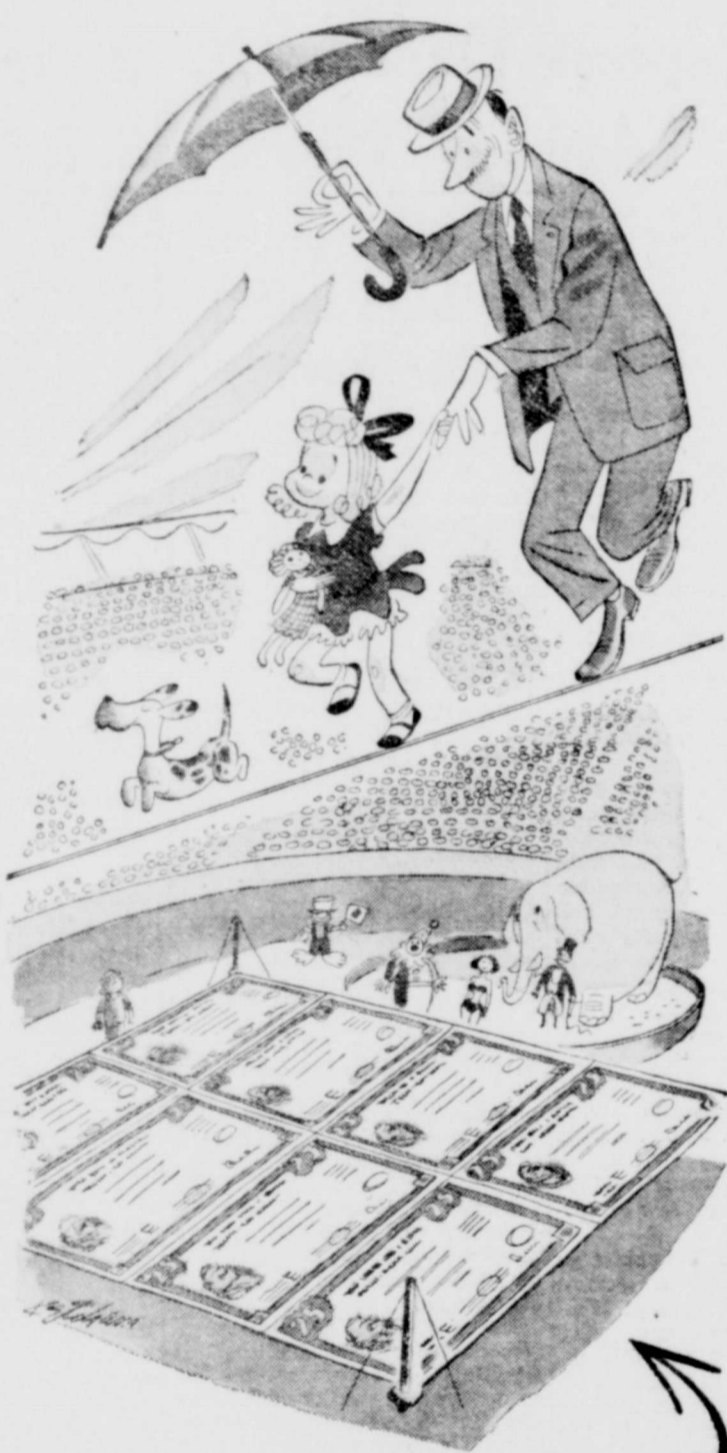

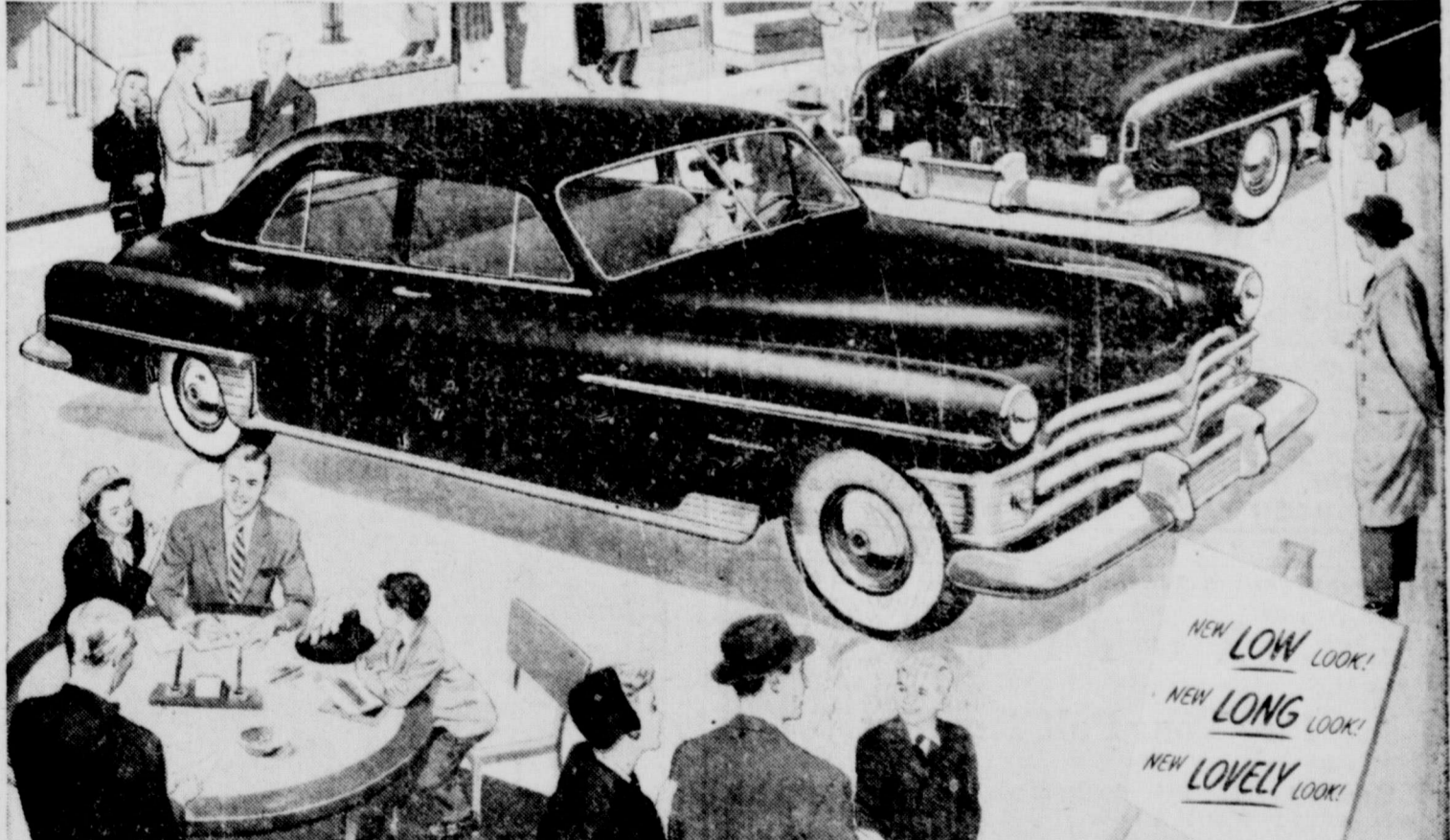
