Need For 16,000 Teachers Seen

With Texas elementary school enrollments expected to increase yearly until 1957-58, when about 475,000 more pupils may be in school than in 1948-49, 16,000 new teachers may be needed during the 9-year period, Brunswick A Bureau of Labor Statistics in

The study, made by the Bureau in cooperation with the Veterans' Administration, and in around 6%.

Until about 1952 around 1,000 secondary teachers may be needed annually as replacements

It is estimated that by 1960 about 7,000 new high school teachers will be required to handle the anticipated 175,000 increase over 1948-49 enrollments. To take care of replacement needs 1,400 teachers may be required annually in the last part of the 1950 decade on the basis of an attrition rate of 6%.




