

Mayor Issues Statement

PARKING METER BALLOT WOULD
BE ORDERED IF CITY PETITIONED

Mayor G. C. Rosenthal reported Saturday that an election on the question of parking meters would be called by the city if a properly signed petition was presented to the commission. He issued a statement to clear up any questions concerning the situation. His statement follows:

"It seems that some of the citizens of Cisco are under the wrong impression as to statement made at the time the parking meters were installed, that is they thought I made a statement to the effect that an election would be called at the expiration of six months trial period under which the meters were installed. It was clearly stated that if it was the will of the citizens an election would be called, if a properly signed petition was presented to the city commission.

The meters have served a two-fold purpose — regulation of auto parking in the business area and, also, a source of income to the city, which could not be had otherwise. The city's share of the meter collections as of December 31, 1949, was \$2,892, a like amount being paid to the McGee-Rale Meter Company.

"The city's share is placed in a special fund and used in making extensions to service lines, street improvements and repairs that were made without using money from funds allotted to other uses."

Scholarships To
Be Offered Texas
School Students

AUSTIN, Feb. 4—Fifty worthy 1950 high school graduates will be awarded more than \$5,000 in Wilbur S. Davidson Freshman Scholarships at the University of Texas for the 1950-51 Long Session.

Letters explaining the scholarships are being sent to nearly 1,000 Texas high school principals with the request that they pass the information along to their students, William D. Blunk, University assistant dean of men and chairman of the scholarship committee, announced. Sample application blanks accompany the letters, and additional blanks may be obtained from the office of the Dean of Student Life, University Station, Austin.

Funds for the freshman scholarships, offered for the first time in 1948, come from a bequest by the late Wilbur S. Davidson of Houston.

The scholarships usually are for \$100 each, but in some instances more than that amount is granted although in no case is a Davidson scholarship given for more than \$200.

To be eligible, a high school senior must be graduated in the top half of his class and must furnish evidence of good character. Preference is given to Texas high school graduates.

\$3,000 Limitation
Remains Same

The \$3,000 limitation on wages for social security purposes has not been changed, according to a statement released today by Ralph T. Fisher, manager of the Abilene office of the Social Security Administration.

The fact that the social security tax advanced from 1% to 1 1/2% each from the employer and the employee, effective Jan. 1, 1950, has caused some employers to inquire if the law has been changed to tax more than the first \$3,000 in wages paid to an employee in a year.

"The law that limits taxable wages to the first \$3,000 in wages paid by an employer to each employee is still in effect," said Fisher, "and only an Act of Congress will change the law pertaining to the maximum wages to be taxed."

Fisher pointed out that all inquiries regarding social security tax matters should be referred to the Collector of Internal Revenue, and that all questions about old-age and survivors insurance benefits should be directed to the social security office located at 308 Post Office Bldg., Abilene.

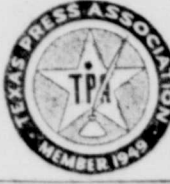

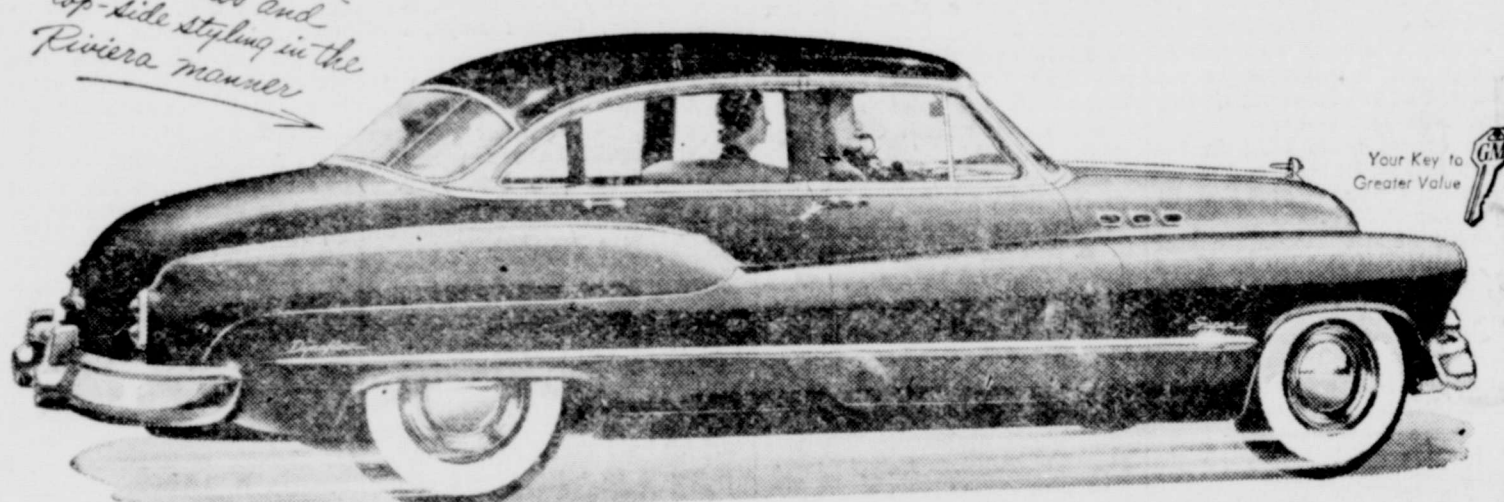

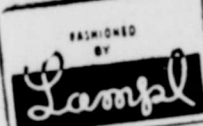
