

## Ag Week Salutes Panhandle Farmers

Agriculture Commissioner Susan Combs announced that March 14 to 20 is National Agriculture Week in Texas—a time to celebrate the state's farmers and ranchers, and acknowledge this far-reaching industry that adds some \$73 billion to the Texas economy.

"From healthy food to fresh flowers to warm clothing, agriculture touches our lives every day. Agriculture provides us with generous amounts of nutrients to feed our bodies—iron from lean meat, calcium from milk, vitamin A from carrots, vitamin C from citrus, to name just a few of the ways Texas-raised foods make us healthier," Combs said. "This March, I urge all Texans to recognize the producers who add food, horticulture, fiber and good health to our lives."

Combs will kick off National Agriculture Week in Texas by signing

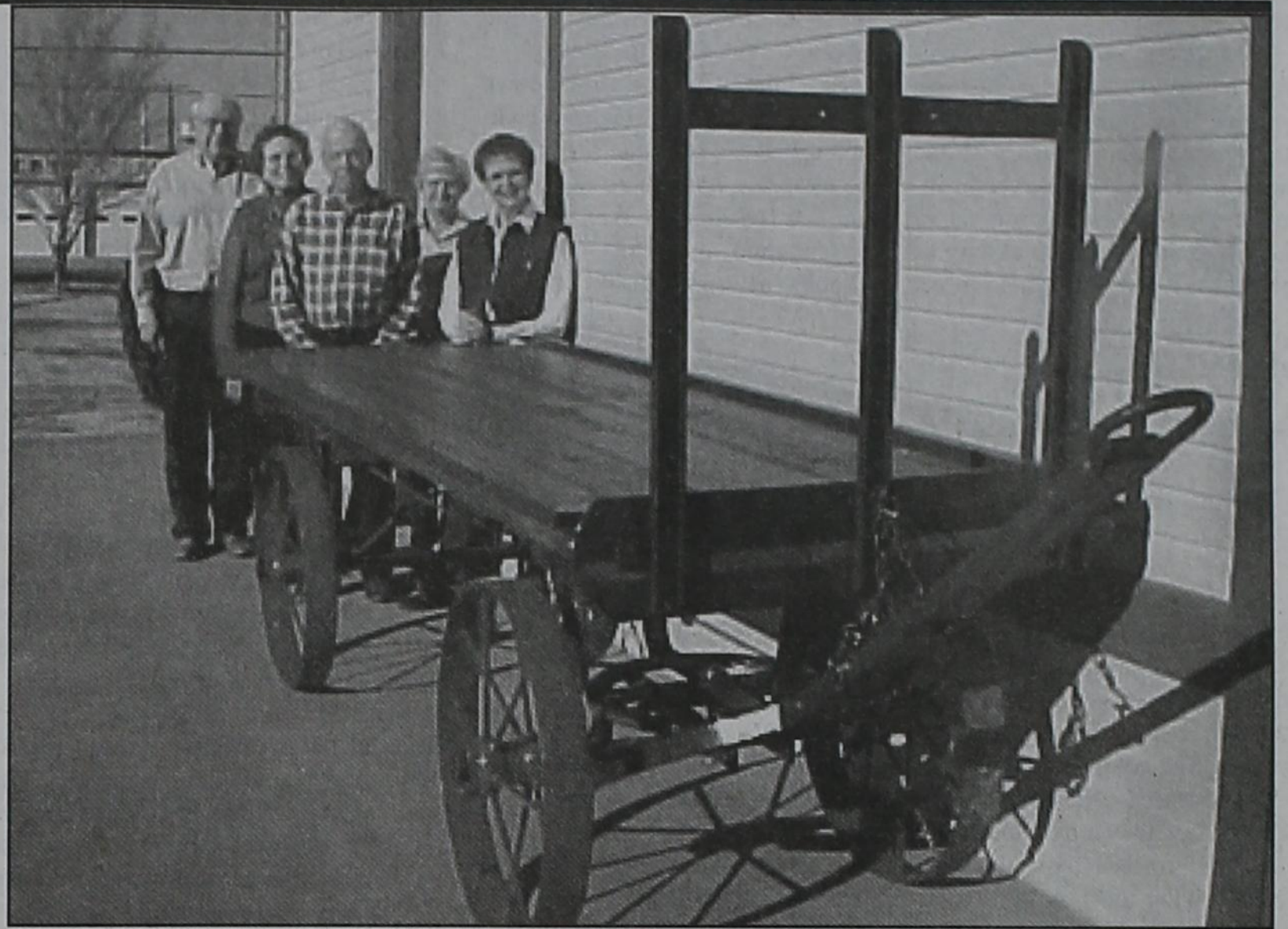
a proclamation March 14. She will cap off the week by honoring more than 100 farming and ranching families during the 29th Annual Family Land Heritage Ceremony in Austin on March 19.

"Whether your role involves growing food and fiber or just consuming it, you can take pride in Texas agriculture and the important role that it plays in our future. It is an industry that continues to meet the ever-increasing needs of consumers throughout Texas and around the world," Combs said.

From the Gulf Coast to the Panhandle, Texas is the most agriculturally diverse state. Agriculture generates \$73 billion annually throughout the state's economy, with one out of every five Texans working in an agriculture-related industry.

"Texas agriculture plays a major

role in health and nutrition, as well as in water conservation, rural economic development, global trade, and the preservation of the environment," Combs said. "National Agriculture Week gives us a chance to recognize the people who consistently enrich our lives in many ways. Texas is the second-largest agriculture state in the United States, accounting for about seven percent of the total U.S. agricultural income. Eighty percent of the land in Texas is in some form of agricultural production. It is important to honor those in agriculture who have built on centuries of progress by making constant advances in research, technology, production, and marketing, to meet the changing demands of consumers," Combs said.

### *We Don't Miss The Water 'Till The Well Runs Dry*

IT WAS ABOUT THIS TIME in 1962—that's 42 years ago; that doesn't seem possible—that as a news person, I began to hear rumbles regarding the fact that everyone needed to take pains to conserve on water.

My grandfather (who also doubled as my father) didn't get an irrigation well until 1951 or '52, no doubt somewhat behind the first "rush." I take after him, by waiting until something has proved itself 100%, before I plunk down money for it. Especially an irrigation well, which was costly, but ended up paying for itself in a year or two, I'm sure.

Those farmers who dug some of the first irrigation wells remember what a "spout" of water those wells could put out at first. They would shoot an eight-inch pipefull of water 10 or 15 feet. You had to have a concrete "spillway" to catch that spout, lest it dig another, erratic well of its own.

When settlers like my grandparents first came to Bailey County, they remembered that you could take a pair of post-hole diggers out south of Muleshoe in Blackwater Draw, and reach water with those "diggers." I was reminded of this in a recent visit with Loraine Welch, who had heard that story as well.

With all of those facts in mind, it isn't surprising that two or three generations felt like they could use all the water they wanted to, because the supply should be endless.

But at about this time in '62, when I was getting ready to move to Friona, the County Agent at Muleshoe told me "That's where the farmers are wasting water by allowing it to run into the "bar" ditches at the end of the row (and down the ditch for a mile or so)."

The water didn't run off to that extent in Bailey County, whose land is more sandy than in these parts. My County Agent friend told me at that time that predictions were that our area would be "out of water" by the year 2000, if something wasn't done. He knew what he was talking about!

One of the first organizations I remember becoming acquainted with on my arrival in Parmer County was the High Plains Water District #1 of Lubbock. That group managed to get a law passed that would fine the farmers for allowing such runoff, and got them to build "tailwater pits" to collect the runoff. That water was "re-used" by most of the farmers.

My longtime friend A.L. Black was a leader in this organization, and has for many years, taken an interest in our water situation, and tried to convince residents in the Mississippi River area to sell some of their runoff water to this area.

That effort was unsuccessful, and if Mr. Black is like myself, it's hard to feel sorry for those living on the "Old Miss" riverbanks who lose their homes due to spring floods time after time. It is now several years later, but some project of this nature should still be able to benefit folks living in both areas.

If something doesn't happen, I don't know what the cities of Amarillo Lubbock, Plainview and eight other cities are going to do about their water supply for drinking water and lawn watering. Both depend heavily on Lake Meredith for their supply of this water, and the lake is down to the 58-59 foot range, having been between 80 and 90 feet at one time.

Both Amarillo and Lubbock are building homes like there was a prize for the winner, and both are attracting new businesses right and left.

An article in Sunday's Lubbock paper stated that studies have determined that Lake Meredith has less than three years left, as a water supply.

Carol and I have thought for some time that we should run concrete on our corner of Maple Street and paint it green. Our neighbors might even pass the hat for such a project, since we're such poor "yard people."

We just blame it on "conserving water."

## Seliger and Frye Win Big in Parmer County

Kel Seliger received 602 votes, Kirk Edwards had 106. The percentage followed a trend in the District 31 state senator race as

Kel Seliger won the primary and will face democrat Elaine King Miller in November.

In the contested Precinct 1 County Commissioner race, incumbent Kirk Frye was the clear winner. Frye received 345 votes, John Tannahill 81, and John Mars 57. For county attorney, Charles Aycok drew 278 votes in spite of the fact that he announced on March 1 that he was withdrawing from the race. However Jeff Aetkinson won the county attorney job with 445 votes.

In the Democratic primary, John Kerry was the clear county winner with 114 votes. Eleven people voted in the Precinct 1 (Friona) democratic primary. In the County Commissioner Precinct 3 (Farwell) race, Michael Haseloff defeated incumbent Ed Corn 156-84. Haseloff will run against Republican Ronald Byrd for Precinct 3 county commissioner in the November general election.

## Emergency Providers To Meet About Boundaries & Transfers

On Tuesday, March 2, several officials from Bovina met with the Parmer County Hospital Board to discuss issues concerning the dispatch of Bovina EMS for hospital transfers. Representing Bovina were Bovina EMS Director Larry Mitchell, city council members Jessie Stone and Stan Miller, and city manager Ernest Terry.

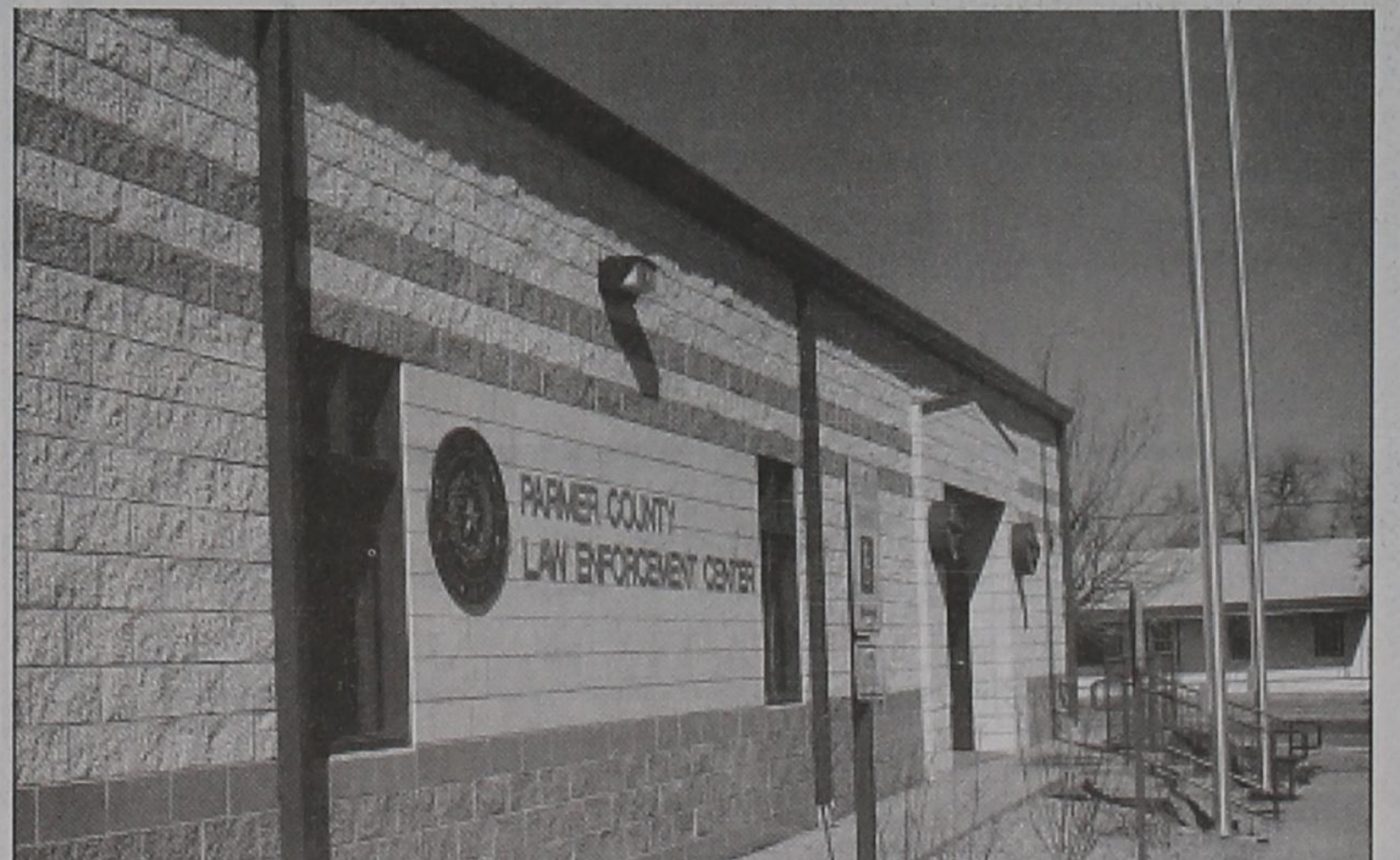
Terry stated that during the last 12 months, Friona EMS made 100 transfers and Bovina made 7 transfers; and that PCCH pays a monthly stipend to Friona EMS of \$1,000 and \$250 to Bovina for their ambulance services.

Bovina's position, according to Terry, is that Bovina EMS is an all-volunteer organization responsible for their own EMS service area. Providing transfers, or routine ambulance runs, takes time away from their jobs, personal time, and families, which, he added, they do enthusiastically and

professionally. The few instances when Bovina EMS was dispatched for patient transfer was not the fault of PCCH, Terry said.

As a result of continuing confusion between the various first responder services in the county, the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission (PRPC) will hold a meeting for all Parmer County Emergency Service providers on Friday, March 12, at 6 p.m. at the Friona Community Center. The meeting will be conducted by Pam Nielsen, the PRPC emergency services coordinator. The preliminary agenda will include county boundaries for fire and EMS providers and the issue of patient transfers.

Currently there are no written mutual support agreements among the various county emergency providers, according to Terry. County and elected officials and other interested parties are invited to attend.

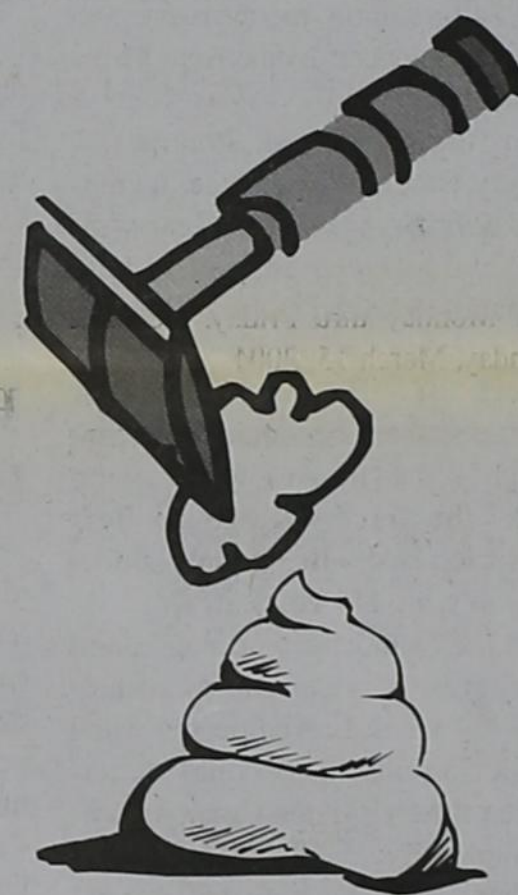

## YOUR EYES

### ALLERGIES CAN CAUSE SEVERAL EYE PROBLEMS

Eye allergies can vary from mild redness and irritation to severe conjunctiva inflammation. The conjunctiva is the delicate membrane that covers the eyeball and extends to the inside of the eyelids. It can be affected if exposed to allergen particles such as pollen, cat dander, or dust mites.

Severe allergies can also cause atopic kerato conjunctivitis, a rare condition that most often occurs in young adult males. The illness is characterized by intensely itchy red areas on the eyelids. The eye can have a heavy discharge, and the skin of the eyelid may show scales and crusts. In serious cases, the eyes become sensitive to light and the eyelids noticeably thicken. It can also cause swelling and scarring of the cornea.

Triggers for atopic kerato conjunctivitis are similar to those of other skin problems. Food allergies such as eggs, peanuts, milk, soy, wheat, or fish and airborne allergens like dust mites may be contributing factors. Antihistamines are used to subdue the itching and inflammation.

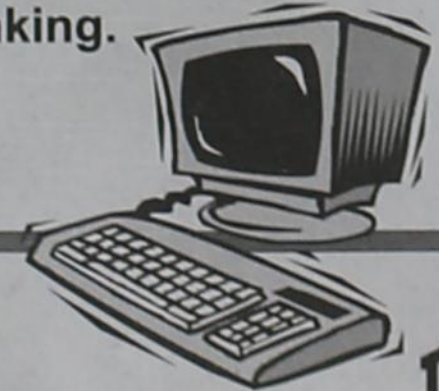

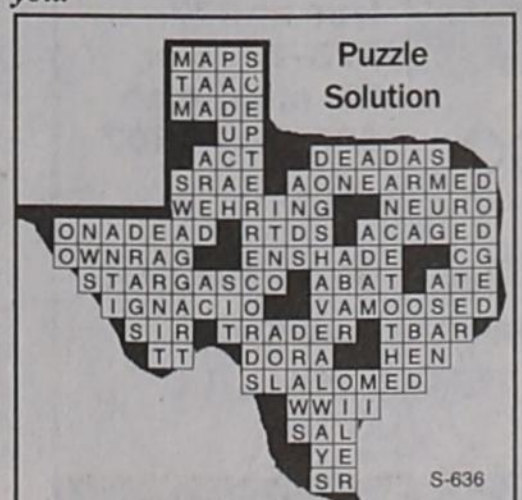
On the academic side, Bill needs to know the class valedictorians from the years prior to 1938, and those after 1956. He also plans to publish photos of all of these honor grads that he can get.

## The Best Teacher Is The One At Home

On my oldest child's first day of kindergarten, I was barely 29. At that point, my five-year-old already knew more about being a student than I knew about being the parent of a student.

She had more faith in me than I had in myself.

When I left her weeping at the school that morning, I thought her education was someone else's job for the next 13 years or so.

The teacher's job.

The principal's job.

The superintendent's job.

My daughter knew better. Maybe she couldn't have articulated that on her first day of kindergarten. Maybe she couldn't have explained it that way, even in her senior year of high school.

But deep down she knew her education was my responsibility.

She knew I would be there to tuck her in at a reasonable hour each night and wake her up at a reasonable time each morning.

She knew I would be there to get her to school on time and to make sure she got home safely.

She knew I would feed, clothe and shelter her, take care of her when she got sick and comfort her when she got sad or confused.

She knew I would watch over her, correct her, encourage her. She knew I would study with her, explain things to her, and help her understand everything from the alphabet to algebra.

She knew that the teacher in her classroom wasn't the only teacher she had.

How many children in our schools don't know that? How many don't have that, never had that?

What are we doing about that?

In our current obsession to measure our children by standardized test scores, to "leave no child behind", how do we reconcile the fact that scores of children are left behind each and every day by their parents?

The students who don't have teachers at home—for whatever reason—can't go home with their classroom teachers, or principals, or superintendents.

Leave No Child Behind requires a great deal of our schools and their administrators and teachers.

Far as I can tell, it requires nothing of parents.

This isn't football. When it comes to educating children, parents aren't mere spectators in the stands. Parents are the head coaches.

We may find ways to raise our test scores, even at our lowest performing schools. Good teachers and principals work miracles every day.

But sooner or later, we've got to confront the education crisis that begins and ends—for too many of our children—at home.

Vouchers won't do that. Standardized tests won't do that. State takeovers of school districts won't do that.

Teachers and principals can't be parents. Neither can the government.

There's only one group of people who can help students who don't have the parents they need.

Other parents.

Parents like Johnny Robinson of Memphis.

Robinson has a child at LaRose Elementary and another at Booker T. Washington High. He spends a lot of time at both schools, especially BTW.

"My ninth grader said: 'Well, Pops, why do you come to school?'" Robinson said.

"I said: 'I do it for your safety, and I do it for other kids. We have about 600 kids at Booker T. Washington and every kid there calls me Daddy.'"

Students don't need more and better tests. Above all, they need more and better parents.

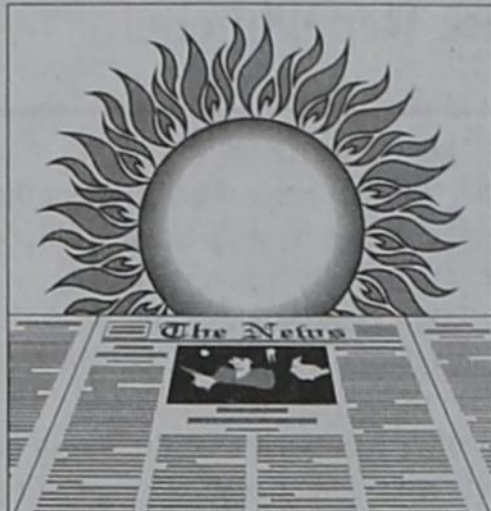

### THE CHIEF'S CORNER

I take my position as the Chief of Police for the City of Friona very seriously and fully understand that I have a great responsibility to the citizens of the community and the employees of the department. It is my duty as an administrator to ensure that the officers and employees of the Friona police Department not only perform their assigned duties but do so with honesty and integrity.

I have over twenty-five years of law enforcement experience that includes twelve years working and supervising a Criminal Investigations Division. While serving as the supervisor over Criminal Investigations, one of my responsibilities was to conduct internal affairs investigations involving alleged misconduct by police officers. It is a very difficult task to investigate officers that you work with and consider your friends. However, I believe that police officers must conduct themselves in a professional manner at all times and must be held accountable for their actions. Law enforcement officers can be investigated for misconduct for a variety of reasons and often it may not be because the officer committed a crime, but did violate a department policy, directive or procedure. Many police officers have been terminated not because they committed a criminal offense, but because they violated a directive or procedure set in place by the Chief of Police, City Council, or City Manager.

I do believe that police officers in our society must be honest, have integrity and treat people with respect regardless of the person's position in life. Police officers are held to a higher standard than the average citizen and they should be. It is a very difficult task to demand compliance with the laws of the land and maintain order if you as an officer are violating the laws that you have sworn to uphold. Police officers must remain calm in the face of chaos and disorder and certainly must not contribute to or cause disorder. Where a citizen can have his peace violated by a person shouting profanities at him or her, it just cannot be violated simply by a person using profanity towards the officer. Yes, it just comes with the job. I have been cursed and threatened by people that I have come in contact with as a law enforcement officer, but the job demands that I do as the Bible states, "Turn My Cheek" and continue being a professional.

As the Chief of Police I assure the citizens of Friona that I investigate any complaints of misconduct committed by an officer working for the Friona Police Department. I will conduct the investigation fairly and with impartiality to ensure that the truth is uncovered. If I find that an officer conducted himself in a manner that is a detriment to the City of Friona or the Friona Police Department, I will hold him accountable for his actions. However, if I find that the officer conducted himself professionally and did not violate a criminal law or department directive I will exonerate him.

Below is a list of Core Values of the Law Enforcement profession and values that I believe every officer must live by.

#### CORE VALUES

- We will hold the preservation of life as our most sacred duty.
- We will always strive to maintain the highest standard of honesty and integrity and will accept nothing less than the truth.
- We recognize that our mission is to enforce the laws of society. We will do so in a fair and impartial manner, always remembering that our role is to resolve problems, not judge or punish.
- We will honor our police powers and be mindful that they are derived from the people we serve. We will not tolerate abuse of our authority.
- We will honor and uphold the public trust and be accountable to

- those we serve.
- We will respect and protect the constitutional rights of all citizens, treating them with courtesy and respect and using force only when necessary.
- We recognize that our personal conduct, both on and off duty, is inseparable from our professional reputation as individuals of the department.
- We recognize that the origin and responsibility for leadership rests within each member of the department, no matter what our rank or position.
- We will always strive to expand our personal and professional growth through continued education, training and involvement within our community.
- We will always remain accountable to one another, our department and the citizens we serve.

To avoid a fire when using an electric heater: check the cord when you plug it in, if the cord is hot, don't use the heater; don't use an extension cord with the heater; and don't place the heater close to furniture, curtains, or anything that might easily catch fire.

Some of the firemen are making plans to attend local fire fighting schools this month and for several months to come. This will help them keep up with all the new fire fighting methods.

Be sure to check the location and condition of your heater and cord before using it.

On February 10, 2004, Valor Telecommunications of Texas, LP (Valor) filed its Second Amended Application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (Commission) to establish surcharges to recover lost revenues and incurred costs associated with Expanded Local Calling Service (ELCS) routes implemented from February 1, 1996 through December 31, 2002 between Valor's Texas telephone exchanges and, in many instances, the exchanges of other local telephone companies. The Second Amended Application was filed pursuant to the Commission's Substantive Rule § 26.221 titled "Applications to Establish or Increase Expanded Local Calling Service Surcharges."

ELCS expands the local calling scope of a telephone exchange to include one or more additional telephone exchanges if customers in a petitioning exchange approve by ballot the payment of an ELCS fee in lieu of long distance charges. Costs and lost revenues associated with Valor's surcharge application are those not recovered through existing ELCS fees.

In the Second Amended Application, Valor proposes to implement monthly ELCS surcharges for five years beginning on the date the Commission issues a final order on Valor's request. The Commission can establish an ELCS surcharge for any duration. ELCS surcharges apply in addition to monthly ELCS fees.

Valor proposes the following monthly ELCS surcharges per residential line: \$.86 in Year 1, \$.85 in Year 2, \$.03 in Year 3, \$.02 in Year 4, \$.01 in Year 5. Valor proposes the following monthly ELCS surcharges per business line: \$1.72 in Year 1, \$1.70 in Year 2, \$0.66 in Year 3, \$0.4 in Year 4, \$0.2 in Year 5.

Valor is currently billing interim ELCS surcharges approved by the Commission, including an interim ELCS surcharge of \$.65 per month per residential line and an interim ELCS surcharge of \$1.30 per month per business line. If rates below the level of the interim surcharges are ultimately approved by the Commission, Valor may be required by the Commission to refund all or part of the interim surcharges.

If Valor's Second Amended Application is approved, the net annual effect on Valor's Year 1 revenues will be zero since the requested surcharges are designed to replace lost revenues and to reimburse Valor for increases in costs associated with the provision of ELCS. The estimated total lost revenues and increased costs Valor seeks to recover through this proceeding is \$3,867,372 in Year 1, \$3,791,870 in Year 2, \$1,333,831 in Year 3, \$89,220 in Year 4, and \$44,610 in Year 5.

John 17:16, 18 juxtapose a contrast of attitudes by Jesus. On the one hand, Jesus' followers "are not of the world even as Jesus was not of the world". On the other hand they are sent to lovingly interrelate with the world as Jesus did.

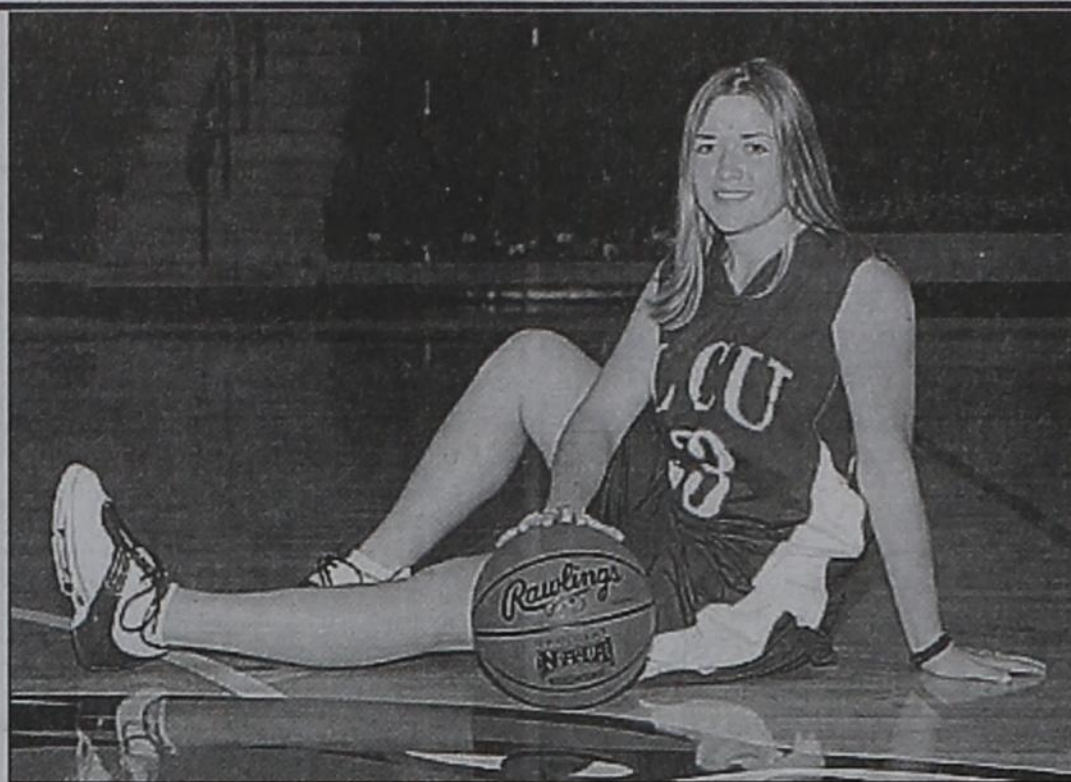
The church has often interpreted the above in a world hating, world denying way and reacted by withdrawing from the world to live primarily in the safety of their cultic, sectarian or denominational group. They forget to affirm and live the truth that God made the world good (Gen. 1:31) and that he sent Jesus to minister and serve because he "so loved the world".

The church has been guilty of painting itself into a corner and forcing its adherents to choose between a colorful, eloquent heresy, or a dull, narrow-minded orthodoxy. But Jesus gives a very wise third way which is to be lovingly involved in the world appreciating, using and affirming its goodness, but not be of its boastful, materialistic, selfish, greedy, thoughtless, destructive way of living.

This is the meaning of I John 2:15-17 when it says, "to love not the world". It means to love not the selfish, destructive, worldly system of thought and living.

Origin and Clement of the late second and early third century are a marvelous example of following Jesus' third way. They loved the truth and beauty they found in much of classical Greco-Roman culture and philosophy. They united the best of their culture with the message of scripture and built the first systematic theological approach to explaining the Christian faith to the unbelieving world round about. This worked very well converting and training many to become the intellectual and spiritual leaders of the church. They showed how the best of culture and philosophy could come to have a home in the Christian church.

Followers of Jesus must do something like this in every age to properly show love to God's world. This method is the Lord's way. It is exciting and life affirming.

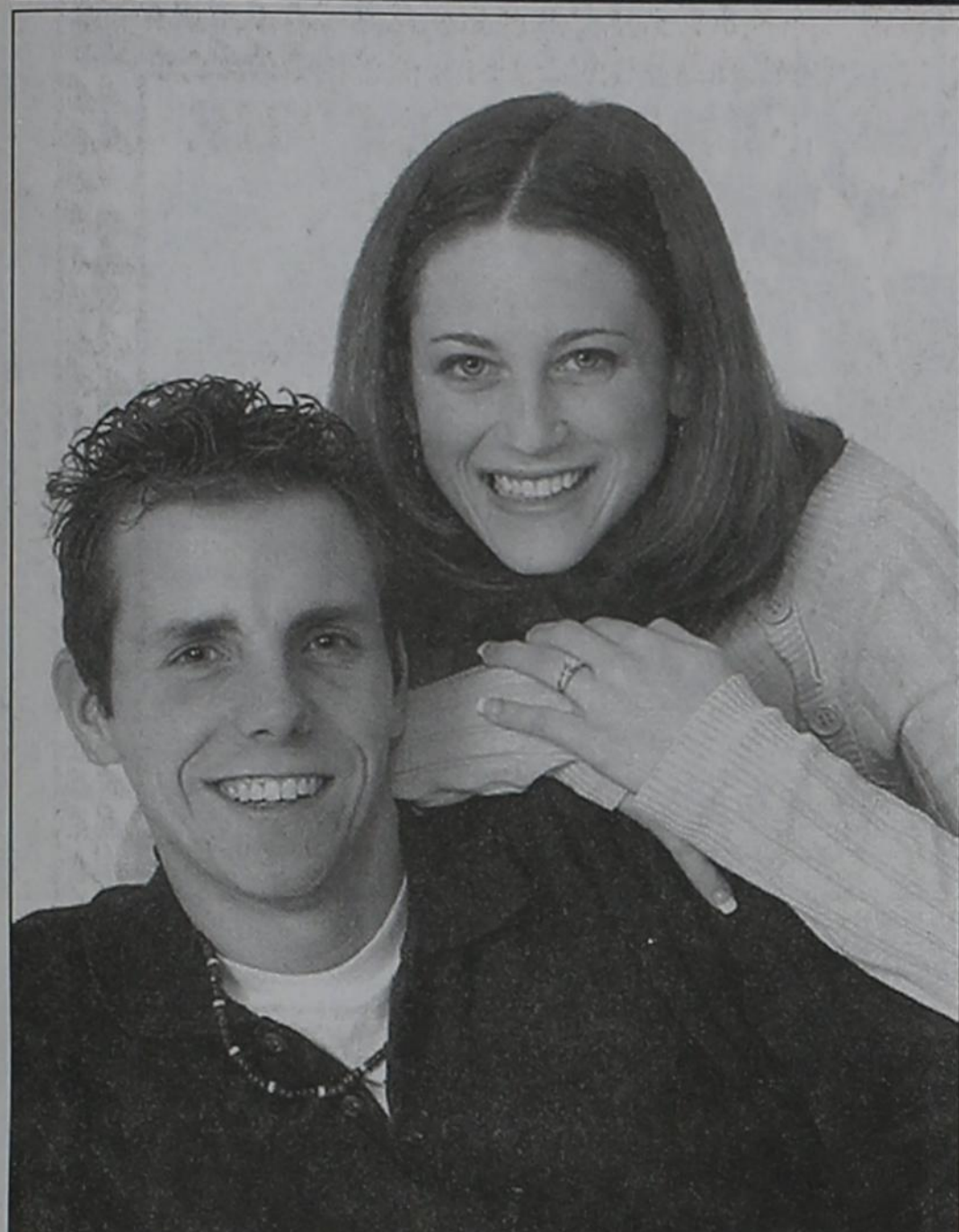

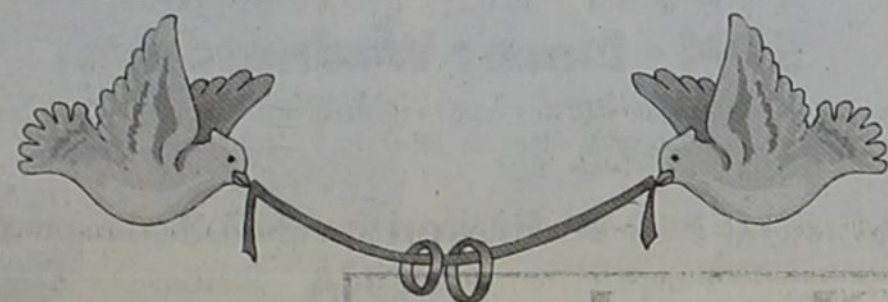

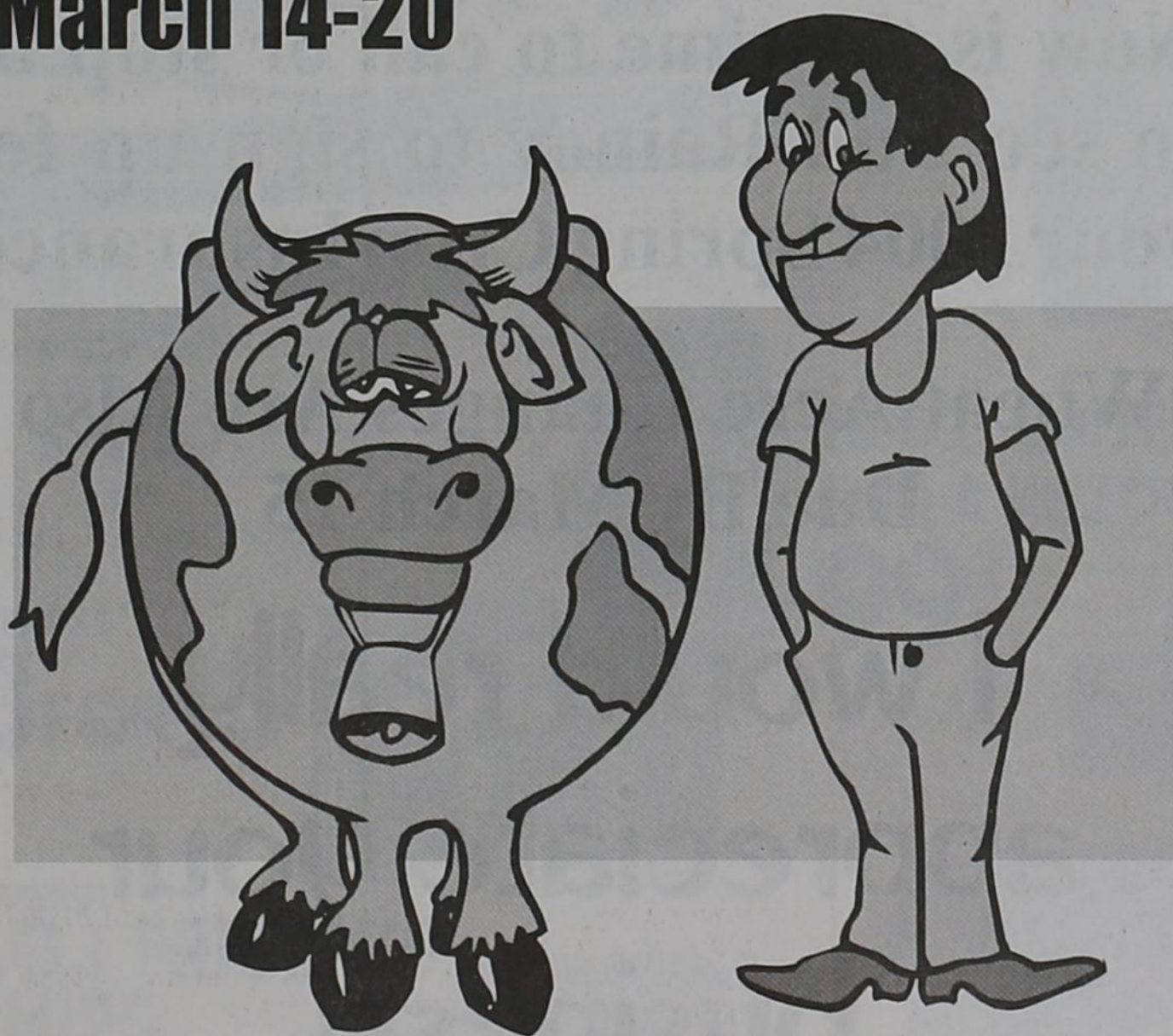

## Grassley Offers New Payment Limit Reforms

Iowa Senator Charles Grassley has cleared his first hurdle and gained Senate Budget Committee approval of an amendment that would make significant changes to current payment limitation rules included in the 2002 Farm Bill. The amendment was offered during the Committee's markup of the Senate's FY05 Budget Resolution.

Grassley's crusade against the current system continues even though the Senate failed to support similar proposals during and after debate of the 2002 Farm Bill. He has also continued to pursue the issue despite the fact that the Congressionally mandated USDA Payment Limit Commission, developed to investigate his concerns, decided not to suggest any changes to the system after an in-depth study of the issues involved.

Texas Senator John Cornyn, who sits on the Budget Committee, has been a staunch supporter of the provisions of the 2002 Farm Bill and voted against the Grassley amendment.

"I strongly believe that we must defend the 2002 Farm Bill authored by former House Agriculture Committee Chairman Larry Combest and signed by the President," said Cornyn after the Budget Committee vote. "Unfortunately, we were not able to defeat the payment limitations amendment today, but we will have other opportunities to block this effort to change current payment limitation provisions. We just need to keep fighting for Texas agriculture."

Bolstering Grassley's renewed efforts was the fact that the projected savings from the amendment he offered suddenly grew more than five fold. This is a curious development since improved price outlooks for most major crops indicate actual program expenditures will be considerably lower in the future.

The most recent Congressional Budget Office (CBO) scoring of the Grassley amendment increased an astounding \$1 billion over last year and brought the projected five-year savings to just more than \$1.2 billion.

Grassley has indicated that he would use the savings from his amendment to provide \$25 million in additional funding for value-added programs, fully fund the conservation security program at \$185 million, and then allocate the remainder to nutrition programs.

Inclusion of the amendment in the Budget Resolution does not mean it will be included in Congress' final FY05 Budget Resolution. The Senate's version must still be approved and then reconciled with the House of Representatives FY05 Budget Resolution.

Also, the blueprint provided by the FY05 Budget Resolution is not binding on the Senate Appropriations Committee, which will eventually develop specific FY05 budget figures, or the Senate Agriculture Committee, which will also have to approve FY05 Agriculture Budget language.



## Agriculture Committee Hearing On Animal ID

Congressman Randy Neugebauer wants to protect West Texans from BSE and other animal diseases that could be carried in to the US by foreign cattle or spread among U.S. cattle.

Neugebauer attended an Agriculture Committee Hearing on Animal Identification Friday in Houston. With the establishment of an animal ID system, producers would know where an animal originates from and other animals it had contact with, in the event that a disease or some other animal health problem is detected.

"Texas is beef country, especially West Texas. Of all the states, it is incredibly important for Texas' beef consumers and the financial health of beef producers that we protect them with an animal identification system," said Neugebauer.

"I went to this hearing as a member of the Agriculture Committee because I wanted to get a better idea of what the producer groups want and make sure this initiative is driven by them. A government mandate without producer buy-in will not be successful," said Neugebauer. "The cattle industry is a hugely diverse industry, which means the ID's could be hard to implement if not done the right way. While I stand firm that it needs to be done, we really need to think it through."

Possible implementation procedures include ear tags with bar codes for scanning. Ranchers would keep a database and they would submit the animal information into a national database.

"Who is paying for this? Will the information be confidential? Who will have access to the database? That's what we looked at today," said Neugebauer.

Among those testifying were representatives of the cattle, dairy, and sheep industries, as well as USDA officials.

In late 2003, a BSE case was confirmed in Washington State. As a member of the Agriculture Committee and Subcommittee on Livestock and Horticulture, Neugebauer has worked hard to ensure the safety of beef entering Texas. He questioned USDA Secretary Ann Veneman in January on the confirmed case of BSE that was reported in Washington State. Neugebauer's questions then dealt with USDA's actions regarding the new regulations on beef slaughter and processing, reopening export markets, and USDA's efforts to implement a national animal identification system.

# Break the Silence, Prevent the Event

## Call the Safe School Helpline 1-800-418-6423 ext 359

There are times when students hear or learn information that could prevent harm to others if it is reported. Often they are afraid to tell someone or do not know who to tell, and most of all they want to remain anonymous. Sometimes students tell their parents or other adults, and the parent doesn't know where to turn for help. Friona ISD has for several years paid for a Safe School Helpline, (1-800-418-6423 ext. 359). It can be used to report threats of violence, suicide, and illegal activity that could harm children in our school. Your call is private, confidential, and anonymous.

### > How do we know it is anonymous?

Friona ISD has contracted for this service through Security Voice, and outside company with no ties to our school.

### > How does it work?

A toll-free number has been assigned for our school district. When you dial this number from a touch-tone phone, you will be advised how to leave your information—and not to include your name or other facts that could identify you. Then, you record your message.

### > What type of information should be reported?

Please report any facts, remarks or actions that could jeopardize the safety of our children, staff, or school. Examples of harmful or threatening behavior might include: violence, theft, drug or alcohol abuse, talk of suicide, sexual harassment, and weapons.

### > What happens next?

Security Voice will send a typed copy of your message to the school. The school will then investigate the report, and determine how best to act on it.

### > When and where can you call?

You may call toll-free anytime, day or night—from a home, cell or pay phone. Take care that your call is not overheard.

### > Can this service help troubled students, too?

Yes. If you see a student who is very troubled, or overhear remarks like "I can't go on," please call to report it. The call will be routed to a Community Counseling and Crisis Center that provides a 24-hour crisis intervention service. Trained counselors are available 365 days per year to talk with persons seeking assistance in coping with suicidal thoughts, depression, or feelings of loneliness and loss. Callers need only press '3' when prompted.

### > Who can call this number?

Anyone, student or adult.

### > Can I change my message

### later? How will you know who is calling?

Yes. When you leave a message you are given a case number that is yours alone. Enter that same case number when updating your message or answering additional questions.

### > How will I know if any action has been taken?

After three school days, call the toll-free number and enter your case number when prompted. A recording will let you know your message was heard and may ask for more information. Your answers will be transcribed and sent to the school administration for further investigation. Administrative actions may sometimes be confidential, but your call is always important.

If you lose the toll-free number, just call any one of the principals or the Friona ISD Administration Building at 806-250-2747.

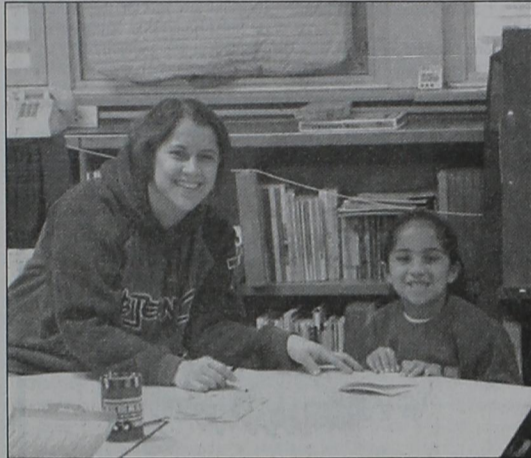

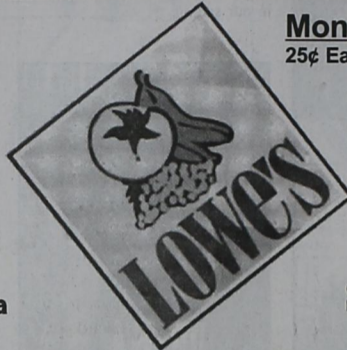

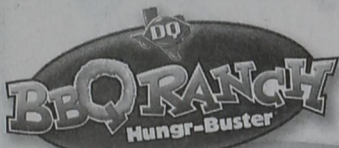
